men is able to run a full freight all the way from Jacksonville to Miami. Before the strike,

the railroad was required by union rules to hire three full crews of five men each (the fifth man being the non-working fireman) in order to cover the same ground. Not only has this resulted in enormous payroll savings, but the line is able to give better service. It has cut out two stops of 30 minutes each for the purpose ot changing crews.

Savings have also been made in the office staff. By reducing overhead and letting unneeded workers go, office help payrolls have been cut from \$13,000 per month to \$2,500 per month.

In actual fact, the Florida East Coast is proving how efficiently a railroad can be run if it doesn't have to hire union crews, submit to union rulings and bow to government supervision. It's a lesson the rest of the railroad industry would like to take to heart.

If the well-being of the nation were to be considered as a primary factor, the nation's railroad managers should be encouraged to follow the lead of the Florida East Coast. -Colorado Springs



Facts About Social Security

More than 838,000 men, women and children in Texas were receiving social security benefit payments at the end of 1963. These payments amounted to about \$49,013,000.00 a month, according to Gus Jones, district manager for the Social Security Administration in Sherman, Texas. "This represents an increase in the number of beneficiaries of about 7 percent over the same month last year," he said.

The social security program was 28 years old last August 14. In reviewing the growth of the program, Mr. Jones noted that at the close of 1940, the first year in which monthly payments were made, only 200,000 people in the nation were receiving payments. 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
