#### Facts About Social Security

"Loss of credit earned under social security may be the result of using an incorrect social security number," warned Gus Jones, Sherman social security district manager.

"Do not depend on memory; be sure every employer actually sees the social security card," he said.

When an employee gives his employer an incorrect social security number it may prevent the employer from properly reporting the wages paid the employee. This will, at best, delay the posting of the employee's earnings to his social security record.

Jones stated that there is no need for an individual to memorize the social security number issued to him. If the card is lost it can easily be replaced by the Social Security Administration after he completes a simple application form. These application forms are available at any post-office, as well as any Social Security Administration office.

#### Increase Noted in Whooping Cough

Whooping cough - known in medical jargon as pertussis - is not the killer it used to be. But it still is causing a significant scattering of infant deaths and a spread of sickness each year.

Its incidence seems to be on the increase in Texas. During the first week of December, city and county health officers across the state reported 19 new cases of whooping cough, bringing the 1963 total to 2,-312 — an increase of 530 cases over the same period in 1962. Only five deaths due to whooping cough were reported last year, but the State Department of Public Health already has received reports of 15 infant deaths from the disease this year.

State health officials say whooping cough is a large problem in the first six months of childhood. They emphasize two words - "family cooperation" - as the key to pro-. And then there's THIS tecting infants against this and





#### Patient's Room -

In front of the window at either side of a temperature control unit is a bench to accommodate visitors. Additional seating for visitors is provided by chairs — two in a private room, three in a semiprivate room.

Temperature is controlled by a dual method. An air circulating system provides fresh heated or cooled air to all parts of the building. In patients' rooms, corridors and some other areas the air flow is reduced to achieve a slow change of air hence at times does not carry sufficient heating or cooling. In those areas it is supplemented by water heating and cooling. The wa-ter, heated or cooled in the mechanical room, flows constantly through coils of the temperature control unit and a fan circulates air past the coil. A thermostat in each room controls its own fan.

Telephone and TV connections provide additional comfort, or entertainment. Outlets for both are in each room. The telephone operates through an automatic switch board which enables a patient to dial direct to any phone on the local telephone exchange. However incoming local calls, or long distance calls in or out, will require help at the switchboard.




