The point that impresses us most about this situation is the attitude of the government people. Theoritically their job is to adjust imports, exports, traffics, etc., to give the most possible protection to our own people. But the aim here, obviously, is to impose a handicap which will eventually make people come begging to Washington for help. They want to put stockmen on the subsidy list, to convert them from tax payers to tax eaters. That's good politics. History of the past three decades has shown that subsidies are very effective vote getters.
