

The straw vote ballot called for a vote for or against "a mandatory garbage collection at a price not to exceed \$1.75 per month for a private residence and a graduated scale for commercial establishments based on volume and frequen-

Requests for garbage disposal had been before the city council for some time. Also circulating for some time were reports that many did not want the service. The council decided to sample public opinion before giving its answer. Now it can give the answer. It can drop the subject without bothering to inquire into the several factors and costs of setting up a system.

Approval in Tuesday's straw vote would not have authorized the service. It would have required first of all that the city determine whether the service is possible for the price suggested.

Opposition Tuesday generally was due to the fact that voters were not willing to pay \$1.75 per month for the service.



Highway Dept. Offers Advice on Bluebonnet Care

Each Spring as the Texas countryside becomes bathed in the beauty of Bluebonnets, Texas Highway Department mail grows heavy with requests for information. Hundreds of people in every section of the state want to know about the planting and care of the world famous Texas State Flower.

But, by then it is too late to plant bluebonnets for enjoyment during the current will assure the "green thumb" crowd the opportunity to include Bluebonnets in their

gree by the weather. In general, the first flowers open about March 15 in the southern part of the state, and in the more northern section the first flowers may not show before May 1. The length of the flowering period is about one

Seed mature about six weeks after the last flowers fade. These should be harvested before the seed pods explode and scatter the seed. Seed may be planted immediately after harvest or may be stored. However, seed should be planted prior to November 1, so that they may germinate and grow throughout the winter months. During this period a heavy root system and a sturdy plant is developed to pro-duce an abundance of spring

Bluebonnet seed can be obtained from seed distributors if orders are placed well befor the crop is ready for harvest. The Texas Highway Department harvests seed from time to time for its own use by mowing the plants when the seeds are mature, and immediately distributing them thinly over the area to be seeded. No seed is retained for the ensuing season by the






