
a good cover of Bermuda. A farmer wouldn't think of planting a crop of corn or maize and then forgetting it. He couldn't expect much production. By the same token he can't expect Bermuda to produce if it is planted and left alone to compete with weeds and wide-mouthed COWS.

Old stands of Bermuda should be fertilized annually with at least 30 pounds of nitrogen and 30 pounds of phosphate, and weeds mowed or sprayed. Most weeds require more moisture and plant food to produce a pound of forage than Bermuda grass does

treats

Stock Bermuda grass pastures so that a four to six inch growth is left at all times and the pasture will produce more beef annually. There will be a lot less weed problems too. Now is the time to finalize grass plans for deferred grazing on native grass pastures. Where there are two or more native grass pastures a portion should be deferred from grazing at least three months during the growing season. New plantings of native grass should be deferred the entire growing season. However, deferred grazing is not the whole story. To obtain proper range use no more than 50 per cent of the annual growth of grass should be removed by grazing.
