## Travel back in time ...

### Visit Saint Jo's Pioneer Days

It could be like a walk into the days of Daniel Boone and Davy Crockett this weekend for visitors to Saint Jo's first Pioneer Days Celebration, which will have a three-day run Friday through Sunday. A featured event will be some 1,500 pioneers from across the Southwest who will gather at some 350 primitive campsites about 3.6 miles north of Saint Jo in rugged country called the Devil's Backbone for the Southwestern National Rendezvous. It will be their fifth annual convention of the National Muzzle Loading Rifle Association, a group dedicated to living under pre-1840 conditions. "You won't see any ice chests or cars," said C.L. Worthington of Saint Jo, the local coordinator for the group. "It's the primitive life, just as our ancestors lived." The group will have a nine-day campout through June 4. The camp will be open to the public on Saturday and Sunday only, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Activities will include seminars and other western competitions, featuring muzzle loading demonstrations. The Pioneer Days Celebration came about to bring attention to the city's heritage, said Worthington. "There are a lot of old timers who have died, and many of the younger ones moved away during the 1940s and '50s when agriculture and oil were the only industries," he said. "Hopefully, we'll be able to enhance and revitalize our downtown where most buildings date back to the 1870s and 1890s." Included in the weekend pioneer activities will be registration for a western trail ride, fun run and bike-a-thon at 5 p.m. on Friday. There will be entertainment on the square at the Gazebo at 5:30 p.m. and a children's costume show at 6:30 p.m. On Saturday, registration will continue for the fun run and bike-a-thon at 7 a.m. There will be an open house at 8 a.m., the bike-a-thon at 9 a.m., and muzzle

demonstrations at noon, 2:30 and 4 p.m. A variety of games, including dominoes and horseshoes, will be unreel throughout the afternoon. The fun run will be at 4:30 p.m., a style show at 5 p.m. and beard judging contest at 6 p.m. There will be a country western dance at 9 p.m. at the

Russell-Neuman building. There will be a 7 a.m. breakfast on Sunday, an open house, and the rifle association rendezvous will be open to the public. For more information, call the Saint Jo Chamber of Commerce at 995-2188.

## Apply for disaster relief now!

Residents and business owners in areas affected by recent storms, flooding or tornadoes can begin applying for disaster assistance through a toll-free telephone hotline. Trained registrars for the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the Texas Division of Emergency Management will accept applications at 1-800-621-8592 beginning at 8 a.m. and continuing daily until further notice. The number for hearing impaired applicants is 1-800-621-8593. Bob Broussard, Federal Coordinating Officer, explained that taking applications over the telephone speeds the process. "This is a very convenient

method for the public to apply for assistance. Applications will be taken over the phone and then inspectors will be sent out to verify all losses and the severity of the damage." Ed Laundry, State Coordinating Officer, reminded people to have basic information ready when they call the information hotline and to contact their insurance agent first. "Applicants should be ready to give telephone registrars their addresses before and after the storm, their social security number, insurance policy number or agent's name (if insured), a description of the damages and directions to the damaged property," Laundry explained.

## Lindsay School Board members installed

Jim Neidhardt will serve as president of the Lindsay School Board for the next year as officers were elected and board members were installed during the board's May meeting. Rudy Zimmerer is vice president and Carol Fuhrmann will serve as secretary-treasurer. Returns were canvassed from the May 6 election, which showed several write-in votes. Mark Krebs received 139 votes and Henry Fleitman received 178 votes to take the two positions. Receiving

write-in votes were Jerry Metzler with 41, Skipper Bezner and Mark Metzler with one each, and Tom Eberhart and Red Eberhart each with two votes. In other business, the school board voted to award letter jackets to those students who made the honor roll for five consecutive six-week periods. Only one jacket will be awarded during a student's four years in school. The board also accepted an at-risk policy designed to identify potential dropout students.

## Bishop Delaney will celebrate special Mass

Although there are not yet any outward signs visible, a tinge of anticipation can be felt in Muenster, as many months of planning and preparation for the weekend observance of the 100th anniversary of the First Mass in Muenster approach completion. Ceremonies will begin with a Centennial Mass to be offered on the parking lot of the Community Center at 6 p.m. Friday, June 2. Principal celebrant of the Mass will be the Most Reverend Joseph P. Delaney, Bishop of Fort Worth Diocese. Dignitaries and other participants in the Mass will process from Sacred Heart Church to the site of the Mass. Members of the First Communion class will act as honor guards for the procession. There will be numerous seats available on the parking lot as chairs and bleachers will be moved to the area for the occasion. Seats will be reserved in the front for religious participants and First Communicants and also for the elderly and handicapped. Ushers will be seating people to make full use of the seats available. Main Street will be blocked off from Sixth Street through Seventh Streets from about an hour before

Mass to eliminate traffic noise and congestion in the area. Leonard Vogel, who is in charge of parking, said that there will be volunteers to help direct parking. He also announced that there will be people to assist residents from the nursing home and other elderly or handicapped folks in town with transportation to the Mass. Mr. Vogel asks that those needing such assistance call him at 759-4600 by that Thursday evening so that arrangements can be made. Following Mass Friday, sandwiches, sandwich plates and cold drinks will be available for purchase. Everyone is urged to stay after the Mass for an evening of fellowship. On Saturday night, a dance will be held at the Community Center with "Andy Serna and Captive Hearts" providing music. A Homecoming Picnic is planned for Sunday. Games and booths will open at 10 a.m. and dinner will be served from 11 a.m. until 2 p.m. The menu includes fried chicken, sausage and trimmings, and pie for dessert. The Auction will begin between 5 and 6 p.m. Sylvan Walterscheid is seeking

## Meningitis found in Cooke Co.

Dr. Allen of the Texas Public Health Department of Arlington has requested that a statement be made concerning two confirmed cases of meningitis diagnosed in Cooke County. Dr. John Kozura, Muenster physician, stated, "The only people that need to contact their family physician are those who had intimate contact with the two diagnosed patients." Symptoms for the illness are nausea, vomiting, fever, headache and stiffness of the neck. The germ can be passed by sharing food or drinking out of the same container. "A flu-like illness in the area has very similar symptoms," said Dr. Kozura. "If no contact was made or there is not the stiff neck symptom, you should not be alarmed."

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**Memorial Day Services set**

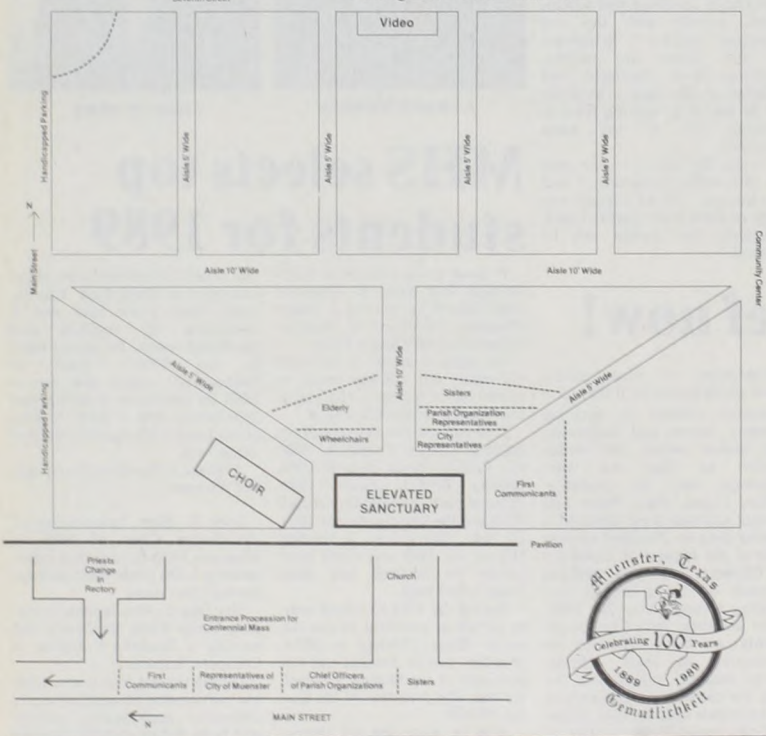

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**Lindsay City Council sets new dump times**

 The Lindsay City Council has set new days and times for use of the city dump grounds by city residents. The new schedule sets the dump to be open from 1 to 5 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and from 8 a.m. to noon on Saturday. In their regular May meeting, newly re-elected council members received the oath of office. They include David Arendt, Richard Hundt, Doyle Cogburn and Manley Taylor. The city has hired Tim Morris of Sherman to conduct a preliminary engineering study for the paving of several streets in Lindsay. The main streets being focused on at the present time are Bezner, Pecan and Willow Streets, said Mayor Don Metzler. "When we get his study back, then we'll meet with any homeowners to see who might be interested," he said. "We may also do any other streets if there's enough homeowners who want to get them done." The homeowners usually share the cost of paving the streets in front of their homes.

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At the request of Governor Bill Clements, President George Bush has declared several Texas counties a disaster area because of severe thunderstorms, tornadoes and flooding.

Attending graduation ceremonies were her mother and her sister, Janet Hermes.

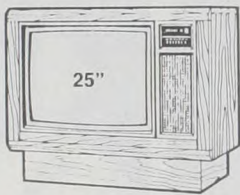

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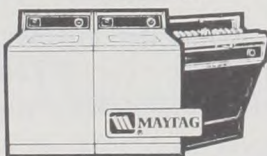

## Muenster students do it again in TEAMS!

Muenster students once again showed outstanding performances on the Texas Assessment of Minimum Skills Test (TEAMS), according to results received from this fall's testing.  
The TEAMS test is given annually to grades 3, 5, 7 and 9 with an exit-level examination for 11th grade students that must be mastered in order to graduate from high school. Those scores

were reported in the fall. TEAMS is a minimum skills test.  
Of the 34 third graders tested, 100 percent mastered both the math and reading sections, while 81 percent mastered the writing. Fifth grade scores indicated that 100 percent passed the math and reading, while 84 percent, or 21 of the 25 students tested, passed the writing. Of the seventh grade students, 100 percent mastered the math, 97 percent mastered the

reading, and 88 percent mastered the writing of 33 students tested. Of the ninth grade students, 100 percent mastered both the reading and math, while 94 percent, or 32 of 34 students, mastered the

writing. Writing scores, mainly the essay section of the test, are generally lower statewide, said Superintendent Charles Coffey. He said the students did very well in the gram-

mar section of the writing. "We did real well as a whole," he said of the TEAMS test. "We have some programs in place that are really helpful in preparing the students."

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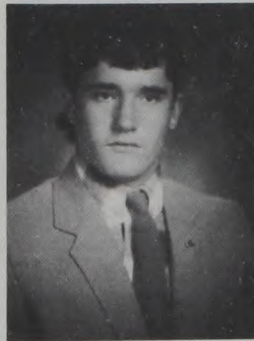

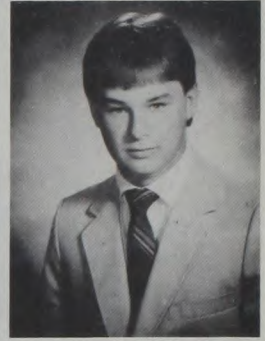

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## 1989 continues trend of MHS Journalism honors

You are a reporter for the Leaguetown High School Press... Six students of Muenster High School in the past four years have written news stories, editorials, feature articles, and headlines as "LHS reporters" in top-of-the-state competition.

Three of these six young women - Jamie Walterscheid, Jenny Wimmer and, most recently, Julie Hess - have won awards at University Interscholastic League contests in Austin. Hess's fifth place victory this year capped what is developing into a trend of journalistic excellence.

The emerging trend began in 1986 when Jean Pagel entered feature writing just to see how she could do. With no experience, no training and little practice, she won her way to the state level where the personality of the competition was a daughter of Walter Cronkite. Although Pagel did not place, she received a \$4,000 scholarship through UIL for competing.

The following year, Kim Hess gave the editorial division a try, earning a trip to the Austin contest. There, she wrote her opinion on the given topic of teenage pregnancy.

"You get all of your information from a prompt," Hess said, "but it's very intimidating because there are 60 people in the room and you feel like you're competing against all of them."

1988 was a big year for MHS journalism, with the events being taken more seriously and the entrants devoting more time and effort to preparation. As a result, four MHS students qualified for state honors, including Kim Hess with a repeat performance in news

writing. Another state competitor that year was Jennifer Reeves in feature writing. Reeves's interview was with an Olympic swimmer.

Jamie Walterscheid, in 1988, gave the highest rated performance MHS has seen. Her editorial supporting English as the official language of the United States won fourth place.

"In editorial, you make your own opinion, and you always have to worry about the judge being biased," Walterscheid said.

As the fourth MHS entrant in state journalism in 1988, Jenny Wimmer competed in a division dissimilar to the other three - headline writing. But that didn't stop her from winning sixth place.

In the contest, entrants are given six articles and are told to write headlines in 30 minutes that are both factual and conform to a

designated length and style.

"It helps to write headlines that are catchy. Like one I wrote about a swim team: 'Team strokes to first,'" Wimmer said. "All of it's hard because you can't use a thesaurus."

And, in 1989, MHS sent Julie Hess to the state feature writing contest. A freshman, Hess won fifth place with her article from an interview with an outstanding high school student.

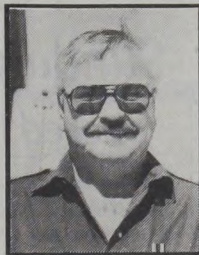

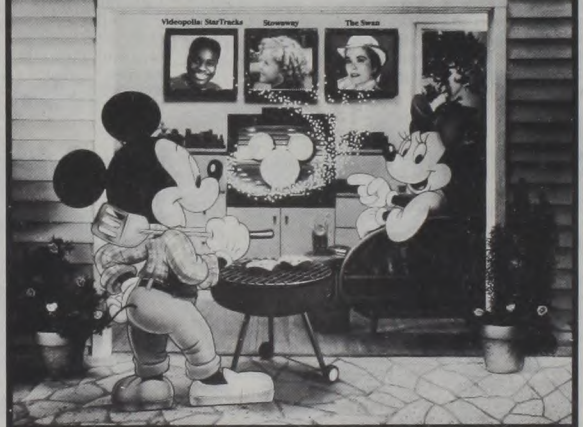

## Disaster Assistance Program Information

Various disaster assistance programs are made available under Presidential disaster declarations. Detailed information on the following types of individual assistance programs is available through the Disaster Hotline, at Disaster Application Centers located within the declared counties, or by directly contacting the agency.

1. **DISASTER HOUSING ASSISTANCE PROGRAM:** The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) may provide assistance for any individual or family whose permanent residence has been made uninhabitable as a result of the disaster. Assistance may be in the form of funds to obtain alternate rental housing or to make emergency repairs that are required to make the residence habitable.

2. **INDIVIDUAL AND FAMILY GRANT PROGRAM:** Grants of up to \$10,000 may be available for eligible disaster victims to meet disaster-related serious needs or necessary expenses which are not covered by other disaster assistance programs or insurance. The grant program is administered by the State Department of Human Resources.

3. **HOME/PERSONAL PROPERTY DISASTER LOANS:** Disaster loans through the Small Business Administration (SBA) are available to homeowners and renters for restoring or replacing disaster damaged real and personal property. The maximum real estate portion of the loan is \$100,000 and for personal property, also available to renters, is \$20,000.

4. **EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE:** Emergency food, clothing, shelter and medical assistance may be provided to individuals and families having such needs as a result of the disaster. Assistance can be provided by the American Red Cross, the Salvation Army, Church groups, and other voluntary organizations.

5. **DISASTER UNEMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE:** This assistance provides weekly benefit payments to those out of work due to the disaster, including self-employed persons, farm workers, farm and ranch owners and others not covered under regular unemployment insurance programs. It is administered by the Texas State Employment Commission and application can be made at any of the local offices.

6. **BUSINESS DISASTER LOANS:** Disaster loans through the Small Business Administration (SBA) are available to businesses to repair or replace destroyed or damaged business facilities, inventory, machinery, or equipment. The maximum loan amount is \$500,000.

7. **FARM ASSISTANCE:** The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) may make emergency loans to farmers and ranchers (owners or tenants) who were operating and managing a farm or ranch at the time of the disaster. These loans are limited to the amount necessary to compensate for actual losses to essential property and/or production capacity. Further information is available from the FmHA office within each county.

8. **OTHER AGRICULTURAL SERVICES:** Farmers and ranchers may apply for cost sharing grants for emergency conservation programs, such as debris removal from crop/pasture lands, repairs to land/water conservation structures, and permanent fencing. Further information is available from the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office within each county.

9. **TAX ASSISTANCE:** The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) allows casualty losses that were suffered on home, personal property, and household goods to be deducted on the income tax return if they are not covered by insurance. To obtain further advice and/or assistance, contact IRS at 1-800-424-1040. Assistance and information on State income tax returns can be obtained by contacting your State Tax Office. Also, county tax assessors may provide information and assistance on possible property tax relief.

10. **INSURANCE INFORMATION:** Assistance and/or counseling is available on insurance problems and questions, which may include obtaining copies of lost policies, claims filing, expediting settlements, etc. Contact your State Insurance Commissioner or, for flood insurance inquiries, contact the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) at 1-800-638-6620.

11. **LEGAL SERVICES:** Free legal services, including legal advice, counseling and representation may be provided to low-income disaster victims. Such services include replacing legal documents, transferring titles, contracting problems, will probates, insurance problems, and certain landlord related problems. Contact your local legal aid society or call the Disaster Hotline.

12. **SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS:** Assistance is available from the Social Security Administration (SSA) in expediting delivery of checks delayed by the disaster and for assistance in applying for Social Security disability and survivor benefits. Further information is available by calling the SSA office in your area.

13. **VETERANS BENEFITS:** The Veterans Administration (VA) can expedite delivery of information about benefits, pensions, insurance settlements, and VA mortgage loans. A toll-free information number is available. Check your telephone directory under "Veterans Administration".

14. **CONSUMER SERVICES:** Counseling on consumer problems such as non-availability of products and services (needed for reconstruction), price gouging, disreputable business concerns and practices, etc. Assistance may be obtained from the State Attorney General's office or other state or local entities.

15. **AGING SERVICES:** Services to meet the needs of the elderly who have been impacted by a declared disaster (i.e. transportation, meals, home care, etc.). Further information is available by contacting the State Division of Elderly Affairs or the local Area Agency on Aging.

16. **ASSISTANCE FROM FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS:** Early withdrawal of time deposits, without penalty, can be permitted by banks that are members of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), Federal Reserve System (FRS), or the Federal Home Loan Bank Board (FHLBB). Contact your financial institution to see if they have obtained a waiver from their regulatory agency.

17. **CRISIS COUNSELING:** Referral services and short-term intervention counseling are available for mental health problems caused or aggravated by the disaster. Contact the State Department of Mental Health or your local mental health agency.

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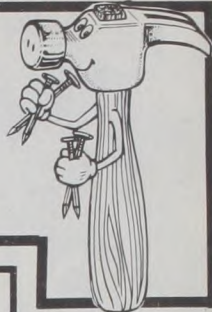

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# County Agent's Report

## Storm Damage

The Muenster, Hood, and Lindsay areas received quite a bit of damage from hail during this past storm. The hail along with the flooded creek bottoms have created some major crop losses in wheat and oat fields. Several questions arise concerning recropping on these destroyed acres. Producers should first consider what herbicide has been applied to this acreage. If Dual or some other milo herbicide was applied on milo acreage, you should first consider the recropping interval following herbicide application. In most instances, it is about four months. However, much of the herbicide has the possibility of being removed out of the planting zone. If you plan to recrop with milo, be sure to use a safened seed on these lost acres. Another consideration if you are thinking about milo planting is the late harvest date that these newly planted acres will have. Seldom do we make high yields on milo acreage planted late in the year. There are a lot of problems with late planted milo. These include the sorghum midge which is in Cooke County beginning around the 4th of July. Any time we have late blooming milo after July 4, we can experience sorghum midge problems. Another problem with late planted maize is maturity dates. As the days get shorter in the fall, milo has problems maturing and, in some instances, it takes a good frost in order to ripen the grain.

Some producers are considering plantings in hauled out wheat and oat acreage. Again, check for the herbicide that was used on this land. Herbicides like Glean and Ally have extremely long recropping intervals but here again, we have the excessive amount of moisture this winter and spring that has possibly leached some of this herbicide residue from the growing zone of the plants. Remember, this is only a possibility and producers should read and follow all label instructions which include recropping intervals. Other possibilities for recropping into lost acreage would include no

tilling, sudan or some other type of hay crop. Hay crops are also very susceptible to herbicide residue.

1989 has certainly been a year of surprises and county yield averages will reflect these losses. We experienced killing freezes in February and March, then again while small grains were in the boot. We had insect damage from Hessian flies this year and now the hail and flood. Hopefully, next year will prove positive for producers in the county.

## Ag Census Data

Early data from the 1987 Census of Agriculture show that Texas had 188,788 farms based on \$1,000 or more in sales of agricultural products.

Of the total number of farms, 68,792 had annual product sales of \$10,000 or more.

Census data also showed that land in farms in Texas totaled 130,502,792 acres. Eighty-five percent of this land was on farms with \$10,000 or more in sales.

The 1987 census showed that Texas farmers and ranchers sold \$10.54 billion in agricultural products and that farms with \$10,000 or more in sales averaged \$147,748 per farm.

Data also showed that \$2.96 billion or 28 percent of total agricultural sales were for crops while \$7.58 billion or 72 percent came from the sale of livestock and poultry and their products.

Census information comes from all identified farm and ranch operations in the United States. The Census Bureau defines a farm as any place where \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were produced and sold or normally would have been sold during the census year. Sampling is used to collect data for selected items and to account for nonresponding farm operations.

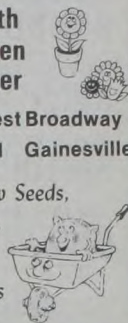
seventh grader. Debnam was selected from some 30 applications for the position.

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## Brazos Elec. requests rate reduction

The Public Utility Commission last week unanimously approved Brazos Electric Cooperative's request for a \$23 million rate reduction effective April 1. The commission also approved the Cooperative's request of a temporary rate reduction for December 1988 through March 1989 which meant \$10 million in credits for the utility's wholesale customers.

The \$23 million rate reduction means end consumers will see an average reduction of \$5.60 per 1000 kilowatt hours for the permanent reduction on or about June 1. Since January 1983, the Waco-based cooperative has reduced the average cost of its wholesale electric power by more than 18 percent.

"Brazos Electric Cooperative has carefully studied our rate structures with two goals in mind," Executive Vice President and General Manager Richard E. McCaskill said. "While we always work to maintain our Cooperative's financial strength, we also continuously look for opportunities to pass on savings to our customers," he said. "In the cooperative business, our customers are our strength and we keep them foremost in our minds."

Brazos Electric Cooperative is a member-owned generation and transmission electric cooperative based in Waco. It provides wholesale electric power to 20 member cooperatives, seven municipal electric systems and Texas A&M University. The electric cooperatives include Bartlett, B-K, Belfalls, Comanche County, Cooke County, Denton County, Dickens, Erath County, Fort Belknap, Gate City, Hamilton County, Hill County, J-A-C, Johnson County, McLennan County, Mid-South, Navarro County, Navasota Valley, Tri-County, and Wise. Municipal systems served by Brazos Electric Cooperative are: Bartlett, Granbury, Hearne, Sanger, Seymour, Weatherford, and Whitesboro. These systems serve 240,000 consumers in a 66-county area of central and north Texas.
