



BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MUENSTER, TEXAS:

That the Street Rental Ordinance passed and approved by the City Council on July 17, 1944, be amended in the following respects: 1. That the words "June 30th" be inserted in lieu of the words

'August 1st" in the last line of Sec. 1 of said Ordinance, so that hereafter said section 1 shall read as follows:

"Sec. 1: All persons, associations, organizations and corporations engaged in furnishing electric light or power, and engaged in furnishing gas to the inhabitants of the City of Muenster. Texas, and owning, operating, using, managing or controlling any electric light poles, conduits, wires, gas pipe lines, pipes and other fixtures, in any of the streets, highways, easements, alleys, parks, or other public places within the City of Muenster, Texas, shall on the 1st day of August, 1944, and on the 1st day of August of each year thereafter. file with the City Secretary a sworn report showing the gross receipts from such business conducted by such persons, associations, organizations and corporations within the corporate limits of the said City for the preceding year ending June 30th.'

That the following Sec. 5-a hall be added to said Ordinance immediately between Sections 5 and 6 thereof, as follows:
