### Kristy Krebs brings home the "gold"

Lindsay High School junior Kristy Krebs set a new school record at the UIL State track meet in Austin last week, bringing home a state championship. Kristy finished the 400m dash with a winning time of 58.2. This was her third year to compete at the state meet. Kristy also was a leg on this year's state qualifying 400m and 1600m relays.

The 1600m relay, ran by Felicia Hellinger, Melanie Anderson, Cassandra Fuhrmann and Krebs finished fourth at the state meet, setting a new school record of 4:07.0.

Felicia Hellinger qualified for the state meet four years. She finished 6th in the 300m hurdles, her first year to run the hurdles, with a time of 49.0. Felicia holds school records in the long jump, 300 hurdles, 400m relay and the 1600m relay.

The 400m relay team of Julie Fuhrmann, Cassandra Fuhrmann, Hellinger and Krebs had an unofficial time of 52.06. "The girls didn't have their best hand-off," said Coach George Thomason.

This was senior Julie Fuhrmann's second trip to state, being a member of last year's 1600m relay team that finished 6th and part of last year's school record setting 400m relay team.

### Yancy Culp takes third in State Track

Muenster High School was well represented in the State Track Meet in Austin by Yancy Culp. Yancy qualified for the prestigious competition by finishing second in Regional competition in the 1600m run, with a time of 4:39.01. The top eight Class A milers assembled in Austin, at the University of Texas, to compete for the title. Yancy carried a personal best of 4:36.23 for the distance.

In front of a crowd of over 20,000, the race began around 10:00 p.m. Saturday evening. Yancy finished the first lap near the rear of the pack, but began to move up in the second lap. Going into the final lap, Yancy began his spring 300 meters from the finish. He passed a couple of runners in the back straight and gained ground on the two leaders all the way to the finish. He finished with a new personal best of 4:32.91.

"Yank made us all proud," said Hornet Coach Bill Jump. "He ran an excellent race. We were all glad for him and shared in his excitement as he climbed onto the awards stand. He is an outstanding young man and we will be hearing more of his track success stories in the future."

Yancy's time of 4:32.91 ranks him up there with some of the top milers in Muenster history. Dale Schilling, John Bartush, and Ronnie Hess all ran times in the low 4:30's. Yancy Culp has etched his name among those as one of Muenster's best.

## Muenster School District hires Jerry Metzler as new high school principal

Jerry Metzler will become the new principal of the junior high and high school for the Muenster school district, officials confirmed this week.

Metzler, 33, has resigned his position as principal at Gainesville State School, effective at the end of the school year. He is expected to begin his duties at Muenster in August. He was selected from among 70 applicants for the position, officials said.

Metzler, a Lindsay native, is no stranger to the area, and that was one of the factors in picking him for the job, said new Muenster Superintendent Steve Cooper. "I just think he's got a proven record of leadership," said Cooper. "It was important that we could find a qualified person who was familiar with the Muenster area and the community," he said.

Other factors in Metzler's selection were his academic record, the

importance of discipline to a school system, the ability to guide the system through all the state mandates, as well as the ability to motivate staff and students, Cooper said. "I think he's very

knowledgeable and possesses the skills to provide that kind of leadership," he said.

A 1974 graduate of Lindsay High School, Metzler received his bachelor's degree with a major in English and secondary certification from the University of North Texas. He taught English for one year at Valley View and for one year at Callisburg. He then moved to Denton, where he lived for four years, and worked as a teacher at Strickland Junior High School. He served as assistant principal there for one year.

Metzler went back to school and earned his masters degree in education administration in 1981. He then moved to Austin where he spent one year teaching a classroom discipline management program at Southwest Texas State University. He then became an administrative assistant to the superintendent in the Del Valle ISD near Austin, a position he

held for three years.

Metzler returned to Cooke County in April 1987, when he became principal at Gainesville State School. He looks forward to becoming a part of the Muenster school system.

"When we moved back here, I was looking to get back into the public school system," said Metzler. "I think Muenster provides the stable community that I've been looking for," he said. "The parents attend the school, then they grow up and support their kids. They have high expectations for their kids, and that's what I want to be a part of. That's what makes a good school."

Metzler considers the fact that he has been in the classroom as a teacher an asset. "My teaching experience has helped me, but I've also worked with a lot of different types of kids," he said. "I've worked with kids who have need-

From visiting over a game such as dominoes or bingo, to sharing a

musical or artistic talent, to giving facials, volunteers come to spend time with the special people who reside at St. Richard's Villa.

Bingo is an especially favored pastime and it is scheduled every Wednesday and made possible by members of the St. Anne's Society in Muenster. The game is also sponsored at various other times by different groups.

Golda Lones of Gainesville takes pleasure in planning arts and crafts projects to share with the residents each month.

The religious needs of those residing at St. Richard's are attended to when area clergy take time to conduct services there and Caroline Hess comes daily to lead the rosary service.

**Muenster School does well on TEAMS tests**

The Muenster school district has again performed well in the annual Texas Assessment of Minimum Skills Test (TEAMS).

The TEAMS test is a state-mandated test given annually in reading, math and writing to students in grades 3, 5, 7, 9 and an exit-level test for grade 11. The 11th-grade results were reported earlier.

"One thing that we're really proud of this time is our writing scores," said Superintendent Charles Coffey. Of the 28 ninth-graders taking the test, 22 scored a perfect 4, while five students scored a 3, he said.

Of the 21 students taking the third-grade test, 100 percent mastered both the math and writing sections, while 95 percent mastered the reading.

Of the 20 fifth-grade students, 100 percent mastered the math and reading, while 95 percent mastered the writing.

Of the 26 seventh-grade

students, 100 percent mastered the math and reading, while 96 percent mastered the writing.

Of the 28 ninth-graders tested, 100 percent mastered all three areas.

In other business during the board's regular May meeting, the newly re-elected school board members received their oath of office, and returns from the May 7 election were canvassed.

The board voted to:  
-Hire Carol Klement effective May 15, as the new secretary to the superintendent.

-Appointed new superintendent Steve Cooper as the district's representative to the Region 11 service center.

-Voted against allowing a discount for early payment of property taxes, the same policy as in years past.

-Voted to move the collection of district property taxes from the tax assessor-collector's office back to the Cooke County Appraisal District effective Oct. 1.

**Cable franchise delay causes TNN move**

The Nashville Network which had been carried on channel 15 on the Muenster cable system has now been moved to channel 23. Delays caused by tower controversy and franchise renewal, which have caused the delayed system rebuild, in turn have caused the Muenster system not to be ready for stricter FCC rules. These rules regard signals leaking out of the cable system, especially in the critical aeronautical frequencies that are used by airline pilots landing at D/FW Airport. Channel 15 falls in these critical frequencies. Airline pilots are complaining about interference in the Cooke-Wise County area. Moving TNN is a precaution taken to make sure that no leakage occurs from our system into these critical frequencies while we wait for the franchise extension and planned improvements to the system.

The quality of channel 23 may not be the same on your TV as channel 15 was, since the present cable system is designed to carry

up to channel 22 only. At the present time, our options are to carry the TNN program on 23 or take it off of the system.

Cable ready sets should have no problem in receiving channel 23. Some television sets may need fine tuning. Older sets not designed to receive channel 23 will need a converter. Channel 23 is not trapped on the cable system and should be available to all subscribers.

Channels 14, 15 and 16 will be used again when the Muenster system has been rebuilt. Improvements will be made as soon as a satisfactory franchise renewal has been negotiated with the city. Improvements will include a 20 channel basic, with a weather channel and weather forecast. A poll of subscribers will determine which channels will be added. The first phase of these improvements was nearing completion in 1987 when work was stopped due to the tower controversy. When completed, these improvements will result in more channels of television and improved picture quality.

**Accident claims victim**

Funeral services were held Wednesday for a 25-year-old Cooke County man who died early Sunday from injuries he received when a bull stepped on him during competition at the 33rd Annual Forestburg FFA rodeo.

Jeff Dumas of the Mountain Springs community in eastern Cooke County, was pronounced dead at about 12:25 a.m. at Muenster Memorial Hospital by Justice of the Peace Dorothy Smith. The accident occurred at the small outdoor arena in Forestburg about 10:30 p.m., officials said.

Dumas was participating in the bull riding competition and was one of the last competitors to ride, said Smith. He apparently died from a lacerated liver, she said.

While sponsored by the Future Farmers of America, the Forestburg rodeo is open for all ages, and featured about 175 competitors in a variety of rodeo events. It was the first fatality at the rodeo in its 33-year history, said producers.

Dumas was born June 30, 1964 in Lawrence, Kan. He was a 1983 graduate of Valley View High School. While in high school, he received the school's first Eagle Spirit Award. He was a four-year letterman in three sports, and during one district track meet, scored more points as an individual than did the team which placed second.

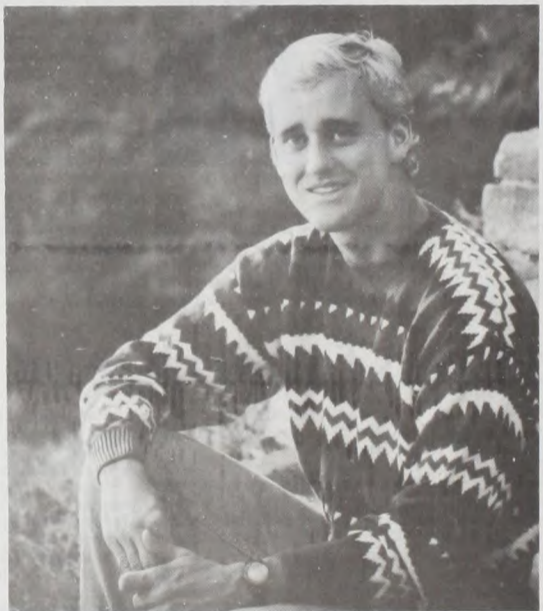
He was a former paramedic, but had withdrawn from that job after his older brother, Brett Dumas, suffered head injuries in a traffic accident about four years ago, his father, Curtis Dumas, said in an article for the **Fort Worth Star-Telegram**. Dumas had competed mostly in North Texas and

Oklahoma rodeos, and had been a top contender at a small arena inside Billy Bob's Texas in the Fort Worth Stockyards during the club's heyday, he said.

He was a member of the Church of Christ. Burial was in New Hope Cemetery in Cooke County. Vernie Keel Funeral Home in Gainesville was in charge of arrangements.

Survivors of Jeff Dumas include his parents, Curtis and Vi Dumas of Mountain Springs; one brother, Brett Dumas of Fort Worth; one sister, Laurie Kuykendall of Gainesville; his grandmother, Lula Winn of Irving; two nieces, one nephew; and several aunts and uncles. He is also survived by his fiancée, Cindy Neu of Gainesville.

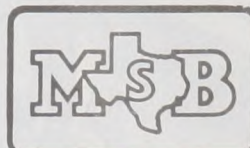

## Lindsay Council gives franchise another chance

The Lindsay City Council has decided to give the company which holds the city's franchise just one more chance to improve service before attempting to sever ties and contract with a new company.

Following a two-hour discussion with representatives of WGA Cable Company of Houston, the council decided to give the company 60 days to make all corrections necessary to the city's cable service. Customers have been complaining about poor service and poor reception, and the council has been attempting to look for options in obtaining better service.

The council discussed seven areas of concern about service, and agreed that four have been corrected by the company. Should the company not meet the

deadline in making the corrections, the council will ask the company to voluntarily withdraw its franchise. The city is awaiting word from the company's attorney on the proposal, officials said.

"We seem to have their attention now," said councilman Don Metzler. "There seems to be some improvements since we've talked with them, but we want to emphasize that people should not hesitate to call the company if they are experiencing any problems with reception," he said.

Metzler said customers may call a toll-free number (800) 962-5271 if they have any problems. They should give their name, address, phone number, and state the problem.

In other business, the council canvassed the votes from the May 7 election and swore in the newly-elected members. Doyle Cogburn is new mayor, incumbents Manley Taylor and Wilbert Block will serve two-year terms, and Don Metzler will serve a one-year unexpired term.

In other matters, the council: -Granted Cole and Smithen a 45-day extension until July 2 to finish the street-paving project because of bad weather days. The council approved a \$23,975 first payment for work that has been completed and approved by the engineer.

-Arranged with the Cooke County Sheriff's Department to provide the city with police protection for the months of May and June while the city's police chief is on medical leave. Residents should call the department at 665-3471 if they need help.

-Formally accepted the deed to Knight Drive from the Lindsay ISD.



## Farmers may qualify for disaster aid now

Farmers, ranchers and aquaculture operators in 76 Texas counties may qualify for low interest loans and grants to help them recover from the severe Spring storms, flooding and tornadoes.

With President Bush's May 2 disaster declaration, special assistance becomes available in 29 declared counties and all adjoining counties through the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

"Our initial assessment indicates interests in addition to losses suffered by individuals and business owners and damage to public property," Brad Harris, Region 6 Director for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), said recently.

FmHA Texas State Director Neal S. Johnson urged farmers in declared and adjoining counties to contact their county FmHA supervisor if they have production or physical losses and are unable to obtain credit elsewhere.

FmHA loans may be used to restore or replace damaged property, cover production losses, delinquent debt installments, help with family living expenses, repair or replace essential buildings and machinery and refinance debt.

Applicants may qualify for loans covering 80 percent of production loss or 100 percent of actual physical loss but not to exceed \$500,000. Loans are at 4.5 percent interest and must be secured. The term normally is seven years but

may vary depending on the type of loan.

"As a rule, loss of production should be 30 percent of more for eligibility," Johnson said, "however, farmers with losses should check with the FmHA county supervisor for a determination."

ASCS Texas State Executive Director Terry Harman said ASCS has a number of programs to help farmers and ranchers in the event of a natural disaster.

The Emergency Conservation Program allows ASCS to share in the cost of rehabilitating farmland, including reshaping for erosion control, debris removal, fence repair and restoring structures.

Ranchers may be allowed to graze livestock or cut hay on ASCS cropland and purchase necessary grain at 50 percent of the posted county price.

Under the Emergency Feed Program, ASCS may pay half the cost of replacement feed for livestock owners who lost 40 percent of their feed crop as a result of the disaster.

Harman said eligibility for assistance programs is determined on an individual basis by ASCS county committees and that producers should contact ASCS offices in their counties.

Declared counties include Collin, Cooke, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Fannin, Grayson, Hood, Johnson, Kaufman, Parker, Tarrant and Wise.

## County Agent's Report

by Craig Rosenbaum

Grazing is becoming an important part of small grain production in Cooke County. Forage yields vary greatly on various varieties of soft and hard wheats. During the past several years Dr. David Marshall, Research Plant Breeder at the Texas A&M Center at Dallas, has been collecting forage yields on the various varieties of wheat on the market and on new experimental lines of wheat. The following chart shows forage yields for 89-90 on the trials at the Prosper Research Station.

In selecting wheat varieties for forage production, producers need to be aware of the growing

season that the small grain will be utilized as forage for cattle. Those varieties that produce in the winter months are going to be more beneficial in a grazing program. We also need to look at yield data of grain in the varieties.

Due to the dry fall, there was little to no forage production for the January clipping date. This was due to the lack of moisture in germinating the wheat. Therefore, most of the clippings were taken in February and March. If you have any questions about any of the varieties listed, give Craig Rosenbaum a call at the County Extension Office.
