Yancy qualified for the prestigious competition by finishing second in Regional competition in the 1600m run, with a time of 4:39.01. The top eight Class A milers assembled in Austin, at the University of Texas, to compete for the title. Yancy carried a per-sonal best of 4:36.23 for the distance. distance

Cable franchise delay causes TNN move by Alvin M. Fuhrman

The Nashville Network which had been carried on channel 15 on the Muenster cable system has now been moved to channel 23. now been moved to channel 23. Delays caused by tower controver-sy and franchise renewal, which have caused the delayed system rebuild, in turn have caused the Muenster system not to be ready for stricter FCC rules. These rules regard signals leaking out of the cable system, especially in the critical aeronautical frequencies that are used by airline pilots lancritical aeronautical frequencies that are used by airline pilots lan-ding at D/FW Airport. Channel 15 falls in these critical frequen-cies. Airline pilots are complain-ing about interference in the Cooke-Wise County area. Moving TNN is a precaution taken to make sure that no leakage occurs from our system into these critical from our system into these critical

frequencies while we wait for the frequencies while we wait for the franchise extension and planned improvements to the system. The quality of channel 23 may not be the same on your TV as not be the same on your TV as channel 15 was, since the present cable system is designed to carry

up to channel 22 only. At the pre-sent time, our options are to carry the TNN program on 23 or take it off of the system.

the TNN program on 23 or take it off of the system. Cable ready sets should have no problem in receiving channel 23. Some television sets may need fine treceive channel 23 will need a con-verter. Channel 23 will need a con-verter. Channel 23 is not trapped on the cable system and should be available to all subscribers. Channels 14, 15 and 16 will be used again when the Muenster system has been rebuilt. Im-provements will be made as soon as a satisfactory franchise renewal has been negotiated with the city. Improvements will include a 20 channel basic, with a weather channel and weather forecast. A poll of subscribers will determine which channels will be added. The first phase of these improvements was nearing completion in 1987 when work was stopped due to the tower controversy. When com-pleted, these improvements will result in more channels of televi-sion and improved picture quality.

Accident claims victim

by Elaine Schad Funeral services were held Wednesday for a 25-year-old Cooke County man who died ear-ly Sunday from injuries he receiv-de when a bull stepped on him during competition at the 33rd Annual Forestburg FFA rodeo. Iff Dumas of the Mountain Springs community in eastern Cooke County, was pronounced dead at about 12:25 a.m. at Muenster Memorial Hospital by Justice of the Peace Dorothy Smith. The accident occurred at the small outdoor arena in forestburg about 10:30 p.m., of-incals said. ficials said

ficials said. Dumas was participating in the bull riding competition and was one of the last competitors to ride, said Smith. He apparently died from a lacerated liver, she said.

While sponsored by the Future Farmers of America, the Forestburg rodeo is open for all ages, and featured about 175 com-petitors in a variety of rodeo events. It was the first fatality at the rodeo in its 33-year history, reid producers. said producers

The TEAMS test is a state mandated test given annually in reading, math and writing to students in grades 3, 5, 7, 9 and an exit-level test for grade 11. With President Bush's May 2 disaster declaration, special assistance becomes available in 29 declared counties and all adjoin-ing counties through the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). "Our initial assessment in-ticates interests in addition to business owners and damage to public property," Brad Harris, Region 6 Director for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), said recently. "That Texas State Director Neal S. Johnson urged farmers in declared and adjoining counties to contact their county FmHA super-visor if they have production or potati elsewher. "FmHA loans may be used to perty, cover production losses, deinquent debt installments, help with family living expenses, repair or replace essential buildings and anchinery and refinance debt. "Applicants may qualify for loans covering 80 percent of pro-duction loss or 100 percent of ac-tual physical loss but not to exceed \$500,000. ASCS Texas State Executive Director Terry Harman said ASCS has a number of programs to help farmers and ranchers in the event of a natural disaster. The Emergency Conservation Program allows ASCS to share in the cost of rehabilitating

the cost of rehabilitating farmland, including reshaping for erosion control, debris removal, fence repair and restoring structures.

Ranchers may be allowed to graze livestock or cut hay on ASCS cropland and purchase necessary grain at 50 percent of the posted county price. Under the Emergency Feed Pro-gram, ASCS may pay half the cost of replacement feed for livestock owners who lost 40 percent of their feed crop as a result of the disaster.

Harman said eligibility Harman said eligibility for assistance programs is determined on an individual basis by ASCS county committees and that pro-ducers should contact ASCS of-fices in their counties. Declared counties include Col-lin, Cooke, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Fannin, Grayson, Hood, Johnson, Kaufman, Parker, Tar-rant and Wise.
