Muenster Farm Mutual marks 100 years in business

What started out as a small group effort to band together and make the effects of natural disaster somewhat less devastating for an individual soon prospered. It is now an insurance company in its one hundredth year of business and it is one of Muenster's oldest businesses. Muenster Farm Mutual will celebrate its prosperity on Saturday, Dec. 4 when members are invited to an open house and barbecue lunch from 12 to 2 p.m. Door prizes will be awarded.

Dec. 8, 1893 was when Muenster Farm Mutual was founded. Some of the original members were Henry Henscheid, first president; J. H. Theisen, first secretary; Henry Wilde, E. M. Untereiner, Conrad Walterscheid, John B. Herr, John M. Otto, Henry Huchton, and Frank Hess.

The original plan was for area farmers who were a part of the group to help each other out when one was misfortunate enough to have property damaged by storms or fire. Until 1943 all of the company's

minutes were written in the old German style. After that time they were kept in English.

Things were much simpler in the early days. Dues were collected at church on Sunday mornings. "People were honest and word of mouth was sufficient," said Rhonda Hartman, Muenster Farm Mutual secretary. At one time you had to be a German Catholic to be a member of the group. This is no longer a requirement.

Now the area covered is within a 100 mile radius of Muenster. There are six districts and 1500 members. Districts are #1 Muenster, #2 Lindsay, #3 Henrietta, #4 Electra, #5 Windthorst, and #6 Valley View.

Present officers are Dale Klement, president; Alan Sicking, vice-president; Rhonda Hartman, secretary; Eddie Fleitman, treasurer. Appraisers are Alan Sicking, Walt Klement, Charles Neu, Lawrence Schroeder, Mike Humpert, Howard Handley, John Mann, and Maxi Collins.

In 1988 the company built a public office located at 212 N. Walnut in Muenster. At this time Rhonda Hartman was hired as secretary. She is the fourth generation of the Henscheid family to be an officer of the company.

Rhonda's great-grandfather is Henry Henscheid. Henry's son Albert served as president for the group at one time. Albert's son-in-law Ed Endres worked with the company for many years. Rhonda is Ed's daughter.

Ed Endres took over as secretary of Muenster Farm Mutual in 1966. He worked out of his home until 1988 when the new office was completed. It was at that time that Rhonda began working as secretary. When Mr. Endres retired in 1990 Rhonda took over the position of general secretary.

Muenster Farm Mutual insures against losses of property to hail, wind, storm, fire, lightning, theft and vandalism. The office hours are Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The presentation of awards was made by Jerry F. Wolfe, cooperative program manager, of Fort Worth.

National Weather Service equipment, which is located at the Mosters' home, is used in making official measurements of precipitation. Reports of significant precipitation amounts are phoned to the National Weather Service forecast office where the data is used in preparing flood watches and warnings during turbulent weather periods.

A summary of data collected throughout the month is sent to the Fort Worth Regional Weather

Office where it is processed and forwarded to the National Climatic Data Center in Asheville, North Carolina. There, the data is computer processed, archived and published in the Texas Climatic Data Records.

The volunteer work done by the Mosters and other volunteers across the nation is invaluable in making studies of weather trends and flood control possible.

Council split over federal grant; may withdraw application

A quiet controversy is brewing among members of the Muenster City Council. As more citizens hear the information, or mis-information, they are becoming more vocal. The City has applied for some federal grant money that is doled out each year by the State of Texas. They hope that money will fund construction of a new water well, storage tank, transmission and treatment facilities and engineering. There are differing opinions on what we need and how badly we need the increased water supply.

If Muenster won the grant, and that is certainly not for sure, some council members and citizens fear too much government regulation if we take the money. They even fear that Muenster would have to build a low-rent government housing project and get the problems they are famous for.

Councilwoman Fran Voth says this is absolutely not a possibility because they did not apply for that kind of grant. They did, however, apply for housing rehabilitation loan money and a first-time homeowner assistance program. These because

the consultant enlisted by the City claims it will increase the chances of receiving the water system grant.

Voth says by pushing the grant application, she is only trying to help the City and its citizens. There is no obligation to accept any of the money but, if available, why not use it if we can and save the taxes?

Councilwoman Mary Ann Grant says she has been assured there is no chance of getting a grant anyway because our need is not great enough. Both Grant and Voth agree there is no possibility of public housing units. It was not, and will not be, voted for, they said. The Zoning Board has turned down applications to build multi-family housing by local builders three times in the past for the fears mentioned and opposition of neighbors.

Grant says that she has carefully reviewed the regulations that go with the grants they did apply for and she wants no part of it.

The issue should come to a head at Monday's City Council meeting. They hope local citizens will attend and clear up the questions.

Rollback effort underway in County

It remains to be seen whether enough signatures will be generated to force a countywide rollback vote on Cooke County's 1994 tax rate.

Petition organizers are busy gathering signatures in the final days before an early December deadline for submitting the petition to county officials. Petitions will be available from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. today (Friday) and Saturday at the former H&W Meat Co. building at 1005 South Grand in Gainesville. Those in southern Cooke County who wish to sign the petition can do so by going by the Valley View Senior Citizen Center, on the southwest side of the square in Valley View, from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. today (Friday) and Saturday.

Those wishing to sign the rollback petition are reminded that they must be eligible Cooke County registered voters and must bring their voter card so their registration number can be recorded on the petition as required by state law. Notaries will be available to notarize each signature, which is also mandated by state law. Organizers estimate they need about 1,700 valid signatures, which represents about 10 percent of the eligible voters in the county, in order to place the rollback proposition on the ballot.

Cooke County commissioners in September opened the door to a possible rollback vote when they approved a 26 percent tax increase to fund the county's \$7.2 million budget for fiscal 1994. Voters may petition for a rollback if the tax increase exceeds 8 percent, according to state law. Raising the tax rate to 38 cents means the owner of a \$50,000 home will see a \$50 increase in 1994 county taxes, from \$190 to \$240.

Sales on increase in county

Cooke County continues to show very healthy increases in its business activity according to a second quarter report on state sales and use tax released this week by State Comptroller John Sharp.

Cooke County showed a 31.2 percent jump in gross sales for the second quarter for all industries.

Businesses reporting state sales and use tax increased from 703 to 752 compared to the same reporting period for 1992. Gross sales for the second quarter of 1993 were \$110.3 million, a 31.2 percent increase from the \$84 million in gross sales reported for the same quarter in 1992 for all industry. About \$36.9 million was reported for the second quarter for all industries. See SALES TAX, Page 2

Bierschenk said that the Jan. 8 date was selected for the benefit of college students who would still be home for the holidays since they are often faced with the issue of abortion on college campuses.

Mark Crutcher developed and conducts the Life Activist Seminar as an event designed to teach the pro-life community how to sell its position to the American people, and defend it against attack. He wrote and published the workbook used in the seminar. A columnist,

most recently Crutcher has written for Focus of the Family's "Citizen" magazine, and the Christian American newspaper.

To date this program has been sponsored by more than 500 pro-life and pro-family groups in 29 states and Canada. Last year Mr. Crutcher gave 40 seminars. Crutcher's policy has always been that if any attendee says the seminar is not worth the price, all they have to do is hand in their workbook and their admission price will be fully refunded.

The seminar begins at 8 a.m. and ends at 5:30 p.m. There will be a short break in the morning and another in the afternoon. Lunch is from 12 to 1 p.m.

Finnell to participate in interactive video classes

State Rep. Charles Finnell is scheduled to visit the North Texas Educational Network on Thursday, Dec. 7, and take part in a reading course instruction that links classrooms in two northwest Texas counties through an interactive video system.

The classes are in Montague and Cooke counties. Montague is a part of the 13-county 68th House District Finnell represents. Alvin M. Fuhrman, who pioneered the North Texas Educational Network over which the two-way television classes are beamed, said Finnell would speak and interact with teachers and students in a Muenster

ISD classroom he will visit and simultaneously in a Forestburg ISD classroom some 30 fiber-optic miles away.

It was legislation authored by Finnell in the regular session of the 73rd Legislature that established a way for the state to allocate private and federal grant monies to school districts which want to start courses utilizing fiber-optic based interactive television.

This allows pupils in separate classrooms to take courses from one teacher. With this new system, students in the remote classroom also can ask questions and have their teacher respond.

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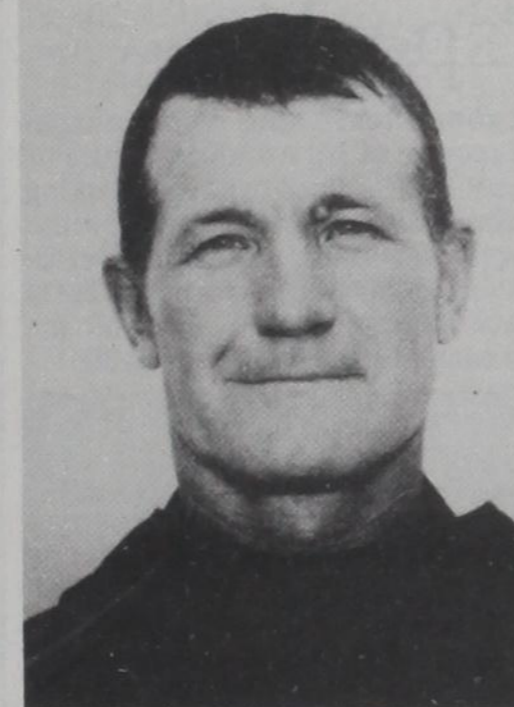

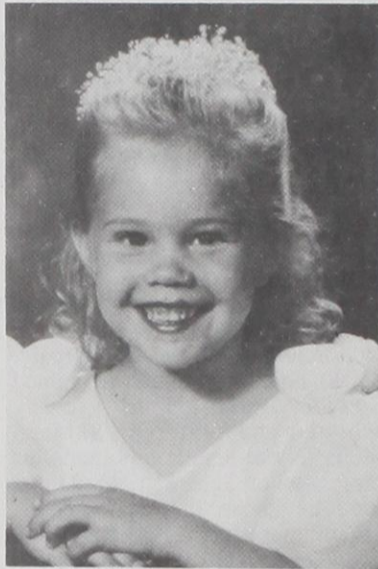

Men's Prayer Breakfast to hear guest speaker

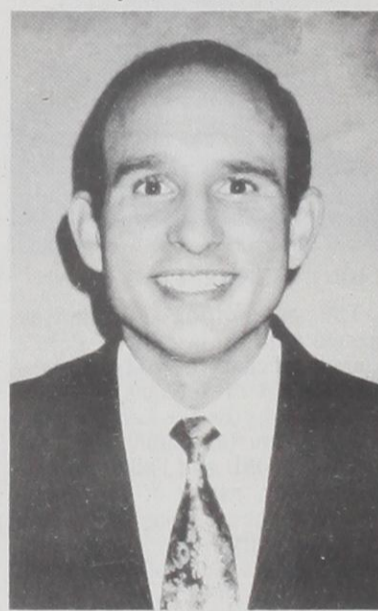

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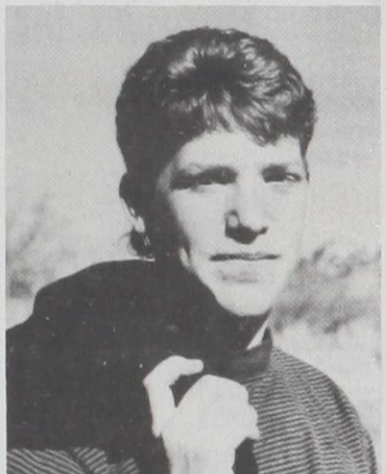
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Sacred Heart Student Council originates S.W.E.L.L. Days

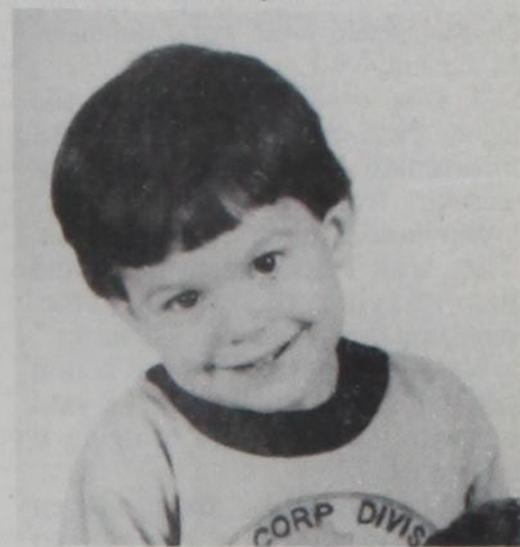

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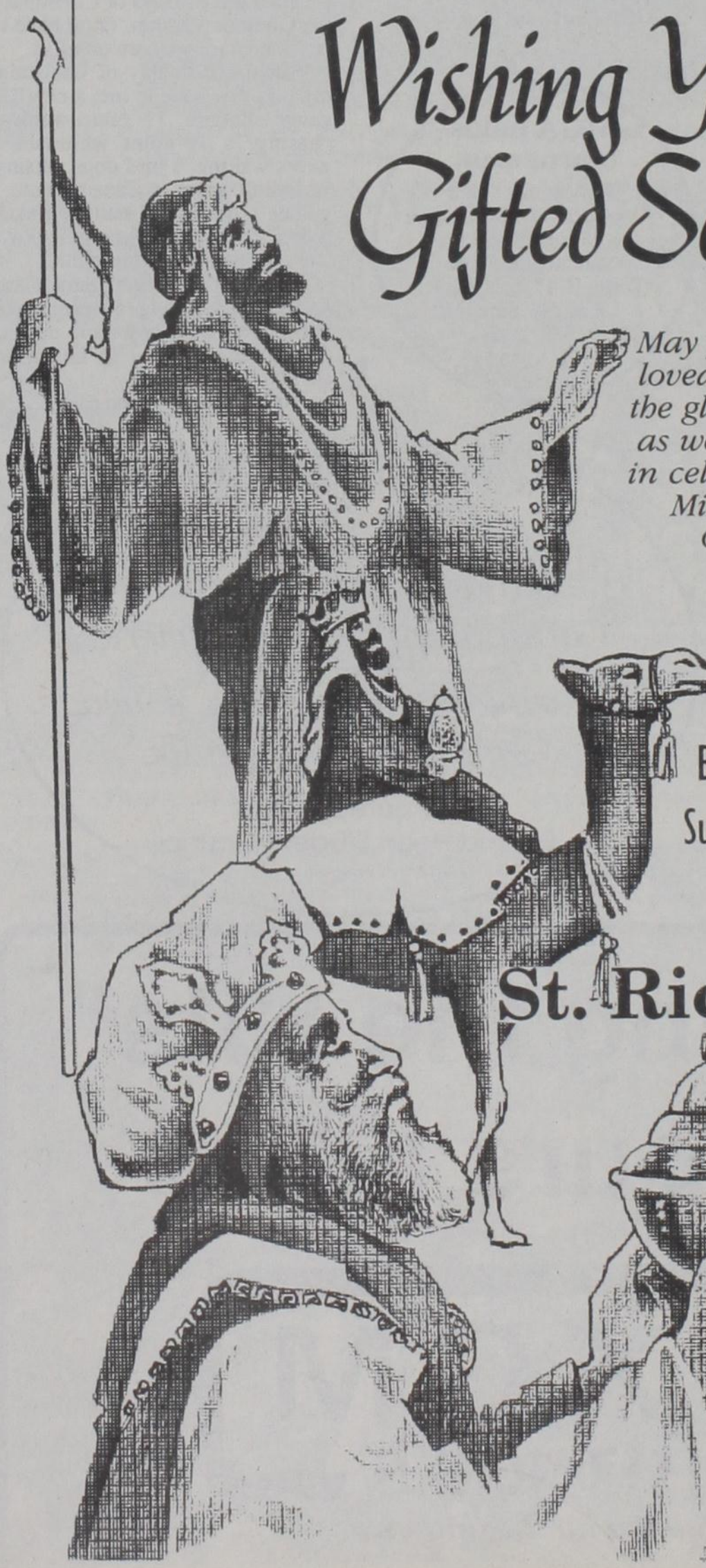

Tax Talk

 This week's topic is depletion. Investors in oil and gas producing properties are able to claim a deduction for the depletion of natural resources removed from the ground. The depletion deduction represents an allowance for the reduction in the contents of the reserves from which the natural resources are taken.
 The depletion deduction is thus similar to the depreciation deduction that is permitted for certain assets. Further, percentage depletion is available for independent producers and royalty owners and may be claimed even after the cost of the resource has been fully depleted. As with the depreciation deduction, the depletion deduction acts to offset gross income.

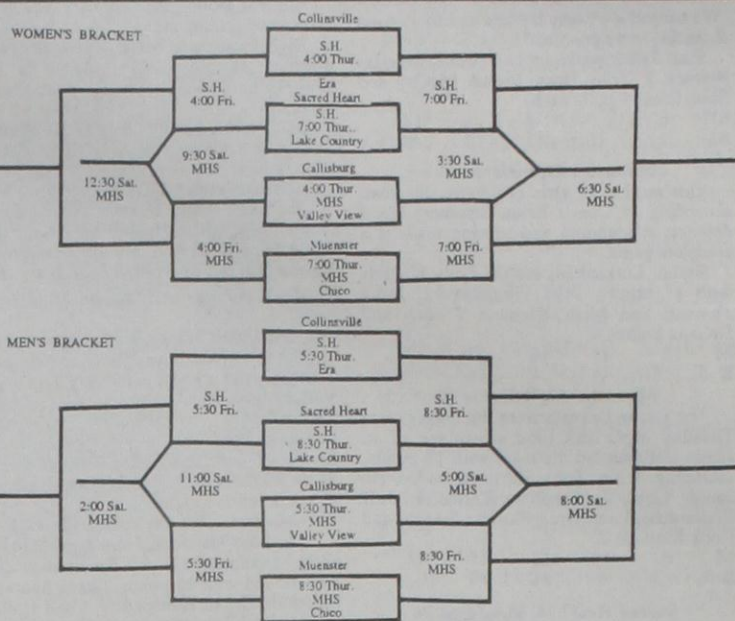

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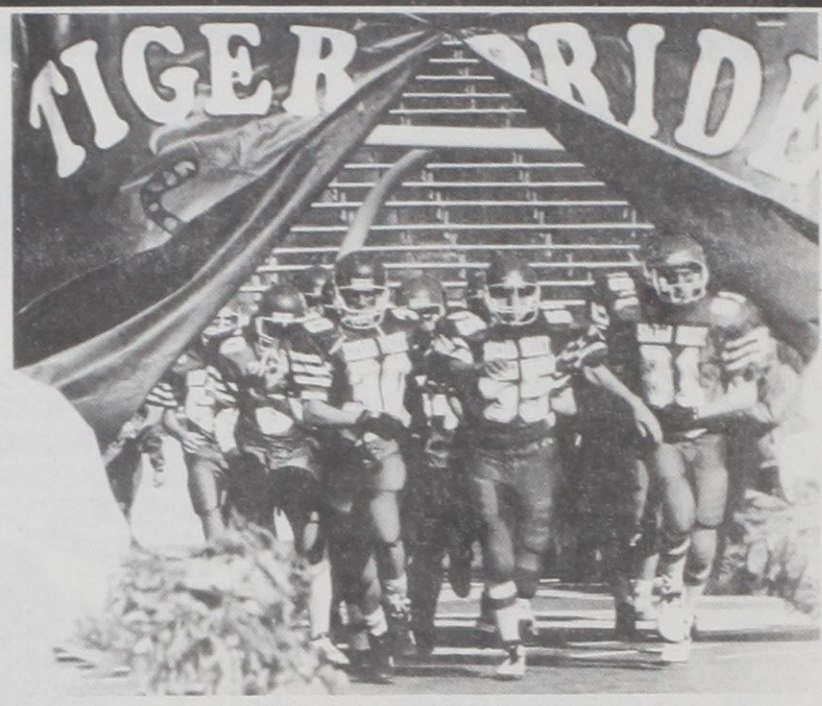

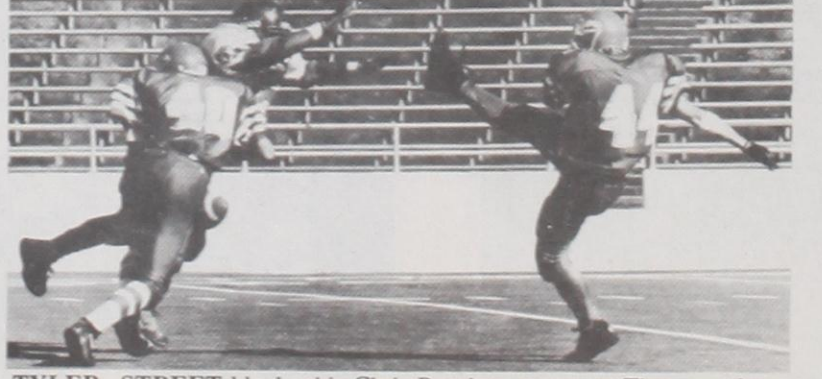

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Lindsay falls to Gunter in state playoff

The Knights of Lindsay took on the #1 state-ranked Class 1A football team on Friday, Nov. 19, in the Regional III Area playoffs. But the Gunter Tigers proved to be too much for the Knights, handing Lindsay a 35-13 loss at Bearcat Stadium in Sherman.

"The team played well, I wasn't disappointed," commented Coach Charlie Meurer. "We were outmatched physically. WE hung in and played, but got beat by a better team."

Lindsay took the opening kick to their 33-yard line. Jeff Hale and Shane Huchton exchanged 11 runs to the Tigers' 28-yard line, where the Knights failed to get the needed yards. Gunter's offense took over. Two plays later, Joe Westman broke downfield for a 68-yard touchdown run. The point after was good and, with 6:30 on the clock, the Tigers had a 7-0 lead.

The Knights' next drive ate on the clock. Huchton, Dan Zimmerer and Hale carried the ball to the 21-yard line and the 2nd quarter. A Huchton pass to George Lutkenhaus moved the action to the 15-yard line. Jeff Hale then found paydirt for 6 points. Toby Eberhart kicked the extra point to tie the game 7-7 with 11:46 remaining in the period.

Gunter began their next drive on their 18, taking 8 runs to get on the scoreboard again. A fake extra point kick was good for 2 and a 15-7 lead with 9 minutes on the clock.

Lindsay's first bad break came when the Tigers covered their kick on the 42. The Knights' defense, led by Chris Brown and Hale, held Gunter to only 1 yard, forcing a punt.

Again, the Knights' running game controlled the clock with Huchton running the majority of the plays. Once Lindsay crossed over into Tiger territory, their drive ended, forcing a punt. Gunter played out the remaining 98 seconds until halftime.

The black defense, led by Pat Hogan, Hale, Bryan Dulock, Huchton, Eberhart and Shawn Cartwright, held the Tigers to just 7 yards in the first drive of the 2nd half. After the punt, the Knights' offense went to work on their 22-yard line. Again, Huchton and Hale pounded away on the Gunter defensive line for 13 plays to the 15-yard line. Again, Jeff Hale had the honor of taking the ball into the end zone for the Knights. An attempted 2-point conversion to tie the game failed and Lindsay trailed 15-13 with 5-1/2 minutes on the

clock.

Gunter fought back, their 10th play a 25-yard touchdown pass to Jarrod Martin. The PAT counted for a 22-13 score with 41 seconds on the clock.

Lindsay attempted to control the ball offensively going into the 4th quarter, but couldn't get the needed yards.

Gunter attempted to add more points to their score, but the Knights' defense held the Tigers on 4th down, taking control with 2 minutes on the clock. But, again the drive ended with an intercepted pass and, so the game.

"We had to keep the ball," Meurer said. "But we never got a break the 2nd half."

"The Knights came out a winner, the pride will be there the rest of their lives," concluded the coach.

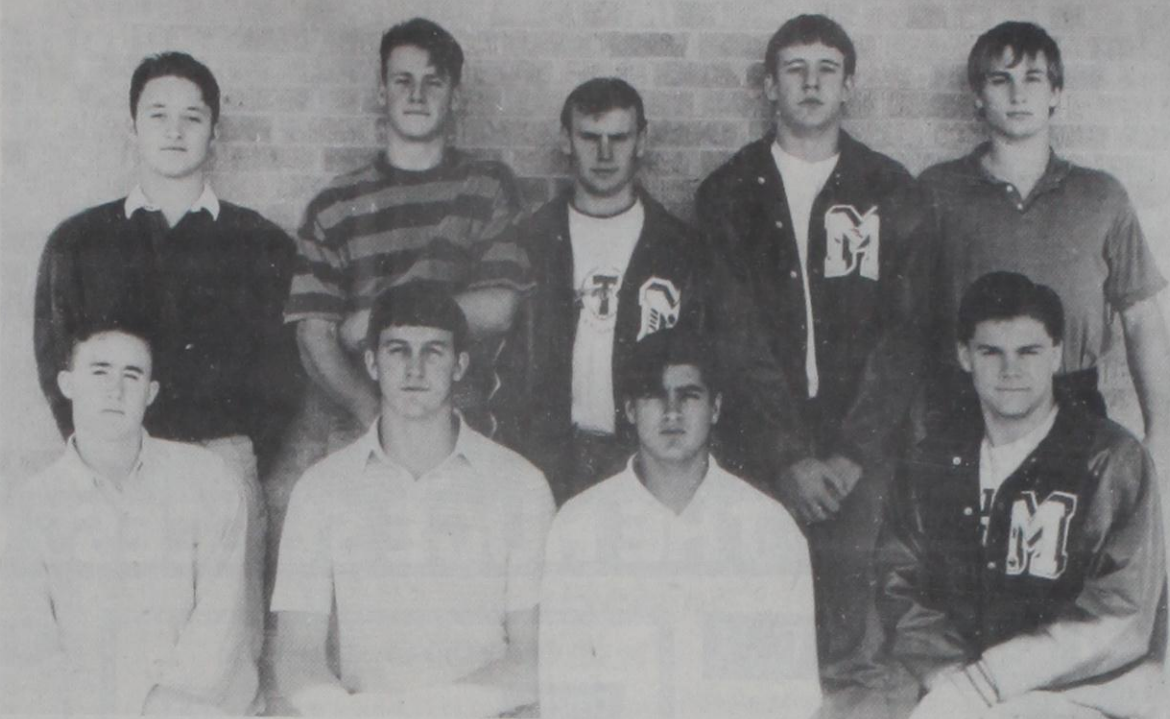

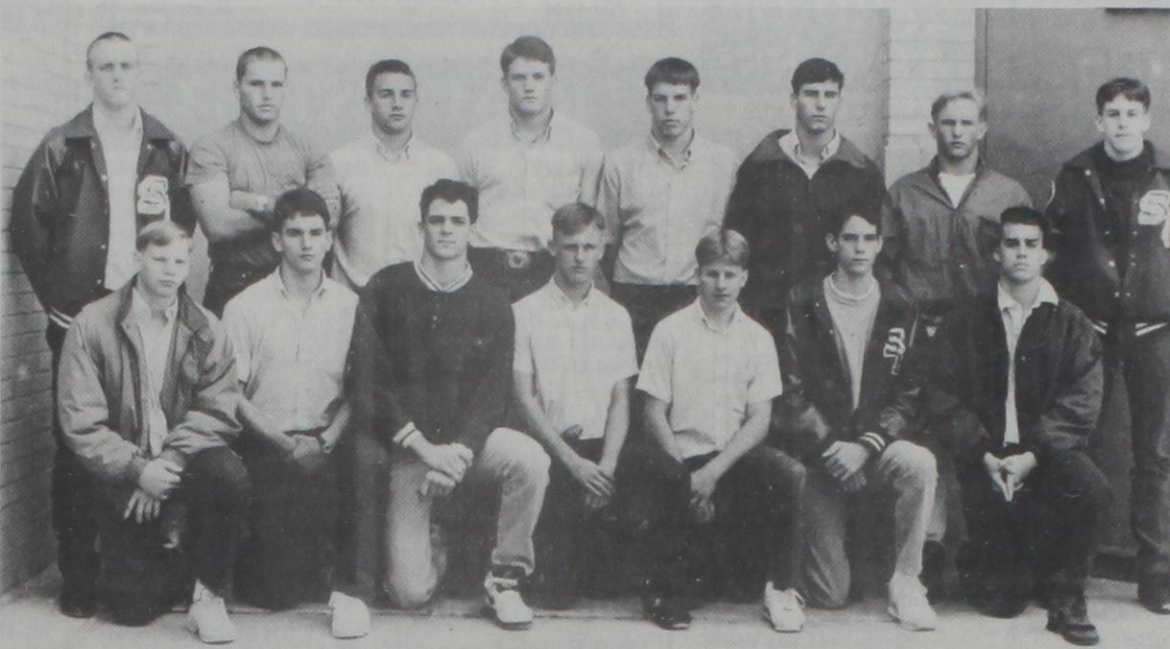

Loans available to Cooke Co. farmers

The Farmers Home Administration has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in Cooke and Denton counties, James B. Murdock, County Supervisor, said recently.

Under this program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged populations group are Hispanics, Native American, African Americans, Asians, Pacific Islanders and Women.

FmHA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an

FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible for a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market, Murdock said.

FmHA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, and advice, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office in their area.

From My Side of the Fence

Many will remember, but many are too young, likely were not yet born, when our town of Muenster was supposed to be without alcoholic beverages, at least according to law.

But the German folk just didn't believe in the prohibition law, which forbade possession of, or the sale of any alcoholic beverages. This is not to say they condoned over-indulgence, but they felt it was every one's right to drink in moderation.

Consequently, Muenster was never a dry town. There were always those who made and sold "home brew", and hard liquor, and home-made wine was often available. During the Depression of the thirties, quite a number of local folk supplemented their meager incomes by entering the liquor trade. Most notable of these was Joe "Jigger Joe" Trachta who became so well-known as a boot-legger that he sometimes received mail addressed only to "Jigger Joe", Muenster, Texas.

I have never known of Joe making booze of any kind, but after the repeal of the Prohibition Act, or 18th Amendment, in 1933, he began a regular trade in beer and liquor, even though Cooke county was legally dry by local option.

Joe once told me he had paid in excess of \$110,000 in fines, but was still making a living. It was surely no rare sight to see a sheriff, and or his deputies, raiding Joe's place and confiscating his supplies.

One late evening I happened to be in Joe's joint when two sheriff's deputies arrived and began searching for liquor. It only took a moment for them to find a rather large amount of beer in Joe's old ice storage room. They immediately began loading cases of the beverage onto a truck they had parked outside, but after a few trips in and out, they soon decided that this was work, which they were not too fond of, and one of them ordered a number of us young men to do the work for them. Well, we really didn't feel we had to follow his orders, but what the heck. We began carrying two cases at a time

onto the truck, but after the first trip, and after noting the truck was not visible from where the deputies were sitting, we, after a short discussion amongst ourselves, began to deposit our loads into any and every car or pickup we could find parked up and down the street.

After the lawmen observed us working diligently for some time, one came out to inspect the loading of the truck, and finding very few cases there, he became irate and pulled his pistol, ordering us anew to put the beer on the truck. Well, we did, but as each of us carried just one case onto the truck, we slipped off into the darkness, found our own cars and went our ways, leaving the angry deputies to fend for themselves.

All in all, it was a pretty satisfying evening.

New sorghum for TX farmers

A new line of grain sorghum that will play as well in Timbuktu as Texas has been released to seed companies by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

"Within three years, there will be widespread planting of sorghum for grain and forage using this line," said Dr. Fred Miller, an Experiment Station scientist who has worked since 1979 to develop the new line, A/BTX638.

Miller said the project sought to develop a line that would be adaptable to most sorghum-growing regions of the world. That helps seed companies reduce inventory costs since it is then unnecessary to stock numerous bags of planting seed intended for specific growing regions.

Agriculture in the News

About 25 to 30 percent of the Texas organic and transitional cotton harvested this year is expected to be sold to Japanese textile mills.

The Texas Department of Agriculture has been selected to train pesticide inspectors in Mexico. Texas and California were chosen for this initiative which is funded by the Environmental Protection Agency. Both states will conduct pesticide training, but Texas will concentrate on problems associated with pesticide drift.

Cattle on feed totaled 8.2 million head in USDA's seven-state report issued Oct. 22. This is the largest number reported since 1978, NCA said. The on-feed figure is up 10 percent from the past year's estimate. Marketings in the seven-state report were up an estimated 102 percent from the past year while placements were down 1 percent.

The American National Cattle Women's brochure is still available. The brochure stresses the importance of cattle by-products in society today. Texas Farm Bureau finished fiscal year 1993 (Oct. 31) with 293,850 members.

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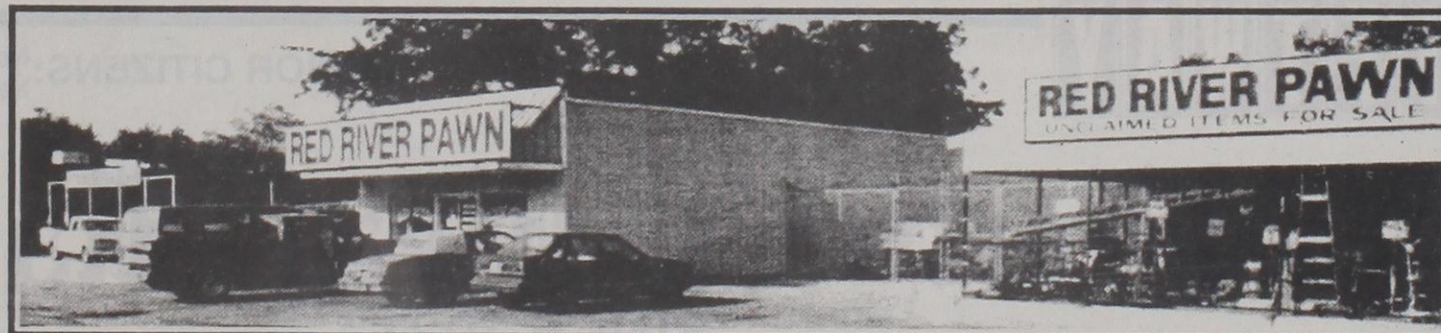
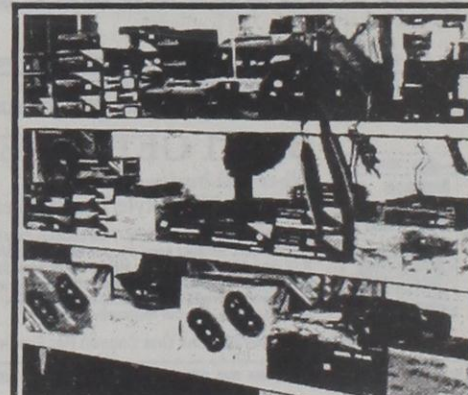
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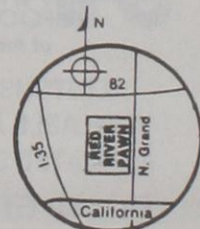
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
