On one of several highly publicized "poverty tours" to promote his election "War on Poverty," President Johnson visited a store in Gainesville, Ga.

The visit was reported as follows by the new society Atlanta Constitution: President Lyndon B. Johnson Friday stood before a decaying shack in a slum neighborhood and listened intently to an elderly Negro's dream of some day building a new store here."

A new Atlanta newspaper, the "Times" printed the other side of the story—which the "Constitution" ignored. The "Times" reported that the "poverty stricken" man, Alvertus J. Butler, had been briefed four times by the Secret Service before JBJ's visit.

Far from being "poverty-stricken" the "Times" discovered that Butler operates a suc-

cessful janitorial service and store. He had provided his children with college educations. He likes to take long vacation trips every other year and has traveled in Canada and Mexico and every state on the mainland except Florida.

The secret of his success, Butler asserts, is "hard work" and he had this to say in answer to a question as to what he thinks of the President's anti-poverty program.

"I don't believe in handout or charity. Charity makes traps, not men. A man can get anything he wants if he just works. I have.

We like this philosophy of Alvertus Butler. It's too bad the President could not have given him a pat on the back and pointed to him as an example of what can be accomplished by hard work, instead of picturing him as "poverty stricken."

Seniors Enter Rush Season

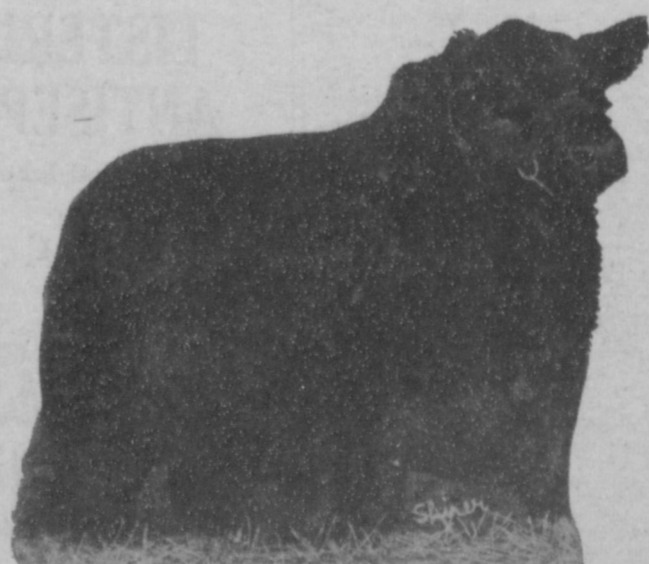
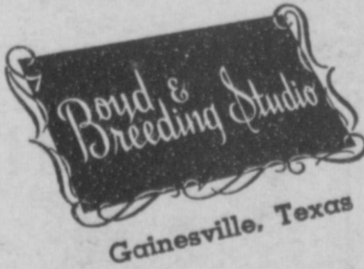

Ten killers are at large in Texas.

These killers aren't bandits or criminals - they are the ten leading causes of Texans' deaths.

The ten leading killers account for a giant share of 82,692 Texans who died in 1963. The latest statistics released by the State Health Department categorize, profile and dissect the leading killers.

This is how they stack up on paper.

Heart disease took the lion's share - one out of every three deaths in the State. National statistics also show the same leading cause of death.

Cancer ranked second, taking 15 per cent of the State's total number of deaths.

Apoplexy - or stroke - is classified as the third most deadly, with 11 per cent of the death total.

Accidents, as the fourth leading killer, claimed 5,999 lives, or seven per cent of the total. Death due to ac-

Pneumonia ranks sixth in the line-up of killers claiming five per cent of the deaths.

General arteriosclerosis, diabetes mellitus and congenital malformations are the seventh, eighth and ninth causes of death, respectively.

Suicide is the tenth leading cause of death. It first ranked tenth in 1958. Deaths from suicide increases in number each year.

The ten leading causes of death and other vital statistics are released yearly by the Health Department's Records and Statistics Section.
