





Formerly regarded as the sacred cow of the welfare state, its deity has been debunked, particularly during the 1964 election. People have become aware that it provides no contract with recipients, that its compulsory nature precludes the term 'social', that the system is completely irresponsible, is not bound by any legal, moral or economic laws, and worst of all is \$300 billion short of the funds necessary to guarantee present members their promised benefits. What happened to all the money they put into it? It was placed in the general fund and spent, creating in essence a double taxation. It has been pointed out that persons putting the same amount of money into private annuities would receive three to four times the benefits, plus loan privileges ahead of time. -Paradise, Calif., Feather River Times.
