> Hoenig Herd Heads **Production Record** In County DHIA

Jerry Hoenig's herd led in DHIA production for Cooke County during the month of August according to the report for that month just released.

Hoenig's 37 cows averaged 1400 pounds of milk and 44 pounds of butterfat to be tops

in both categories. Other honors for the month were divided. Pete Prescher's herd of 24 cows was second in milk production with 1090 pounds and tied with two other herds for second spot in butterfat production. The figure stood at 37 for Prescher, Wilfred Sicking and Paul Fetsch. The Fetsch herd was third in average pounds of milk with 1020. Four herds tied at 28 in butterfat production next highest markup.

Individual honors went to Wilfred Sicking's "Gertie" and Prescher's No. 95 tied for first in butterfat production at 85 pounds. No. 95 was first in test with 4.9 and "Gertie" was second with 4.7. Another cow in the Prescher herd was the champion milk producer for the month chalking up 2390

Eleven herds were tested with a total number of 391 cows in milk. Of these 93 accounted for 50 or more pounds of butterfat. 
