We the people of the United States, regardless of political party affiliation, have a big stake in proceedings at San Francisco this week and next. The Republican convention this year takes on special importance because it will decide whether conservatism will get its long awaited opportunity for a comeback in government.

There will be two vital contests, the first of which is just getting started as this is written. This one will decide the party platform. The next one will decide the two nominees to head the GOP ticket in November.

Judging from the number of delegates lined up for Senator Goldwater, one would think that the convention should be a mere formality and that Governor Scranton is only wasting time. In fact, some observers are convinced that Scranton supporters don't expect to win this tussle but are more interested in an early start for 1968.

That's plausible. However, it is also plausible that Scranton and the other liberals are taking this means to enhance their influence in platform discussions. Obviously while refusing to concede the nomination they claim a right to help shape the party policies. It's a last ditch effort to get liberal ideas in the platform as well as a faint chance to get a liberal man on the platform. We can imagine that some liberal success this week might improve liberal chances next week.

So, in spite of Goldwater's impressive lead, the convention is not a cut and dried affair. An upset is still possible, as in 1952 when Taft was the strong favorite but Eisenhower won the nomination. However an upset seems less likely this time, first because Goldwater has a bigger lead, second because the opposition has no man of sufficient popularity. Besides, it is probable that conservatism is better organized now than it was then.

In view of such factors it appears now that odds favor the conservatives and the convention will select Goldwater as well as a platform he can stand on.

That's as it should be. That is the selection already made by millions of grass roots party members through their preferential primaries and local conventions. In fact, it is highly presumptuous now for the liberal element to assume it has a right to violate the wishes of so many rank and file members. In fairness the convention should abide by the popular decision.

The nation as well as the party has a stake in that element of fairness because Goldwater's nomination will offer voters their first opportunity in many years to vote on principle rather than party label. As we all know, the real issue in government nowadays is conservatism and liberalism. The name of the party in power makes little difference. The principles followed are all important. Many people are aware of that and are ready to forget party names this time in order to vote their convictions. If Goldwater is nominated they will vote only on which party will be privileged to carry on the same old policies.

Scranton and his supporters are preaching that the GOP hasn't a chance this year if it nominates Barry. What baloney! A lot better bet is that the party hasn't a chance without him. He's the only one offering something different. Scranton and others like him are offering only a different name but the same old ideas. He and the others ought to know that voters will not want a mere copy of present policies. Offered that kind of choice they will vote for what they already have.

That isn't the important consideration, however. As far as the general public is concerned, the party name means much less than political principle. Who cares about the names in government? What counts is the kind of thinking in government. To present a mere choice of names without a choice of ideas in an election is a mockery of our sacred heritage. It's like having a one party government.

The American public deserves more than that. It de-

Seven-year-old David Joseph Dillard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Dillard of Amarillo and grandson of Mrs. Oscar Detten of Muenster, drowned in Lake Stockton during a family outing on the Fourth of July. The accident happened about 2 o'clock.

The Dillard family and friends had just finished a picnic lunch. They had been swimming earlier, had removed life jackets from the youngsters for the meal, had warned them not to return to the water.

David, it is believed, went back to the lake to retrieve an inflated inner tube floating near the bank. He was missing from the group less than ten minutes. Mr. Dillard dived in and found his son almost immediately. Artificial respiration failed to revive him.

Mrs. Detten was visiting in Wichita Falls when she received word of the drowning and left immediately Saturday afternoon to be with her daughter and family. Harold Lutkenhaus and Mr. and Mrs. Richard Wilde and son Dale left from here.

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning, 9 a.m. in St. Hyacinth Church, Amarillo with Mass of the Angels celebrated by Father Michael Cavanaugh. Burial was in St. Francis Cemetery.

David Detten was born April 8, 1957. In addition to his parents and grandmother he is survived by two sisters, Vickie 13, and Debra 9, and two brothers, Lonnie 11, and Allen 4, and his great-grandfather Joe Lutkenhaus of Muenster.

## Farmers Asked to Decide on Program For Brucellosis

What to do about brucellosis in Cooke County, was a problem presented to Farm Bureau members at their regular meeting Monday night by County Agent Neil Tibbetts. He said brucellosis control programs are under way in other parts of the state now, and Cooke County farmers should decide soon what to do when their time comes to decide.

It's a strictly voluntary program, he said. Livestock men decide by vote whether they will participate.

Among reports at the meeting: Mrs. Jack Biffle, secretary, said that 67 new members have been added this year and the membership goal is 500 by the end of the year. Members were reminded again of the County FB's annual queen contest to be held late in August.

## Council Orders Ticket for Illegal Parking at Church

Illegal parking at Sacred Heart Church during Sunday services must be discontinued, members of the city council decided at their regular meeting Monday night. Violations they especially mentioned were double parking and parking in front of driveways and fire plugs and at corners so as to obstruct part of the traffic lane at the intersection.

Councilmen pointed out that each offence presented a hazard and instructed City Officer Bill Pratt to crack down on future violations. Tickets he will issue will be courtesy tickets as they have been in the past but real traffic tickets subject to fine.

Drivers are urged not to cheat at parking but to respect the regulations which are intended for the safety and convenience of all. Doing so will save money, may also prevent trouble.

## Dr. Hejduk Will Begin Practice On August 15

An early solution of Muenster's medical problem appears to be definitely in sight. Dr. B. F. Hejduk, here for a visit Wednesday night, submitted his application for admission on the staff of Muenster Memorial Hospital and said that he will begin practice here on August 15.

Another visitor Wednesday night was Dr. Arthur Allison of Stephenville, who said he is not ready to make a definite promise but can be regarded as a strong prospect to come here about October 1. He explained that his present contract expires on that date, so, for a while at least, he prefers not to be obligated. Meanwhile he intends to apply for membership on the hospital staff so that formalities can be completed if and when he decides definitely to come.

In each case the doctor's final decision is subject to acceptance on the hospital's medical staff.

Last week's report in this paper regarding Dr. Hejduk reflected a misunderstanding. His intention was not to move here this week, as stated, but to make a visit and decide definitely before taking a vacation. While here he said that he will be back to begin practice on August 15.

As a result Muenster continues without a local doctor for slightly more than a month. But then the medical situation will be greatly improved and, very likely, it will be further improved about 6 weeks later.

Even now the situation is somewhat better. Dr. Selwyn A. Willis moved to Saint Jo Tuesday and will be available to help with this community's medical needs. At the same time staff members from Gainesville are calling regularly at the hospital.

Administrative personnel and directors of Muenster Hospital are deeply gratified with developments and are looking forward with confidence to a fine standard of medical service for the area.

## State Committee Urges Local Care For Mental Cases

Judge C. L. Abernethy of Plainville leads a statewide committee which is taking a long, hard look at what Texans are doing about mental health problems.

The 112-member citizens committee expects to have its report ready by August. But comments at meetings have indicated strongly that the committee will tell Texans that mental health work should begin in the local community.

Judge Abernethy said the old concept of isolating mental patients far from home is far less effective than treatment in their home towns.

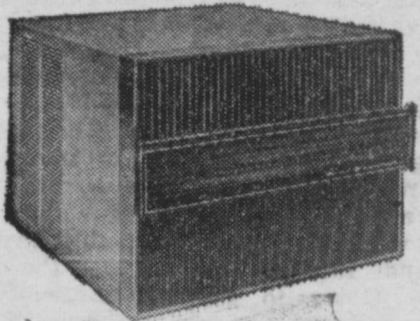
Human Events who reprinted it in the issue of June 22, for permission to present it to our readers at this time. Mr. Ryskind writes:

we can stand just so much guff.

I know something about what the GOP left wing did to Bob Taft. I was one of a group of eight or so, headed by the late Forrest Davis of newspaper fame, who visited Gen. Albert Wedemeyer in 1952 and persuaded him to take a leave of absence from a lucrative post with a New York firm — it meant considerable personal sacrifice to the general — and head up the national Taft campaign.

When I came to Chicago for the convention, I was shown a stack of signed Taft pledges from more than enough delegates to put the senator over on the first ballot. And I was there when the snowballing began: when, in the same week, Ike's picture appeared "spontaneously" on the cover of half a dozen magazines; when the me-too papers began shouting the same sort of stuff about Taft they now spout about Barry Goldwater — "a sure loser." And when the moderates of Henry Cabot Lodge stretched banners across hotel lobbies with Taft's initials and gloated that they spelled "RAT," and when their other signs thundered at one of the most honest men that ever lived, "Thou shalt not steal."

And I was there when the New York delegates pledged to us broke down and wept as they told us Tom Dewey had threatened them with loss of their jobs if they voted for Taft. And I know of even more shameful pressures applied elsewhere by the "moderates" and "progressives" to cheat Mr. Republican out of his due. So don't talk to me about the nobility of this psalm-singing mob: I've seen their stiletos at work, and there was nothing noble about it.

And I think it highly significant that 95 percent of us who were heart and soul for Bob Taft are lined up now with Barry. So go ahead and do your damndest, boys — nothing you attempt will surprise us. Only don't try to wrap yourself in the mantle of Taft — that's one desecration we won't let you get away with.

**IT HAPPENED 25 YEARS AGO**

July 7, 1939

City considers drilling own water well; estimates place cost of installation near \$4,000 and operation at 4 cent a thousand gallons; should pay out in four or five years as average city bills range from \$150 to \$200 per month. City council votes for another try at street illumination. Rev. Frowin Koerdt ended 21 years as Muenster pastor on July 6. With bad weather gone, threshers are nearing the end of a record crop. Hotheadedness was never constructive; it has always destroyed everything. It has inflamed passions, but never assuaged them. It sows no seeds but those of hatred and destruction. Far from bringing about the reconciliation of contending parties, it reduces men and political parties to the necessity of laboriously redoing the work of the past, building on the ruins that disharmony has left in its wake.'"

They've visited many old churches — altars completely covered with 24 carat gold. The Spanish Governor's home is loaded with antiques. They visited the statue of Christ the King high on a mountain top . . . "you close your eyes driving up the narrow winding road by car . . ."

On another trip they visited a cemetery where bodies remain forever mummified . . . something in the soil . . . and there are rooms full of mummified bodies.

Another note of interest: by order of the Mexican government there are throughout Mexico separate schools for boys and girls until the university level.

First Communion celebrations are quite different there. A ceremony usually for just one child . . . or for the children of just one family. Afterward there is a fiesta. Sometimes there are hundreds of invited guests.

On the trip by train from Texas they witnessed the change of train personnel at Laredo from American to Mexican, and passed most gracefully the inspection of suitcases.

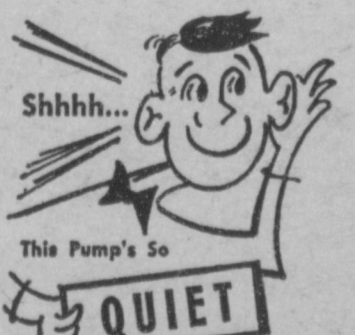

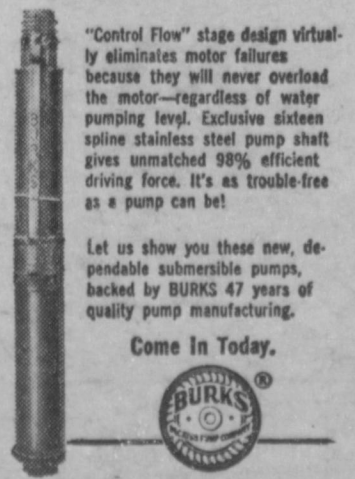
