Holly Holds Sway

The holly tree and its brightly berried branches hold an important place not only in holiday decorations but in the legends and lore of Christmas.

An old belief in England and Germany was that there are "he" and "she" hollies — the "he" hollies with spined leaves, the "she" hollies smooth-leaved. The varieties brought into

the house at Christmas supposedly showed who would head the household for the coming year — "he" or "she."

A variation on this custom said that if the holly was brought into the house in fair weather, the wife would rule, but if the weather was bad, the husband would be master.

Holly was credited with many magical and medical powers. It was believed to cure toothaches, banish rickets, and even foretell to girls the names of their future husbands.

"First Nowell"

First published in English, "The First Nowell" is believed to be primarily a French carol. The French word "Noel" comes from the Latin word meaning birth; "Nowell" is the anglicized version. Both mean Christmas or a "shout of joy" for the birth of Christ. Tune is a medieval shepherd song.

"Adeste Fidelis"

"O Come, All Ye Faithful" or "Adeste Fidelis" may have been written by the 13th century writer and teacher, Saint Bonaventure, but its exact origin is a mystery. There's no secret about its popularity today. It has been translated into 120 languages, and there are more than 40 English versions.

'O Tannenbaum'



Most familiar of many Christmas carols originating in Germany, "O Tannenbaum," or "O Christmas Tree," celebrates the evergreen as an emblem of immortality. It has added familiarity in the U.S., since the tune is used for several college songs and for the state song, "Maryland, My Maryland."

An old English carol that sometimes suffers from a comma out of place is "God Rest You Merry, Gentlemen." The meaning is not "God rest you, merry gentlemen," but "God keep you merry, gentlemen."

"Herald Angels, Sing" Charles Wesley, who during his lifetime (1707-1788) wrote hundreds of hymns, was inspired to write "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing" as he walked to church on Christmas day and heard the London church bells chime.

Has Its Special Fire Hazards

The Christmas season is indeed a happy one, but few hazards their home contains

during this time of the year. The Christmas tree, center and the main attraction can be taken, warns W. S. Allen, Extension agricultural engineer, Texas A&M University.

A freshly cut tree should be selected just a few days before Christmas. Cut the base of the tree diagonally and keep it submerged in water or wet sand. Locate it away from fireplaces, powerful electric lights. radiators or other sources of

Use only Underwriters Laboratories approved lights for the tree. Inspect lights which have been used before for loped. The date of his death, frayed cords and damaged sockets, advises the engineer. Avoid overloading electrical circuits with additional lights,

This is also a time for smokers to take special precautions, Allen points out. Extra care should be taken with cigarettes, cigars and pipes around all flammable materials.







And from these individual and humble beginnings came the rodeo as it was known then - spontaneous contests that grew out of the movements of vast herds, performed on the spur of the moment and in isolated grandeur. Along the way, as progress moved from the Nineteenth Century, there was certain to be changes. And changes there were. Where there was only isolation and solitude; now there are arenas and spectators. Where there were spur of the moment affrays; now there are judged contests, with points carefully graded and tabulated.

But the basic concept — man against animal - remain the same. Remove the present-day fanfare, the trappings, the spectators, the judges, and all left is one man against one animal. Just as it was long ago in the camps of the trail herd-

Today the rodeo is indisputedly prominent in the culture of the Southwest. And it has gained its high place in the esteem of Americans, of the Southwest and of the nation as a whole, not only because of its value as entertainment, but also because it demands, in the American tradition, skill, stamina, sportsmanship and the will to win of the true and trained athlete.

Today, anywhere, on almost any day of the year, one may find in progress a rodeo. Some are elaborate productions; oth-ers inpromptu affairs not unlike its early antecedents.





Progress of Hospital Is Muenster's First Interest In Diamond Jubilee Year

Muenster, observing its 75th anniversary, continued its record of growth and achievement in 1964, but economically it was less fortunate than usual. After a drought in the latter part of '63, stockmen were caught with a feed shortage for the winter. And when harvest time arrived crops did not come up to their usual yields.

Otherwise the year was about normal. The community lost the usual number of its loved ones through funerals and added the usual number of new citizens by birth. Meanwhile some folks moved in and others moved out.

The most important development of the year was establishment of Muenster Memorial Hospital, which was admired by hundreds at a dedication and open house on Jan. 19 and accepted its first patients on February 3. Starting occupancy was encouraging, but it soon became evident that more doctors were needed to keep an adequate number of patients. Then came the distressing report that the town's one doctor was leaving for specialized study.

From May until August patients were few. Then Muenster and Saint Jo each got a doctor, and activity perked up at the hospital. In October another doctor came here and conditions improved further. Indications are that December will be the first month in which the hospital will operate

The debt situation is less pleasing, however. Voluntary donations, which were to pay off the bonds, were coming in too slowly, and a hospital district with a 30 cent tax is proposed to solve the financial problem.
