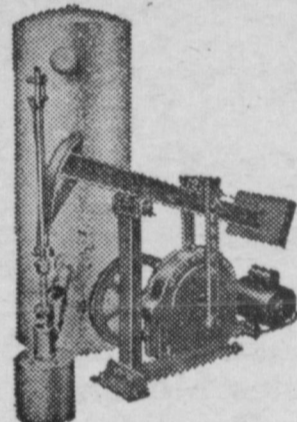
Joe Weinzapfel and Miss Julia Meurer were married October 3, 1916, in Scotland,

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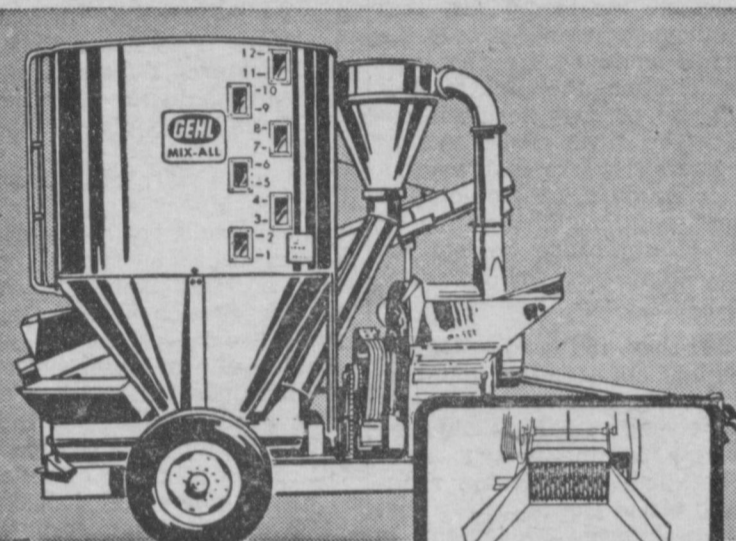

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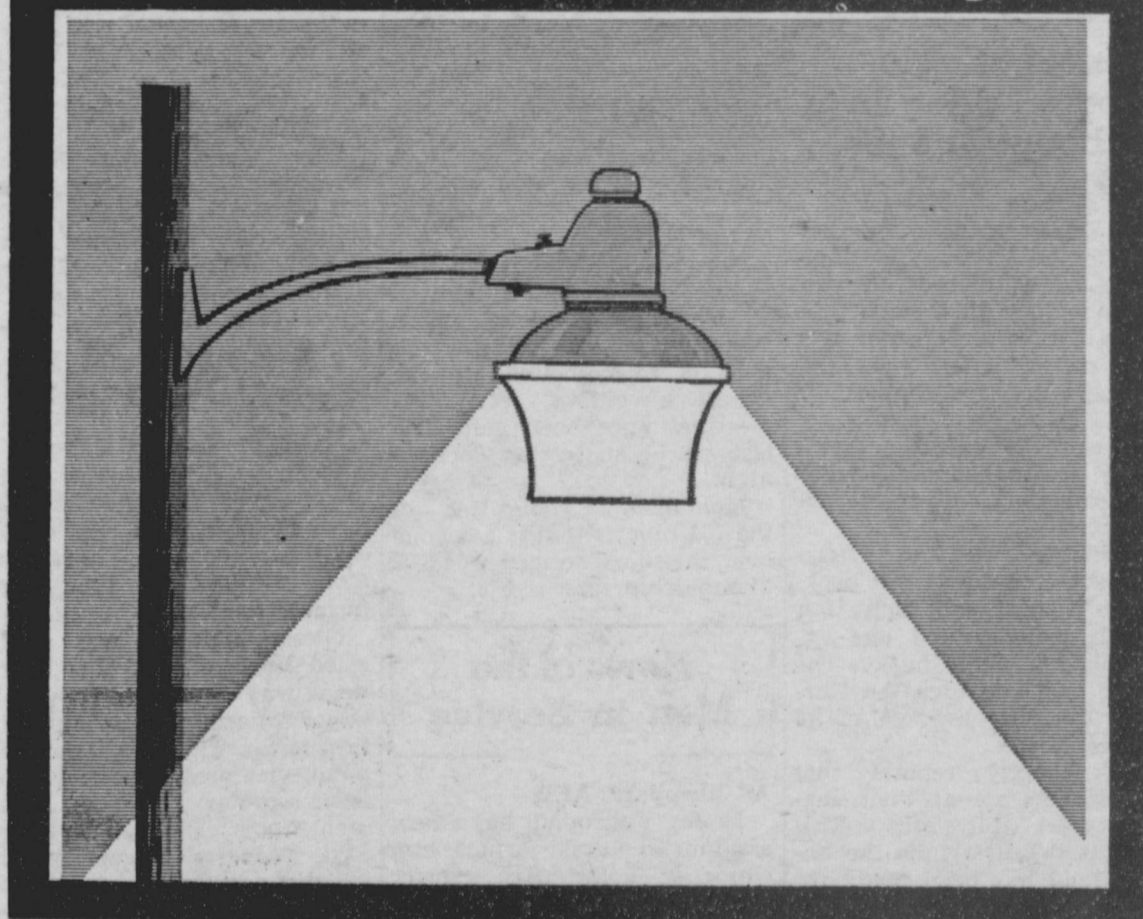

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore an original creation of white silk

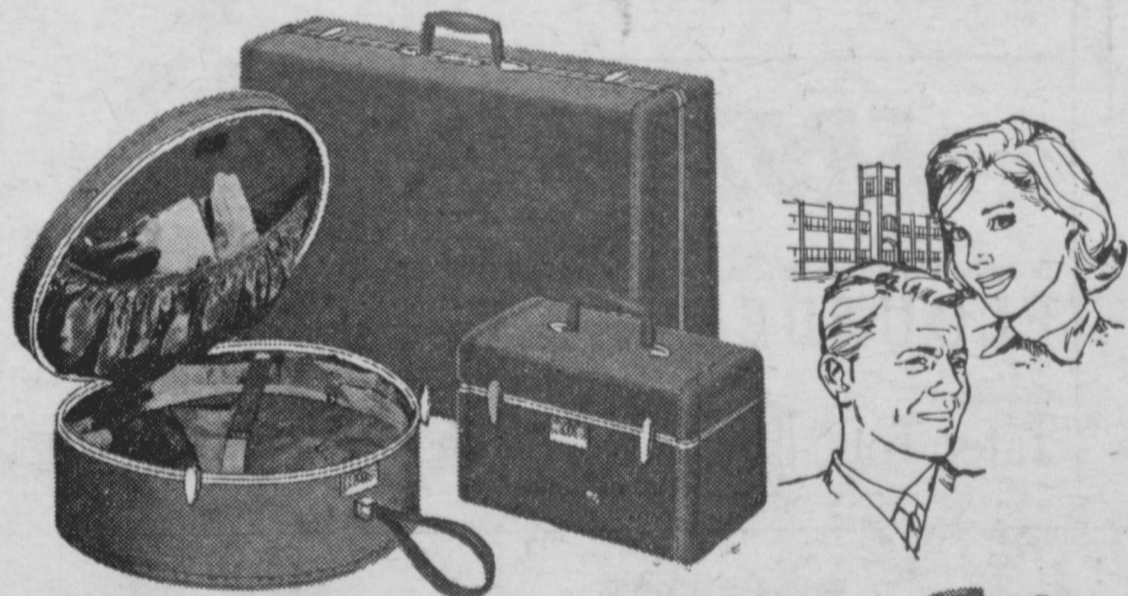

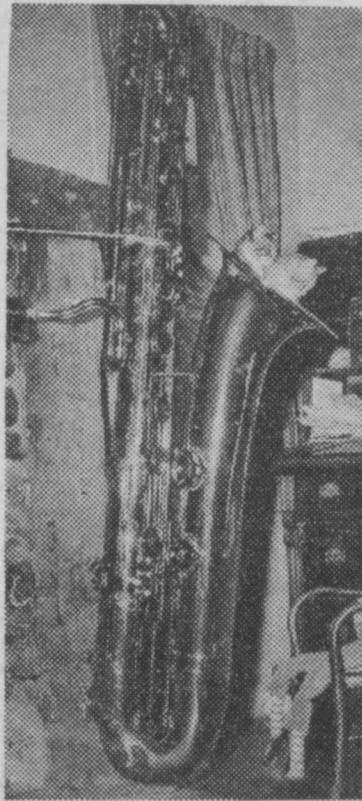
