But then, if the so-called obligation applies, the voter no longer has a choice in the general election — he is required ed to avoid conflict for those to vote for the party's entire attending the State Fair. It ticket. The whole thing reduces itself to the absurdity that a voter forfeits his right to choose in one election or the other. If he claims the right to vote a split ticket in the general election he cannot vote on local officials. If he voted for local officials he cannot oppose a party nominee later.
