Solemn religious service next Tuesday in Muenster's Sacred Heart church will thank Almighty God for blessings on this community through the past seventy five years and ask His blessings for many years to come. After that a community birthday party will continue through the rest of the day, providing a special opportunity for former residents, particularly the old timers, to renew old acquaintances and recall memories dear to their hearts.

The event is the diamond jubilee of the founding of the community, a proper occasion for this column to refer with pride to Muenster's progress since the day when it was just a designated location on the open prairie.

Muenster's history is definitely a success story, the kind of steady solid success that results from constant effort rather than the boom that emerges from a suddenly discovered bonanza. It can be said that one of the most important features in Muenster's past is its persistent striving toward a better future. From the beginning of the settlement the pioneers worked together, helping each other in the tradition of good neighbors while creating facilities and services to enrich their community life.

Their spirit of cooperation led to development of an outstanding parish plant as the center of the community's religious and social life. Cooperation likewise resulted in establishment of early services such as mutual fire insurance protection and a mutually owned telephone company. As the years passed that same spirit was reflected in establishing a local marketing system and cheese factory, organizing the present bank, originating the present extensive rural electrification system, establishing soil conservation practices, and building the Muenster Memorial Hospital. As Muenster people proudly recall a fine record of progress they can also recall a fine record of pulling together.

That factor is principally responsible for this city's continued growth in recent decades while many rural towns were going backward. Starting from scratch in 1889, the town built up little by little to a population of about 600 in its golden anniversary year. And in the past 25 years it has doubled in population. Also during the quarter century it has built most of its present homes and business firms, many as replacements of the old homes and business houses, many as new additions. The result is that Muenster is mostly a new town, with its overall good looks enhanced by pavement that is well above average in mileage and quality for a town of this size.

A list of some of the town's principal buildings, all built in the last 25 years, is a fair measure of the town's and community's progress. There's the hospital, Sacred Heart Church, Benedictine Convent, Sacred Heart High, Muenster Public School, post office, telephone building, two supermarkets, two car agencies, electric co-op, dress factory, The Center, bank, variety store, Hamric's and Charm Shop, a lumber yard, city hall, plus several smaller buildings and a number of improvements to older buildings, plus most of the residential buildings.

And that still does not tell all the story. Rural progress has been equally impressive. The area around Muenster has dozens of new farm homes and many others that have been brought up to date by extensive remodeling. Other farm improvement likewise reflects the community's progress. More and better barns, machine sheds, etc., fencing, terracing, waterways and better farming methods that have brought gratifying increases in crop yields. And, especially valuable in recent weeks, a system of reservoirs to control flood waters.

All in all, Muenster's story is a very gratifying one, and it gives a special glow to next week's diamond jubilee observance. A highly appropriate thought for the day is congratulations for achievements of the past, best wishes for continued progress in the future.

They are key workers in the census, with a responsibility of locating all farms assigned within a given district and determining if the farmer has answered all questions on his questionnaire, helping on unanswered questions, checking for accuracy, and delivering forms to the census bureau.

Revised Edition Of Parish History Nears Completion

Christmas Lights On City Streets To Burn Thursday

Christmas lights over Muenster's two principal streets are due to be in use Thursday night. Installation of the lights started Wednesday and is expected to be finished Thursday.

The work is being done by linemen of TP&L and city employees.

Lighting this year is practically the same as it was last year, says City Superintendent Steve Moster. There are about 800 colored bulbs on 22 strings stretched across as many places on Main Street and the highway. On Main they will go from the traffic light north to Fourth Street, on the highway they will go east to the city limit.

There will be a slight difference from last year's installation, Moster said. Lights on a string will all be the same color. Last year colors were mixed on every line. The colors are blue, green red, yellow and orange. They are controlled automatically by a time clock.

Farm Census Will Provide Data for New US Record

The 1964 Census of Agriculture, now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, in Cooke County, will bring up to date the farm and ranch statistics last collected in 1959.

Here are a few of the many facts recorded in the 1959 agriculture census for this County:

There were 1,406 farms and ranches in 1959, compared with 1,700 in 1954. The average size of farm and ranch was 332.2 acres in 1959, compared with 277.2 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by the County's farmers and ranchers in 1959 was \$8,240,408. The value of all crops sold was \$1,703,476. The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$6,536,932.

The 1964 national Census of Agriculture is the 18th in a series which began in 1840. Because of the rapid changes American agriculture has been undergoing in recent years, Census Bureau officials regard the current census as one of the most significant ever taken.

They ask every farmer and rancher to cooperate in compiling an accurate record of these changes by filling out the census form he receives in the mail and holding the completed questionnaire until a census taker calls for it.

Religious Ceremonies and Social Event to Observe Diamond Jubilee of Parish

In ceremonies of ecclesiastical splendor the Sacred Heart Parish will observe its diamond jubilee next Tuesday.

A Pontifical High Mass, at which the celebrant and his assistants will all be natives of the parish, will commemorate the first mass in Muenster on the feast of the Immaculate Conception, December 8, 1889.

And after the Mass the parish will spend the rest of the day in a big 75th birthday party. That event will consist

of a community dinner at noon followed by an old timers' get-together for the rest of the day in the parish hall.

As explained by Father Alcuin, it will not be one of the usual parish picnics featuring carnival events. This will be a quiet affair, specially for visiting, with snacks and drinks conveniently available.

Celebrant of the Pontifical High Mass will be The Right Reverend Alfred Hoenig, abbot of Corpus Christi Abbey.

The sermon will be delivered by The Very Reverend Bonaventure Koelzer, S.A., Superior General of the Franciscan Friars of Atonement of Graymoor, N. Y.

And present in the sanctuary will be The Most Reverend Augustine Danglmayr, auxiliary bishop of the Dallas-Fort Worth Diocese, and The Right Reverend Michael Lensing, O.S.B., abbot of Subiaco Abbey.

Native sons have been booked as attendants at the ceremonies, but at least one change has been reported to date. Frater Frowin Schoech, who had been assigned with Father Paul Hoedebeck as Master of Ceremonies, sends greetings and regrets. He is due to be ordained a deacon on that day and cannot be here. Up to Wednesday Father Alcuin has not named a substitute for him.

"U.S. DEBT TO DELAWARE"

Because we think it should get around to "the other 49 states," we would like to quote in full a recent editorial in the DELAWARE STATE NEWS, of Dover, written by McLellan

Smith, Washington Correspondent for that paper. He said:

"The other 49 States of the Union owe a debt of gratitude to the electorate of Delaware for returning Senator John J. Williams to Capitol Hill for another six years, this despite the fact that LBJ and the Democratic National Committee threw 'everything but the kitchen sink' at him in an

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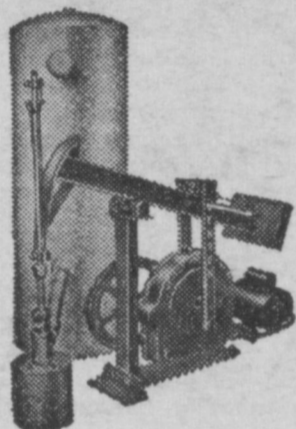


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effort to bring about his defeat. "Senator Williams' eighteen years in the Upper Chamber have been both dramatic and effective. During the Truman administration, Senator Williams exposed a tax-fixing ring within the government, an expose that eventually landed 89 malefactors behind prison bars thus saving the Government millions of dollars.

"Often referred to as the watch dog of the Federal conscience, Senator Williams was the first to 'break' the Bobby Baker scandals involving, among other things, the gift of a costly hi-fi stereo to the present White House tenant, insurance kick-backs in the form of advertising contracts for the Johnson TV station in Austin, Texas, and other cash kick-backs to the Democratic war chest of 1960 by a contractor who built Washington's multi-million dollar athletic stadium which, by the way, is even now proving to be of shoddy construction.

"The First State's Senator, even though he knew the odds against him in bucking an Administration in power — an Administration which has shown no scruples in abusing that power for its own political ends — courageously declared he had no intention of letting the Bobby Baker affair be swept under the rug. And, knowing Senator Williams' honesty and his dogged determination, we are certain the Baker scandals eventually will be exposed in all their sordid details.

"Yes, the people of all the other States owe a debt of gratitude to the voters of the First State; not only because of his determination to carry on with the Baker affair, but because so long as John J. Williams is in the United States Senate corruptionists in government will have a determined and effective foe."

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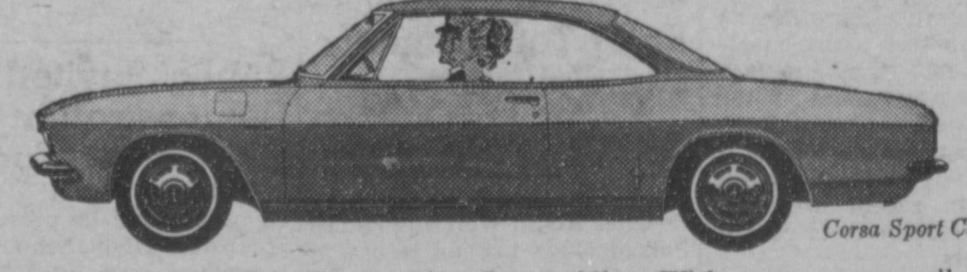
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Medders Entertain Holiday Visitors Host Two Parties
