The secretary who can't locate her boss for an urgent call now has a new solution. She puts a radio receiver in his pocket when he leaves and her voice goes automatically from her phone to the receiver Message Mate.

An advancement in radio-paging technology marketed by General Electric Communication Products Department, Lynchburg, Va., it reaches where wires can't travel. There's no attachment to the telephone in the office. A radio base station and electronic coder tie in with the building's switchboard. As long as the receiver is within range, it can hear the voice messages outside the building, even a few miles away.

Now being installed in some parts of the country, it may be used by businesses, hospitals, hotels, colleges, or other types of installations where quick contact is necessary. It's a one-way system primarily designed for in-building application.

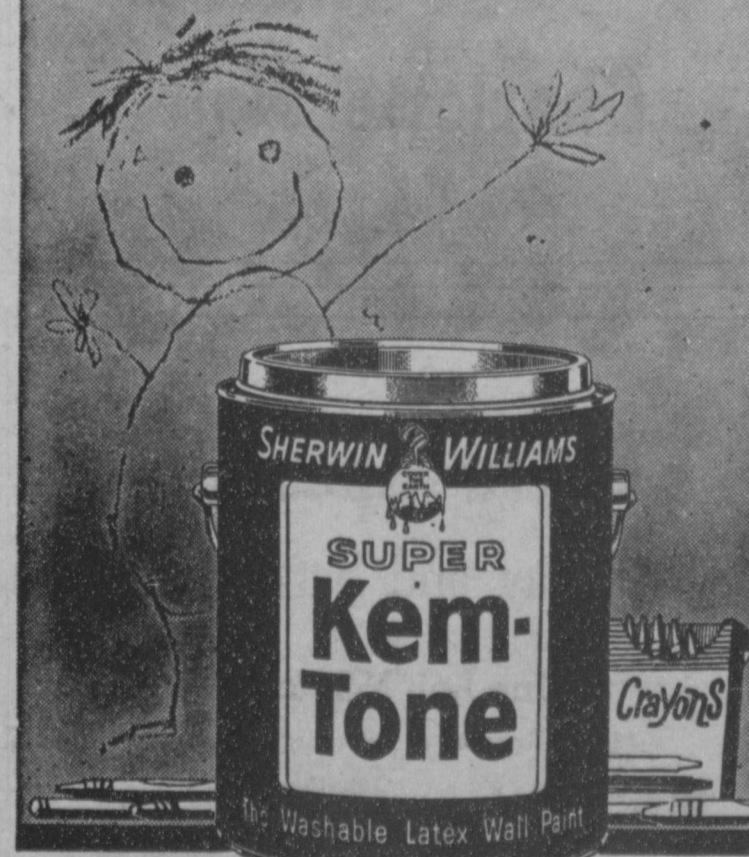

NOTES FROM CITY LIBRARY

Off The Beaten Trail
Do you know there was a Seventh Flag over Texas? For two wild-dreaming harried years—1839-1840—Mexicans and Texans allied themselves—patriots and free-booters in both ranks—to create a new nation, most of Mexico and much of the United States now west of the Mississippi. This was the Republic of the Rio Grande. Its flag flies over a neat one-story building in Laredo, atop the north bank of the Rio Grande, now a museum.

Do you know when Indian paint brush touched the Bluebonnet? It is an interesting Indian legend—from when the fairies chose them prettiest of all to the time "Cactus" Jack Garner earned his nickname, helping decide the Texas State Flower in 1901.

Do you know the Mormons established a community near Fredericksburg on the Pedernales River that could be "New Zion" in Texas? Few in Fredericksburg today could take you to its ruins, they are that old and gone. It was called Zodiac and once in the mid-1800s its founders felt all the promise of Salt Lake City.

Do you know the story of Father Miguel Muldoon, Forgotten Man of Texas? His career, those half-forgotten days when Austin put together Texas, was meteoric. He was an unknown priest, then Austin's right arm. He came and went for 18 years, a riddle, now in Mexico, now Texas, wherever trouble was. He saved Austin's dream then his life, then deliberately walked off the edge. It is a very interesting episode in the making of Texas. A monument is erected in his memory on US Highway 77.

These excerpts and many, many more short stories of Texas' early days and places are found in two volumes compiled by Ed Syers in "Off the Beaten Trail." The books are at Münster City Library. And librarians urge "Come read with us."

Münster Library, started a little over five years ago by the local court Catholic Daughters of America with 12 books has grown to include some 2000 books.

The library is open on Thursday of each week from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The two Tiger teams will be in Dallas Thursday night for return games.

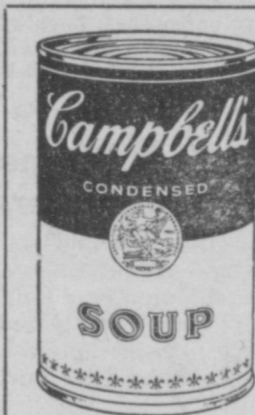
