Loans at the Muenster bank made a gain of \$486,625 for the year, the current total being \$2,111,955. Combined loans in all the county banks were \$10,-854,016, an increase of \$1,005,-693 for the year.

THURMOND SHIFT NOT SURPRISING

As Sen. Thurmond bowed out of the Democrat party, he gave a bill of particulars - an indictment - against that party. Here is what he told the people of South Carolina:





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
