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200 Ladies Attend Tour-Lecture in Medders Gardens

Observing the Fourth of July this year we might wonder how much longer its significance will apply sufficiently to inspire continued observance. Anyone who can look back as much as a few decades is sadly aware that the holiday is not what it used to be. We don't celebrate it with the same enthusiasm that people felt back in the days of our fathers and grandfathers. We don't experience the same degree of pride and patriotism that they did, because we don't appreciate, as they did, the magnitude of the achievement of the men of 1776.

Some 200 Garden Club members of the area and their guests gathered Tuesday afternoon for a garden tour and lecture at Colonial Manor, home of the Ernest Medders family, with Mrs. Medders as hostess.

We have gone a long way in the past 188 years, but are we sure that all of the going can be rated as progress? Are we as near now as we were then to the ideals of human dignity and personal freedom which guided the signers of the Declaration of Independence?

She invited the women to see the flowers while they were in full bloom and arranged to have Marvin Davenport, landscape designer, to conduct the tour and explain the plantings.

This occasion is a good one to study a statement by Thomas Jefferson "Yes, we did produce a near perfect republic. But will they keep it, or will they, in the enjoyment of plenty, lose the memory of freedom? Material abundance without character is the surest way to destruction."

As guests arrived at 2:30 they were greeted and welcomed by Mrs. Medders at the door of the two-story red brick house with its white columns and a yard full of trees and flowers.

The statement is packed with food for thought. The concern expressed by Jefferson makes it seem as though he was seeing through future decades up to our time. With a clear understanding of human traits he realized that freedoms given in our government enabled people to apply their God-given abilities more than ever before in history, to attain greater abundance than had ever been attained before.

Refreshments were first and guests were directed to the dining room for punch and tea cakes and finger foods. The table was covered with an ecru linen and lace cloth and held the crystal and silver service and candelabra. Pink and red carnations were the floral complement.

Our nation has come to the problem he foresaw. We have prospered to the point of being alarmingly materialistic. We have become over satisfied with our own way of doing things and have lost the sense of direction which inspired the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution.

Mrs. Bill Oliver poured punch and Miss Cathy Medders presided at the other end of the board. Jimmy O'Brien played muted piano selections.

Frequent reference to God in both of those documents indicates the clear intent of the writers to aim for harmony with the Divine Plan. The grievances listed in the declaration told how God-given rights had been violated, and the principles adopted in the constitution required that those rights would be respected.

And then the tour directed by Marvin Davenport, who has special talent in landscaping. As the group walked over the grounds he explained the various types of plantings used at Colonial Acres. There are 36 pecan trees along the driveway and almost countless flowering plants and shrubs in the landscape plan. The rose garden is on the north grounds. Gene and John Riggs had directed traffic as the cars arrived so they would not interfere with the tour.

On this Fourth of July it's high time to recall the statement of William Penn, another of those great original Americans. "The nation which refuses to be governed by God will surely be governed by tyrants." Let's hope that the men who guide our destiny will take that passage to heart and begin correcting the ideas and practices which violate the original July 4th spirit.

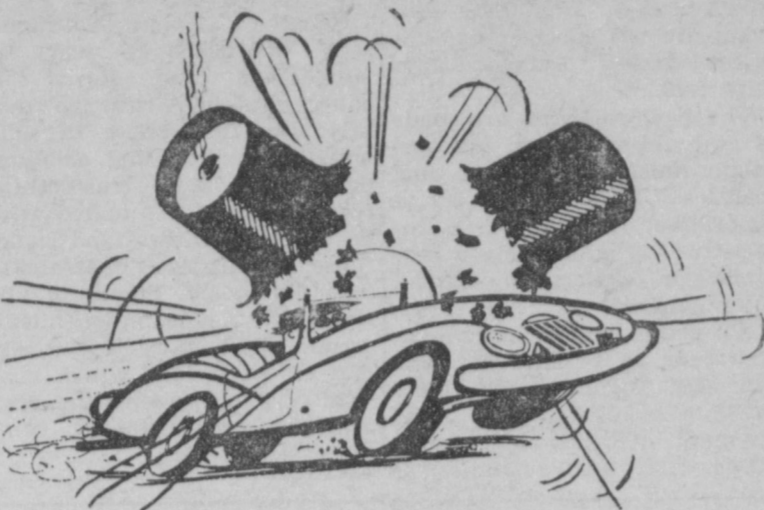
Of interest also to visitors were the registered Black and Red Angus cattle grazing nearby. Colonial Acres is a mile and a half northwest of Muenster.

First and foremost they should work toward putting God back in public life as much as possible and to repudiate officially the ridiculous notion that the present way is the only one to attain separation of church and state. Recognizing God does not mean adopting a state religion. Leaders saw that clearly for over a century and a half. Why can't they see it now?

Every garden club in Gainesville was represented, a large delegation came from Saint Jo, a group attended from Valley View and Muenster ladies were present by the dozens.

Another critical need is to begin trimming on the bureaucratic regulations and laws which put needless limitations on freedom. An old American axiom states that we are best governed when least governed, and it's still true. The proper purpose of law is to guarantee our liberties, not to push us around.

Medical Outlook Brightens; Doctors Start Next Week At Muenster and Saint Jo

The medical situation at Muenster and Saint Jo has improved wonderfully. Each of the towns will have a doctor next week — Dr. B. F. Hejdkuk at Muenster and Dr. Selwyn A. Willis at Saint Jo. In addition other doctors are investigating possibilities at Muenster and a few have been rated as good prospects.

Since leaving his homeland Dr. Hejdkuk practiced surgery in England and West Germany, then came to the United States.

The coming of Dr. Hejdkuk is regarded as especially fortunate to Muenster Memorial Hospital. Sister Mildred, administrator, said that he is recognized in the medical profession as a highly skilled and capable surgeon. With his ability and the hospital's facilities, patients will be able to have practically any kind of surgery performed here.

For the past three years he has practiced surgery as an interne at Gaston Hospital in Dallas, in accordance with the Texas regulation requiring three years as interne in a recognized hospital regardless of previous experience. He received his state license as a surgeon in January and remained at Gaston until now.

A short time ago he applied and was accepted as surgeon at a new hospital in Irving. Since then he heard of Muenster Memorial Hospital and investigated on two occasions, June 13 and 20. This week he wrote that he intends to be here next Wednesday, the 8th. Until other arrangements are made he will have his office in the hospital and will also live in the hospital. Dr. Hejdkuk will start here in both surgery and general practice.

Dr. Willis originally intended to move to Saint Jo about July 15 but speeded his plans when he learned that neither Muenster or Saint Jo had a doctor. He comes from Tulsa, recently bought the home of his late father-in-law, Earl Giles. Dr. Willis will be on the Muenster Hospital Staff.

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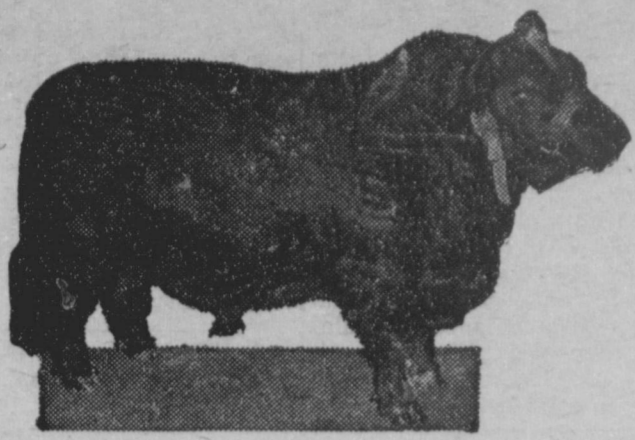
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Former Residents Return for Visit

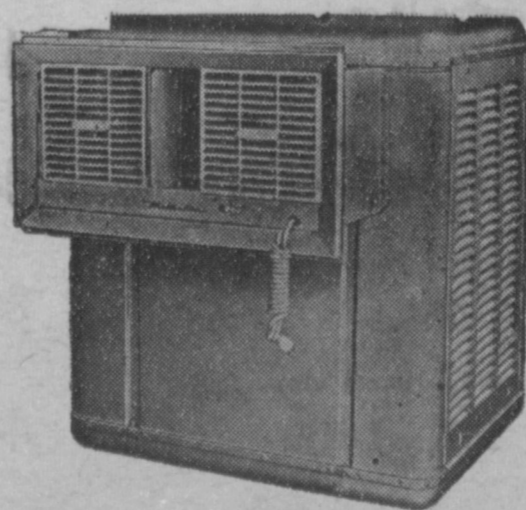

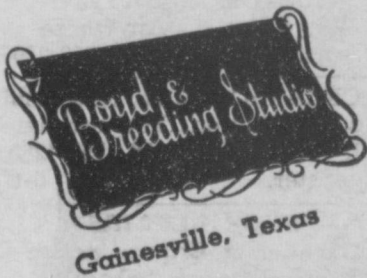

Dear Cooperator:

Past experience has shown that when the rains come our sloping cultivated fields need the added protection of a good terrace system to keep valuable topsoil and water at home where they are needed for crop production. Improved terrace building methods and machines have given us the means of building low, wide, easy-to-farm channel type terraces that can be farmed with all types of equipment. Too, terrace spacing has been increased on cropland where the cropping system is all close growing crops.

Many of you have crop land that needs terracing for which grassed outlets are available. We, in the Soil Conservation Service, are interested in assisting you in getting your land protected with a good terrace system. We will be glad to do the engineering work necessary to establish your terraces.

The Cooke County ASC Office has funds available to assist you financially in building terraces. This year's payment is \$105.60 per mile plus 50% cost of fills. This help can be obtained by applying at the ASC Office in the Post Office Building in Gainesville.

We are all interested in saving our greatest asset — our topsoil. We take this opportunity to remind you of one of the soil conserving practices that can and should be done now. Please feel free to call on us for assistance.
