

In his "non political" speech Tuesday to a convention of labor union members President Johnson proudly announced that more people are working today and receiving Measuring 5.40 higher pay than they did four years ago.

The statement was in keeping with the administration's much publicized prosperity pitch, which is being offered to voters as inducement not to make a change. But it did not tell all of the story. Related facts not mentioned are that there are also more jobless people, and the higher pay does not buy any more than the smaller pay used to.

Of course more people are working. Increase in population accounts for that as well as for the fact that more people are not working. Making the one remark without including the other was misleading.

Another obvious half truth is the statement about higher wages. What's the advantage of higher pay when the gain is wiped out by decreased value of the dollar?

And there's still more that was left unsaid on the subject of inflation. While workers with pay raises failed to gain in real wages another segment of our population continued the school's annual homecomto lose. Even for bees, the honey business is mainly transportation. If a single bee should fly an average of a mile to a sour ce of honey - making sufficient trips to produce a pound of honey - it would have to fly the equivalent of three the Administration to produce times around the world. A tremendous task for even a bee in this age of jet transportation.

> But wait, even more transportation is involved. Beekeeping is becoming mobile. The migratory beekeeper moves his bees by truck from south to north following the blooming period of the best nectar producing crops. Otherwise, he may lose an investment running into thousands of dollars.

There are other problems he must overcome by good management but those who profit most from his efforts are the ultimate consumers of the food delicacy which he and his hard working bees provide.
