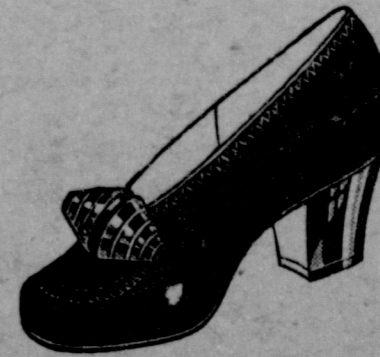

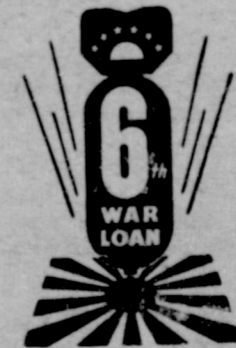

PLANE TALK

The use of high octane gasoline has made possible the development of greater horsepower in modern aircraft without a proportionate increase in size and weight.
 Most people have a misconception of high octane rating. An octane number is numerically the percentage by volume of iso-octane in a mixture of iso-octane and normal heptane. The octane number of fuel is the octane number of the mixture of iso-octane and normal heptane which it matches in antiknock value.
 90 octane does not mean the percentage of octane in the gasoline. Actually what 90 octane gasoline is, is a gasoline that detonates or knocks at the same compression as a mixture of 90 per cent iso-octane and 10 per cent normal heptane. It is merely a standard for expressing how much gasoline may be compressed without knocking.
 The more the fuel can be compressed the more power an engine will develop and the less resistance the gasoline will have to detonation. It is this that makes possible greater horsepower in present day engines.
 Each engine has its prescribed octane fuel requirement. Although a higher octane gasoline may be used than is necessary, it is wasteful to do so since the higher octane gasolines are more expensive than the lower ones.
 The ability of American manufacturers to develop higher and higher octane fuels has contributed materially to the superiority and greater efficiency of our fighting aircraft.

CARE OF WOOD FURNITURE

During cold weather wood furniture is most likely to dry out and become loose-jointed, sometimes it may crack or warp. And occasionally the veneer may loosen.

To prevent these misfortunes you should keep the surfaces of furniture sealed with oil. This suggestion comes from Miss Mildred L. Chapman, County home demonstration agent. Either you can buy this oil in the form of a good furniture polish or you can make a very good and inexpensive polish yourself. It's quite easy.

Simply mix one part turpentine with two parts of boiled linseed oil. — you should use this oil polish at least twice a year on varnished or oiled furniture, the agent advises. The turpentine will help remove the dirt which collects on furniture. The oil soaks into the wood and keeps it in good condition. What's more, the polish keeps tiny cracks from showing and it clears up that dull look furniture often has. Incidentally, be careful in handling that turpentine. It's highly inflammable.

This turpentine and oil mixture should be applied with a clean, soft cloth—then the excess should be wiped off with another clean cloth. Finally, rub the surface until the wood is entirely dry and your finger will leave no prints.

If you have any small scratches on your furniture one good trick is to conceal them by rubbing each with a nut meat. The meat of walnuts or pecans will work very well, for the oil of the nut penetrates the scratched surface. Or, if you have a waxed surface of wood that is spotted or scratched, you'd better first wash it with turpentine—then re-wax the entire surface.

Your Health

Austin, Texas — Reports from widely separated parts of Texas to the Texas State Department of Health show that influenza is widespread throughout the State. During the past month over 3170 cases have been reported.

Colds, grippe, and influenza are spread from person to person thru discharges from the nose and throat. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Director, says that in order to protect yourself and others from such diseases here are some things to be remembered and some precautions to be observed.

Influenza is highly infectious, practically everybody is susceptible to it. No matter how many

If the people of this country want to raise the health level of the nation, there are many factors to be considered, says this chart. Medical care is only one of them, and one perhaps not equally as important as some of the others.

It has been suggested that if the medical care features of proposed expansion of our compulsory social insurance system are adopted, the health of the nation will, as a result, be enormously improved. But in other countries, where government insurance has been in force for many years, advances in medicine and in standards of national health, comparable to those made in the United States, have not been achieved.

times you may have had the disease, you may contract it again. Therefore, keep away from people who are sneezing, coughing, or sniffing, or who are actively ill with colds, influenza, or pneumonia. Keep away from crowded places. Have your own towel and drinking cup and always wash your hands before eating.

Keep yourself as fit as possible by drinking plenty of water, by eating simple, nourishing food, by some exercise out of doors every day, by dressing according to the weather, by having plenty of sleep in a well ventilated room, and by keeping the bowels regulated.

If you feel an attack of grippe or influenza, or even of what you may think an ordinary cold, coming on, go to bed, consult your physician, and follow his directions implicitly.

DECEMBER RATION POINT VALUES ARE UNCHANGED

Point values for rationed meats, butter, margarine, cheese, canned milk, canned fish, and processed foods will continue unchanged from November values during December, the Office of Price Administration points out.

At the same time it was stated that December meat poundage is expected to be about 5.4 percent higher than last month, while the quantity of rationed meats is estimated at 11.8 percent above November levels. The increases, OPA cautions, are small in relation to the country's ability to consume.

Ceremony Dec. 14th To Mark Humble's Achievement

HOUSTON, TEXAS.— In a fitting ceremony at Baytown, Texas, employees of Humble Oil and Refining Company on December 14 will commemorate a feat unparalleled in the petroleum industry — the production of one billion gallons of finished 100 octane aviation gasoline at the Company's Baytown refinery.

TO STARCH A SHIRT

For more uniform results in starching a shirt, home economists gather up all the parts to be starched — cuffs, collar and

front — and dip them into the starch at the same time. How thick a solution to use depends upon the individual's taste, but beware of starching board stiff or it will crack the fiber threads and cause the shirt to wear out much faster. Shirt collars marked "do not starch" mean what they say.

Your Home

What about those small suitcase size furnaces weighing less than 20 pounds which are supposed to be able to heat homes as large as 20 rooms? I have been hearing about them, the same as you, so I put the question to the chief engineer of the world's largest installers of home heating equipment.

This authority told me that there was no trick to building a vest pocket furnace; several companies have already done so, but for purposes entirely remote from home heating. The trick isn't in making the miniature heating unit; it's in making it practical for home use.

These small heaters, as perfected for wartime usage, generate their terrific heat by burning high octane airplane fuel under great pressure, with a high velocity blower fan to propel the heat. Of necessity, the noise is a mighty roar. Furthermore, the hot air is of a degree altogether too high for home comfort. Then, too, there is the high cost of the fuel, as well as the short life of the heater (probably not more than 1,000 hours) under its concentrated generation of blast furnace heat. All of these objections would have to be overcome before the miniature heater could be adapted to home use.

And so, without meaning to throw cold water on the idea, I'm afraid we shall have to wait quite a long while before the engineers have succeeded, if ever, in practically adapting the much publicized suitcase heater to our homes. In the meantime, however, we do have some mighty fine improvements and advantages to enjoy in the heating units that are to be made available when factory production is permitted.
