sons why such an alternate road deserves early consideration. Present volume of traffic points to a probability that more traffic capacity to west Texas is near the planning stage. The present Highway 82 will have to convert to 4 lanes unless some of the traffic is diverted to an alternate road. As conditions are now, the Highway Department could probably build the alternate route for less than it could widen the present one to four lanes.

In general here is what would be required. A new right of way and new road from here to Bowie. From there on it already has a right of way and basic construction. To meet federal highway requirements it would probably have to widen the right of way and improve the road. It is doubtful, however, whether the total cost of the alternate road would equal the total cost of additional right of way plus complete From a financial standpoint the alternate highway should other plans are made.
