Rogation Days have become Soil Stewardship Week, an occasion for us to reflect that the earth belongs to God and those who use it have a sacred duty to return it to Him in as good a condition as received, or

Normally this week would be the time for the annual conservation awards banquet honoring farmers who do a particularly good job of soil stewardship. However, because Rogation Days are linked to the movable feasts of Easter and Ascension, they frequently come at harvest time. Local farmers, preferring to be in their fields then, have moved their banquet to the early part of the month.

We are pleased to realize that this modern observance of Rogation Days calls on people to take on their part of the responsibility of providing for mankind. This isn't just God's job. After all, savcrops as well as the weather.





How to save electricity when using air conditioning

Central Systems 1. Set thermostat on 78°, or higher, during the summer. Turn unit off if you'll be away from home several

3. Check filter every 30 days. Dirty filters cause equipment to use excessive electricity. If filter is permanent, clean by manufacturer's directions; if it's disposable, it should be replaced



Listed below are some general rules or practices for good combining:

1. When first beginning to of the combine" by operating at a slow ground speed, without reducing engine speed. Gradually increase ground speed checking for threshing losses and damage. Under normal conditions, the combine should be able to operate at ground speeds between 21/2 and 31/2 miles per hour.

2. Make combine adjustments as necessary. Make only one adjustment at a time, checking the results before making others.

3. Check often for proper threshing, adjusting cylinder speed and concave setting as necessary.

4. When checking threshing, check for grain losses and make necessary adjustments. 5. Cut as high as possible

without missing too many 6. Keep reel height adjusted for changes in crop height

and reel speed adjusted for changes in ground speed. 7. Adjust cleaning units when excessive losses occur. 8. Don't overload the com-

9. When operating in weedy or hard to thresh crops, slow down and make frequent checks on combine perform-

To get an estimate of harvest losses, stake off an area that is the width of the combine swath and one foot deep. Run the combine across the staked area. Pick up all grain on the ground (shattered and remaining on the head) within the staked area and count the number of seeds. Divide the number of seeds picked up by the combine swath width to get the number of seeds per square foot lost in the harvesting opera-

The following ratios shows approximate loss in bushels per acre. (Kernels per square foot to equal one bushel per acre). Barley, 13-15; Oats, 10-12: Rye, 21-24; Grain Sorghum, 19-22; Wheat, 18-20.
