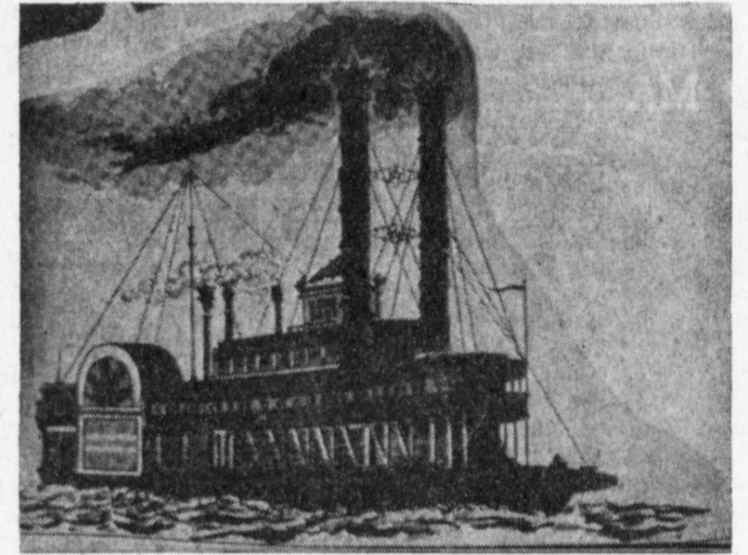

Ag Scholarships Are Available to 4-Hers of County

Senior 4-H members graduating this spring may be interested in applying for a scholarship from the Texas 4-H Foundation.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo offers \$4,000 to 4-H members planning to study agriculture. The C. J. Davidson scholarships are \$2,800; Raymond Dixon Foundation Scholarships are \$400; and Texas Farm Bureau offers a \$500 Scholarship to one boy and one girl in the state. In 1974 John Schumacher of Gainesville was a recipient of a Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Scholarship. Sandy Reiter of Muenster, received the C. J. Davidson Scholarship this past year.

Texas youth must be currently enrolled and actively participating in 4-H. They must rank in the upper one fourth of their class, and plan to attend a Texas College or University.

4-Hers are required to fill out an application form, submit one photo (2"x3" to 5"x7"); a high school transcript; results of Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT); and a statement from the high school principal indicating number in graduating class and rank.

Applications for all the Texas 4-H Foundation Scholarships are available in the County Extension Office, Courthouse basement in Gainesville. They must be submitted to district before April 30.

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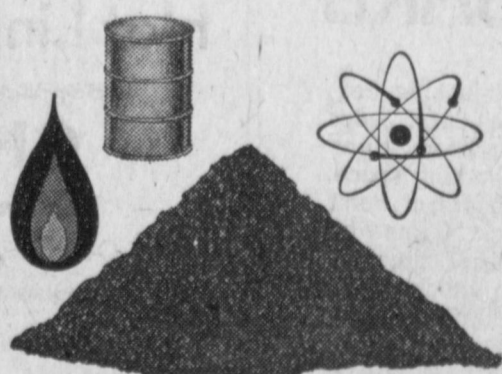
However, in recent years, the cost of gas has risen enormously and the supply is becoming increasingly uncertain.
