Much has been said over the past several years by the civil rights champions about America's debt to the black race to compensate for the miserable years their ancestors had to spend in slavery and still more miserable years of economic and social troubles deriving from the long struggle for acceptance by the public.

Demagogues have exploited those regrettable facts in their effort to promote racism. We have heard too much of hatred based solely on the fact that colored ancestors before the civil war were wretched slaves. Blacks were goaded into despising whites even though they themselves have had no bad experiences. And they have also been led to hate their country because this happened to be a part of its history.

In contrast to that sour attitude it is refreshing to come upon a guest editorial written by Henry Mitchell, pastor of North Star Baptist Church, Chicago.

He notes that a small number of blacks and whites are trying to discourage black Americans from celebrating the bicentennial because of the many years black people were in slavery. He points out that if people opposing the observance "would go to Africa, India, Mexico, China, Vietnam or Russia and see for themselves the deprived, depressed, oppressed and primitive conditions under which thousands of millions of people live, they would realize that out of slavery came blessings for the black people of America."

"The handful of black dudes who are encouraging black Americans to look back only fills their hearts with hate and resentment."

"I know we had slavery in America. I am very much aware of it. But as I travel throughout this world I see the poor living conditions in Africa, where thousands of people are dying because they don't have water to drink, food to eat, shelter, doctors or medical supplies; if slavery were my only transportation, if my only way of coming to America was by slavery, I'd get down on my knees and thank God for slavery. If it had not been for slavery, my family and I would be among the hundreds of thousands of Africans who are starving, naked, out of doors, diseased, and dying for lack of water and medical care."

"If our black forefathers, sleeping in their graves, could see the condition which exists in Africa today compared to the condition of their black American descendants, they would witness that out of their slavery and suffering came a blessing for their offspring."

"Let's not turn back. Let's get involved, not just with the bicentennial, but let's get involved with everything which is building a better America for all Americans."

As we go into the bicentennial year it is hard to imagine a more appropriate thought than this black man's statement. Every person of his race in the US would be a lot happier and more devoted to the country if he realized how fortunate he is. And for his own satisfaction he should be aware that persons of very moderate means over here are living in greater freedom and comfort than the more fortunate people in most other countries.

Blacks do themselves a great injustice when they lend support to the characters who preach dissent and revolution. Usually the agitators are tools of the reds, assisting in the communist goal of world domination. Well, the cooperating blacks ought to know what it's like to live with little comfort and constant fear of the police state.

Other nationalities too could take inspiration from the black minister's message. No other country has so much to offer. No other people has such good reason to keep the blessings that it has.

## Phone Company Reveals List of Rate Increases

Following approval of an increase in telephone rates by the Muenster City Council Monday night, Muenster Telephone Corporation announced a table of increases Tuesday.

The following changes were listed by Alvin Fuhrman, co-owner and manager.

Business phones are up from \$12.50 to \$14.50, and residence phones from \$6.90 to \$7.50. PABX systems and other trunk hunting groups of business lines are 1 1/2 times the business line rate.

The only drop in expense is reduction of federal tax from 7 to 6 per cent.

Charge for mobile service, unchanged since 1963, goes from \$38.50 to \$50.00 for Muenster Channel and \$50.00 to \$65.00 for all channels. And cable TV service is also up, the first since '66, from \$5 to \$6 a month. All of these new rates apply to the Muenster exchange only, not to Myra, Forestburg or Rosston.

Fuhrman added that expansion of the telephone building should be complete by February 1. It will have new facilities for a toll line from Muenster to Denton and other dial equipment. New toll lines are due to be finished by June 1977. Another equipment change is replacing pay phones with the pre-pay single slot type to standardize with larger cities.

## Burleson Asks For Re-Election To U.S. Congress

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Congressman Omar Burleson, who represents the 17th District of Texas in the United States House of Representatives, has announced for re-election. He has filed for a place on the ballot in the Democratic Primary Election on May 1, 1976.

Burleson was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the House. In addition, Congressman Burleson serves on the newly created Budget Control Committee which has as its purpose, relating Federal expenditures to Federal revenues with the goal of reaching a balanced budget.

Survivors are his wife, two sons, one daughter, his mother, four sisters, one half-sister, five brothers, three half-brothers and one grandchild.

## Broken Pipe Halts Water Service

A break in the water main under Highway 82 opposite the Dairy Inn was the reason why an area in southeast Muenster had no water for 15 hours Sunday and Monday.

The cut-off was made at 11 Sunday night and the turn-on at 2 p.m. Monday.

The complete break in the 6 inch cast iron pipe is attributed to contact with rock about two feet under the heavy traffic of highway 82. At the time of installation in the thirties the pipes were not laid on a sand cushion as in recent years, and a number of breaks in the line have been caused by contact with rocks.

## Big Response of JCs Planned at Blood Collection

Prospects for a big response to next Wednesday's Bloodmobile visit appeared to be the best ever as Muenster Jaycees started Tuesday on promoting a big turnout of their membership. Claude Klement and John Schneider, co-chairmen, said their intention is not only to replace the blood used by Bernard Haverkamp but also to have another good supply ready in case it is needed.

Their method is to urge every Jaycee personally to be there. Then, making allowance for members who can't come or can't qualify, they hope to have sixty or more donors.

Meanwhile other community organizations, like the KCs, VFW and Hospital Auxiliary, are contacting their membership asking for pledges and urging all to make appointments for their convenience as well as to streamline the collection.

The hospital office, 759-2271, can be phoned for an appointment.

## Local Blood Bank to Collect Wednesday

Another semi-annual deposit in the Muenster blood bank is scheduled for next Wednesday, January 14, when the bloodmobile from the Red Cross blood center of Wichita Falls will be here for its regular collection.

Facilities will be set up from 2 to 7 p.m. in the K of C Hall, and the Red Cross technicians will be assisted by local hospital and hospital auxiliary personnel.

The quota again will be 100 pints of blood, the quantity normally drawn from the local blood bank in a half year, but hopes for this collection are running considerably higher. The hospital and the blood center are eager to compensate for the abnormally heavy demand on the local bank during the past six months.

Normally about 100 pints are used from the local blood bank, but the demand has been much higher during the present period. This applies to

Muenster Hospital and especially to transfers to other hospitals for use of patients from this hospital district. Bernard Haverkamp, for instance, is reported to have needed a great quantity recently while a patient at Dallas. His friends are reminded that donation of blood now, to replace what was taken out, will be as welcome as on the day it was needed.

Another inducement for generous response is the better quality of volunteer blood as compared with purchased blood. Experience in big city hospitals is showing that many people who sell blood are derelicts needing money and the quality sometimes is less than desirable. A result is increasing effort across the nation to use the purchased blood as little as possible. With this fact in mind, people who give have the satisfaction of knowing that they are helping make better quality blood available to people of the district.

Still another point to consider is the reduced price of a transfusion when volunteer blood is used. There is no charge for the blood because it was given. The only charge is for services, which include collection, packaging, typing, storing, transporting and transfusing. Combined they cost about half as much as a transfusion with blood from a commercial bank.

This saving is available to all patients in Muenster Hospital and to all residents of the hospital district who receive a transfusion in some other hospital.

Muenster is one of 26 communities participating in the Red Cross blood bank program through the Wichita Falls center. Each is supplied by the center and each in its turn provides blood for the entire system. Collection quota for each is determined by the amount it uses in six months.

Because of the community's abnormally big demand on the blood bank the sponsoring organizations, K of C and VFW, and the Muenster Hospital are urging a better than average response. Sign-up sheets are available at the KC and VFW halls and many are being contacted by telephone. And there are others who hopefully will remember, for instance the old reliables who show up every time. Others who will be gratefully welcomed are students over 16. Those between 16 and 17 may give if they have parental permission. If over 17 they do not need permission.

For the convenience of donors as well as bloodmobile personnel, appointments are recommended. Setting a definite time can eliminate waiting and it also helps level off the slack and rush period. The appointment can be made by phoning the hospital, 759-2271.

## Council OKs Increases of Gas and Telephone Rates

Rate increases for Lone Star Gas Company and Muenster Telephone Corporation were approved by the Muenster City Council at its regular meeting Monday. The raises of 10 per cent for the gas company and 12 per cent for the phone company became effective with the next billing.

However, the consumer has a faint ray of hope in the company's provision that raises will be refunded if they are not allowed throughout the system.

The council also approved renewal of the city's current insurance program and adopted a blanket bonding program which covers all employees. This action results from new, more rigid municipal requirements on bonding.

To overcome a recently developed parking problem, the city authorized Police Chief McDonald to tow away cars that block areas which are needed in emergency, such as answering a fire call. This applies especially to the alley behind Fisher's, The Ranch and Muenster Mill as well as to the space south of the fire station and city hall.

And a date for next meeting of the water board was set at January 19.

## Night Parking in 2 Areas Banned By City Council

Police Chief James McDonald this week announced that night time parking will have to be discontinued in two areas near The Ranch because of possible problems in emergency. Those areas are the alley a half block east of Main and the south side of the fire station and city hall. In case of a fire alarm firemen need a clearance to take out the trucks and also a place to park their cars while on duty.

And the alley has been blocked a number of times, a serious hazard if the truck has to go there.

The city council accordingly ordered him to remove any vehicles which could hamper the firemen's efficiency.

McDonald has set a two weeks deadline for getting the message across. After that cars will be towed away and owners will be subject to a tow charge as well as a fine.

## McDonald Lists Violations of Law

Violations of the law in Muenster during December have been reported as follows by James L. McDonald Jr. of the Muenster Police Department:

Fights, 8; Drunk, 12; Driving while intoxicated, 4; Marijuana, 1; Speeding, 13; Impeding traffic, 2; No driver license, 2; Disorderly conduct, 7; Minor possession, 1.

McDonald also reported a slight decline in motor vehicle accidents for the past year. There were 49, as compared with 55 in 1974 and 56 in 1973. Twenty nine of the accidents involved persons without a driver's license and 18 involved persons under the influence of alcohol. Other causes of accidents were speed, failure to yield, improper turns, improper passing, disregarding stop signs and following too close.

## Gain Reported in Deposits, Loans At Muenster Bank

Deposits gained in Muenster State Bank during the past year and also the past quarter. Also loans gained during the past three months and declined during the year.

Responding to the state banking commission's request for a statement of condition as of December 31, 1975, the bank reports total deposits of \$8,988,266.07 and loans of \$3,247,285.52.

This indicates an increase in deposits of \$1,315,418.86 during the past year, and a gain of \$679,216.06 during the past three months. Also it indicates a gain of \$236,492.58 in loans since September 30, 1975, but a drop of \$140,045.85 in loans since December 31, 1974.

Combined records of the four Cooke County banks soared to record highs in both deposits and loans. Total deposits were \$69,483,226, a gain of \$9,874,704 for the year and \$3,723,978 for the quarter. Total loans were \$35,914,612, a gain of \$2,906,041 for the past year and \$1,586,714 for the past three months.

## Bullock Appoints Man to Sherman Comptroller Office

AUSFIN — Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Friday he has appointed Pete Kloppers as manager of his Sherman district office, effective immediately.

He said Kloppers is already on the job.

"I've made the promise that I will turn the Comptroller's Office into the best agency in state government," Bullock said. "To do that, I've got to start out with the best people. Pete Kloppers is one of those."

Kloppers, 28, has been employed in the Comptroller's Dallas field office since January, 1973.

A graduate of East Texas State University with a degree in marketing and management, he spent nearly three years in the Army working for the Pentagon.

## Cold Wave Rips Into Community

The winter's most severe weather moved into the community this week with temperatures dipping below the teens and accompanying wind plunging the chill factor far below zero. Temperature level has seldom, if ever, been above freezing since Sunday.

The coldest was Thursday when thermometers got as low as 6 degrees and the chill factor was estimated at 21 below zero. Wednesday was only a few points higher with a low report of 9 and the chill factor also at minus 21 or lower.

## City Gets \$4508 in Revenue Sharing

The city of Muenster has just received a federal revenue sharing check in the amount of \$4,508. Covering the last quarter of 1975, it is the second remittance of the current fiscal year.

A news release from Omar Burleson this week reveals that total revenue sharing payments in the 17th Congressional District for the second quarter amount to \$1,993,749. Also, total revenue sharing payments to local governments of the district amount to \$31,113,448 since the payments were started in 1972.

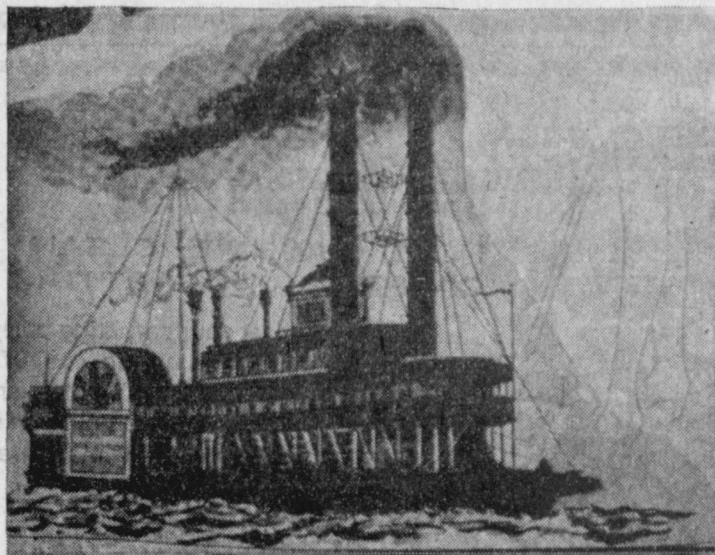

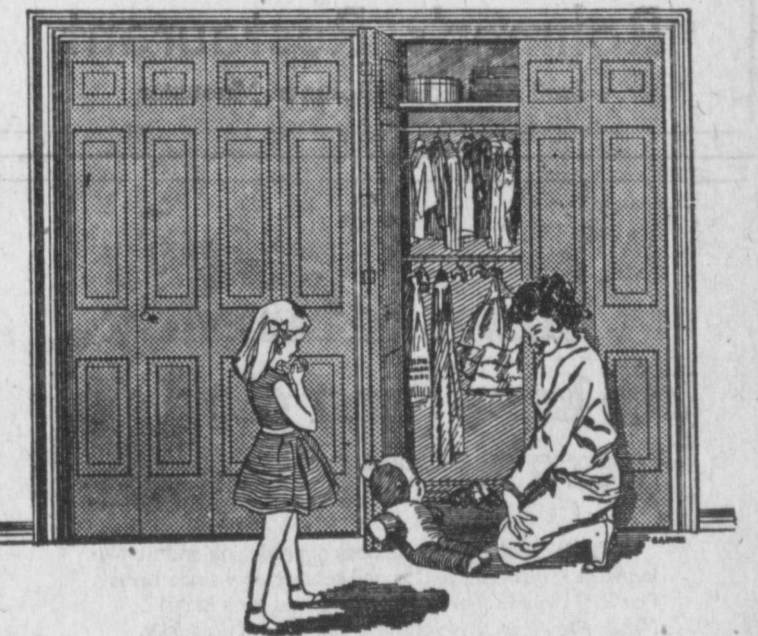

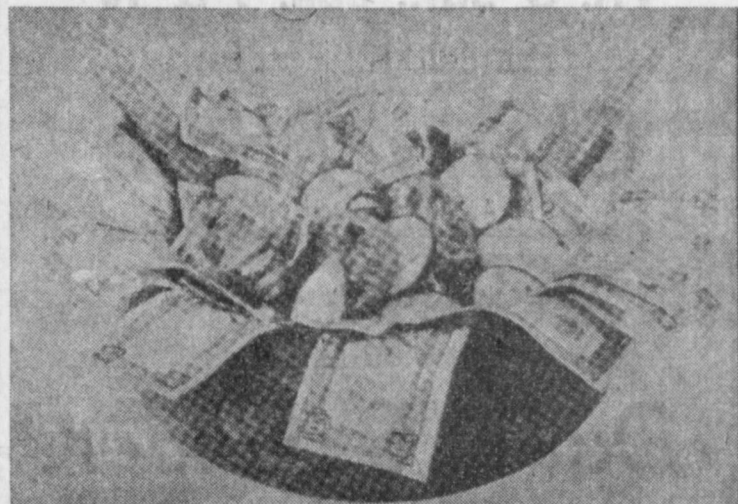

In addition, families not meeting this criteria but with other unusual high expenses due to medical, shelter, disaster or casualty losses, or special education due to mental or physical condition of a child are urged to apply.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application.

No child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color or national origin. The school office has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

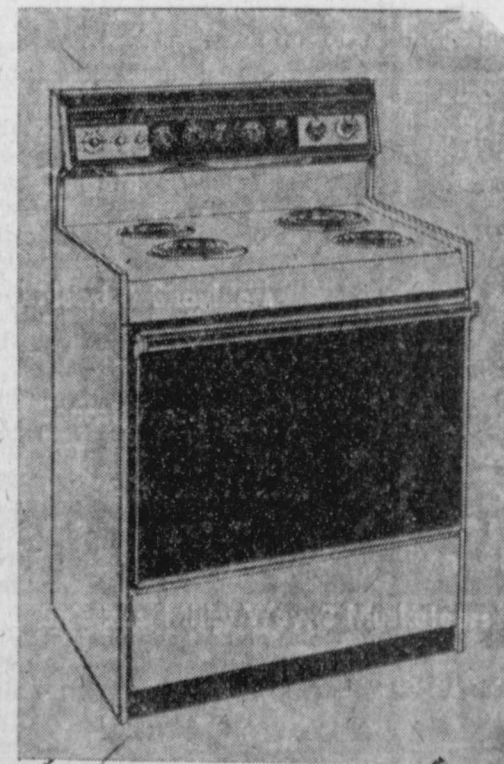
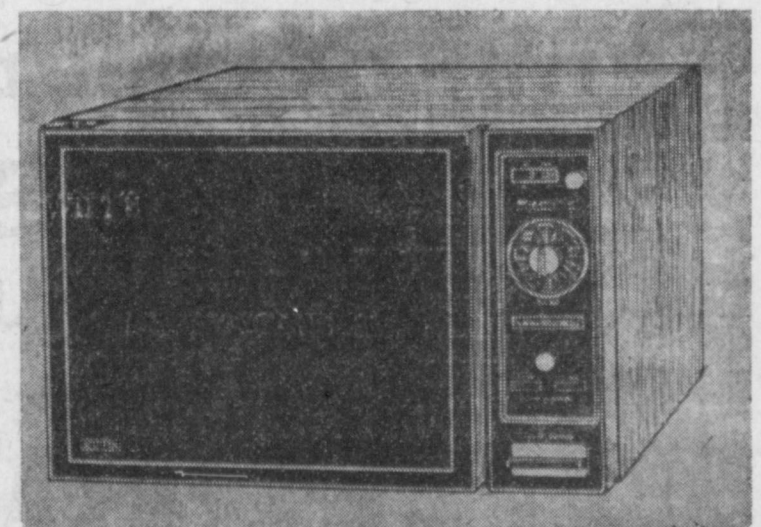

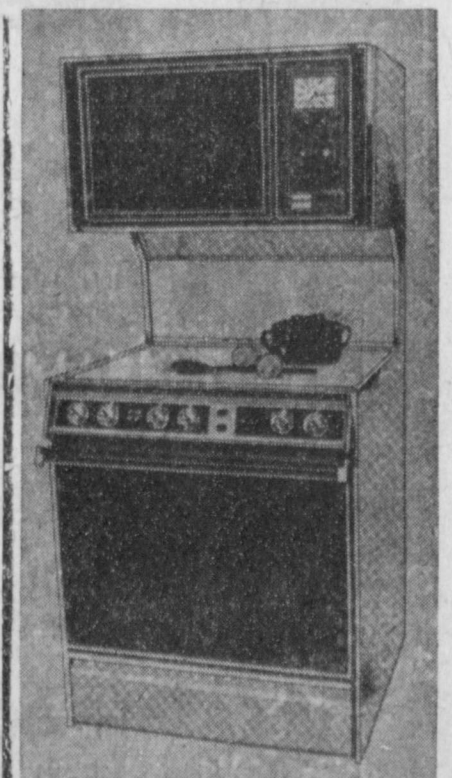
