Solar Heat Captured in Experimental Unit at NBC

An experimental unit built at NBC appears to be pointing in that direction. It is a simple thing, a sheet of metal on which is mounted some 100 to 120 feet of copper water tubing covered by a double sheet of glass. In this case a double glass door was used and the unit is the size of that door. The pipe and the sheet metal. along with the rest of the shallow, box-like structure are painted a dull black, the color that best absorbs the sun's rays. With styrofoam below and the double glass above, the unit is well insulated and

loses little of its heat. The unit's performance has been amazing. Exposed to the sun's rays for only a short time, the water drained from the copper tubing had a temperature of more than 200 degrees. Actually, some steam escaped with it.

This much is accomplished. It is known that the heat can be captured free of charge from the sun's boundless energy. And the question now is how to store the heat for home's needs. use when the sun is not shining that is, every night

Henscheid said that information on some solar units already in use in the northeast, states that a unit can supply 80 per cent of a home's heat needs. Here, he estimated, the percentage should be higher because sunshine is more constant and the less severe weather needs less of the heat to keep a home comfortable.

So far the only established fact is that the solar unit can provide very hot water, but many technical problems still need to be worked out. What is the best size of copper tubing and the most efficient spacing of pipe on the rack and also the best method of insulating to avoid leakage of heat. And finally the best way to avoid leakage of heat from the storage tank.

As regards cost, a fair estimate now is the price of a fireplace. But after that the operating expense is zero. The sun's rays are free, and the volume of heat should provide for about 90 per cent of a

FORT WORTH - The new constitution, adopted on February 15 by a majority of 80,-000, went into practical operation on April 18. The change at home was not only more radical (than in the legislature and the courts) but infinitely more interesting, with a new slate of executive officers elected for the county.

FORT GRIFFIN - Henderson's band of horse thieves stole 26 head of horses from a rancher 18 miles from this place. A part of "Cow Boys" and Tonkaway Indians was organized and a vigorous pursuit instituted. A portion of the thieving band was overhauled on Croton Cree, 80 miles distant, two days later. Joe Watson, "Red," "Larapie Dan" and a man named Burr were captured. The thieves were accompanied by a prostitute called "Sally."

SAN ANTONIO - Continuing the tradition of military exploration of frontier areas in advance of settlement, Colonel Shafter has mapped the complete topography of the Llano Estacado. His report is at variance with the longentertained opinion that the Staked Plains were sterile and unprofitable territory. He knows of certain localities where privileges to stockmen and farmers could be enjoyed as full as in other inhabited portions of the West. He strongly recommends that posts be established at several points on the plains, ostensibly to protect the frontier against Indians. But he also realizes that where posts are established, towns soon fol-

AUSTIN — The opening day of the 15th Legislature was April 18. The Speaker of the House and Secretary of the Senate were elected. In the Senate resolutions were passed to provide a copy of the new constitution to each senator and that ice be furnished the Senate at not more than two cents a pound. The senators drew the numbers of their respective seats in the Senate chamber.

AUSTIN - San Jacinto Day was celebrated April 21 all over the state. In Austin the celebration was the occasion of the finest display in the history of the city. Some 80 of the old veterans assembled. Eloquent oratory, a civic procession and banquets were featured in the celebration:

AUSTIN - The campaigns of the three candidates for U. S. Senator, Governor Coke, Judge Ireland and Judge Hancock, are in full swing. Legislators who are friends of Governor Coke caucussed and counted 45 sure votes. They anticipate other votes for Coke in the final struggle that will go for Judge Hancock or Judge Ireland at first. It is not likely that the legislature will decide the issue on the first ballot.

Often the trail to a counterfeiter begins with an alert bank teller, or others in the bank who daily handle currency. Some experienced bank personnel can immediately tell by the "feel" of a bank note that it is counterfeit, no matter how good the engraving or printing job.

Once alerted by the bank that counterfeit bills are being circulated, trained Treasury agents have been amazingly successful tracking down counterfeiters. As a result, the country's currency has never been placed in serious jeopardy by bogus bills.

The U.S. has never taken kindly to those who would counterfeit its money. At one time, counterfeiting, or passing counterfeits, was declared "a felony punishable without benefit of clergy" . . . a legal maldiction reserved for only the more heinous crimes.



Texas Power & Light generating plants require enormous quantities of natural gas, lignite coal and, when deliveries of gas are curtailed, fuel oil, to produce electricity.

In 1975, TP&L's fuel costs were \$147 million, more than five and a half times greater than in 1970. In 1970, only 15 cents of each dollar paid to TP&L by its customers was used to purchase fuel. In 1975, fuel required 37 cents of each revenue dollar.

To offset the rising prices of natural gas and fuel oil, TP&L and two other electric companies are constructing large generating units which use relatively low cost lignite coal as fuel. Two such units have been in operation since 1972, a third unit was placed in service in 1974 and a fourth in 1975. Five other lignite-fueled units are now under construction and still more are being planned.
