



The resolution committee of the Republican state convention last week gave an encouraging sign that conservatism and sanity may make a comeback in this year's general election. The slate of resolutions drawn by state leaders as recommendations for the party platform urged defeat of the Equal Rights Amendment, called for mandatory sentencing in weapons related crimes, and proposed a moratorium on federal gun control legislation.

The committee also approved a resolution which supports equal educational opportunity but supports the neighborhood school concept and opposes forced busing.

The list of proposals harmonizes all the way with the keynote speech delivered by Former Governor John Connally, who cited polls to indicate that the nation's mood is one of conservatism. Connally said that the nation is sick of the lack of morality and integrity in Washington . . . that "we ought to abolish ideas of self service and provide ideas for public service."

The past several weeks have brought out the truth of this statement most emphatically. The sexcapades of congressmen have been disgusting, but the attitude of their peers and the media in brushing the scandal aside is little less obnoxious. Some of those characters like to insinuate that a shabby personal life is the private concern of the people involved and the rest of us should keep our noses out as long as the law is not violated. As they say it, the affairs are all right as long as the salaries paid to the women can be justified by legitimate services.

In a cynical age that view, unforgotten, is widely accepted. But a big percentage of our population still believes in decency and the ten commandments. It believes that fitness for public life presupposes moral fitness, that a person who will not observe the law of God cannot really be trusted in other matters.

We the people have had the odd balls imposed on us for far too many years. Many elected representatives as well as judges have gone overboard on the matter of equality. Their attitude is that deviates like communists, crooks, homosexuals and the like are as good as other people, but average folks of the grass roots believe that anyone who does not live by the divine law is not fit to pass the civil laws we have to live by.

Public opinion polls reveal that politicians rate lower than any other classification of people in the country. Maybe that's a good basis for hope that a lot of them will be eliminated in the November election.

Two kinds of politicians need to be voted out. The first group is those of the shabby morals whose behavior is a disgrace to the country and who, because of that, lack the principle to stand up for what's right — or whose votes might be influenced by political blackmail. The other kind is the liberals whose poor judgment have brought on the nation's social and economic nightmare.

These are the characters who spend and spend, claiming that the debt is only money we owe ourselves. Either they don't understand or don't care that their folly has caused the inflation which steals the value from our savings. Though in another way, those people are as much a menace to national welfare as their immoral colleagues.

Still more political menaces are those with twisted social ideas. They are full of concern for the unfortunate criminals who are victims of the social order. They are people who go all out to protect the rights of criminals but show little concern for the victims. Such thoughts inspire the belief that the country is turning conservative, just as Connally said, and that resolutions at the Republican convention ought to have a lot of voter appeal.

For instance, the party's opposition to ERA nonsense. The equal rights idea is presented as an equalizer of the sexes but women will lose rather than gain in becoming equal.

Anti busing also makes sense. The big majority of

Donors Asked for Next Deposit in Local Blood Bank

Sponsoring organizations of the Muenster Blood Bank program have started recruiting for their semi annual collection on Wednesday, July 14. The operation will be conducted by Bloodmobile personnel of the regional Red Cross blood center of Wichita Falls, who will have their facilities set up in the KC Hall from 2 to 7 p.m.

Collection quota is 100 pints to offset the normal use of blood from the local program during a six months period. Again the aim will be to top the quota.

Muenster did that in a big way at its last collection in January when friends came by the dozens to replace blood that had been used by Bennie Haverkamp while in a Dallas hospital. Volume given was 155 pints.

The blood program is regarded as a district asset of the community and hospital. Because of it the hospital patients and district residents who are patients in other hospitals can receive blood which has been given rather than bought. They do not pay for the blood but only for handling, packaging, storing, transporting, etc. Net cost is about half that of commercial blood.

Some 26 communities of North Texas and South Oklahoma are participating in the program. Each has a quota determined by its own use, each draws on the central supply and each in its turn provides for all.

First Half Year Of Local Rainfall Is Almost Normal

With less than a half inch of rain the community's moisture record can stand at exactly normal as the first half of the year closes.

As of Wednesday, the total for 1976 is 17.71 inches, and the average for the past ten years was 36.13, which sets normal for the end of June at 18.07. The local rain record needs only .36 to reach that mark.

Moisture of the past week measured .84 on the 18th and .37 on the 19th. The present reading for the month is 1.64. Moisture condition has been fine since a six months dry spell was broken in April. Grain crops, after discouraging early prospects, turned out better than average. Also pastures and hay and feed crops are thriving.

City Water Problem Needs Solution Soon

Statistics, projections and estimates presented by Don Fleming, consulting engineer, last week revealed that Muenster and other cities dependent on the Trinity Sand Formation for their water supply are facing the serious problem of dry wells some time in the next several years.

It was also shown that Muenster is at the upper end of the formation, hence it will be one of the first cities to run out of ground water. However the estimates of water level in the wells and the rate of water level decline each year indicate that some 10 to 12 years production can be expected.

On the other hand there is a problem. Because water level is lower the pumping is greater and production total is seriously reduced. Daily capacity was 662,400 gallons in 1971 and is down to 414,720 at this time. This means that rationing will be required this summer if the weather gets hot and dry. It also means that the supply from existing wells will decline every year from now on. Under that circumstance, the time is already late. Muenster urgently needs to provide more water, either from a surface reservoir or more wells.

If the choice favors wells, the first is needed now and another in 24 to 36 months, and their estimated cost would be about \$210,000. Within 10 to 12 years two more wells would be needed. Including inflation in the estimate, the total cost of the four wells would be \$500,000 to \$700,000.

The help is available now, but there is no assurance that it will be available later. It means that Muenster will save more than a half million dollars by acting soon. And there is still another consideration. The longer it is delayed the more inflation will add to its cost.

Whether larger are smaller, the expected volume of available water is estimated at more than adequate. Population figures of the past several decades have been projected forty years and indicate a local population of 3000 in 2017, which is about double the present population. The volume available to the city would be 325 million gallons a year from the larger lake and 163 million from the smaller lake. By comparison, the city's average use in the past five years has been slightly less than 82 million a year. When completed a few years from now the small lake would provide more than twice as much water as needed whereas the declining local wells could hardly be expected to meet the current demand.

As regards size of the two proposed lakes, the large one would have 452 acres at spillway level and the reservoir capacity would be 7473 acre feet or about 2.436 billion gallons of which 1.2 billion would be available to the city. The small lake would have 418 acres at spillway level and the reservoir capacity would be 5563 acre feet or about 1.8 billion gallons of which .635 billion would be available to the city.

The mini-park project for kiddies, sponsored by the Garden Club, started shaping up Tuesday evening as the Jaycees dug 24 post holes and set the posts for a 5 foot cyclone fence.

Jaycees have agreed to do the work of getting the mini park established. So, they'll be back soon to set up the fence and install play ground equipment.

Two events will begin at 8 p.m. A square dance and a musical program will take place in the rodeo arena and a special time for visiting, singing and refreshments is set for the Community Center. Everyone is invited.

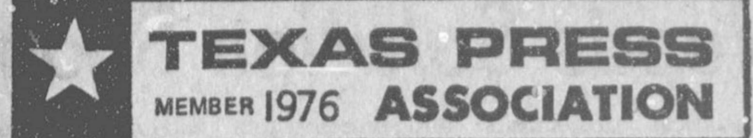
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Over 100 Attend Reunion Of John Fette Descendants

America's early colonists were hard put to come up with hard coin to pay for the goods they purchased from Britain, so they experimented with substitutes for metal.

From New England to Virginia, wampum or shells used by the Indians became the accepted small coinage. In 1641 in Massachusetts, it was made legal tender, subject to some limits as to the size of the transaction, at the rate of six shells to the penny.

Shells came in two denominations, black and white, the first being double the value of the second. The acceptability of the shells depended on their being redeemed by the Indians in pelts, making the Indians, in effect, central bankers of their day. Beaver pelts were the reserve currency into which wampum could be converted.

As civilization moved westward, beaver became scarce and wampum stopped being convertible, thus losing its purchasing power. It soon disappeared from circulation.

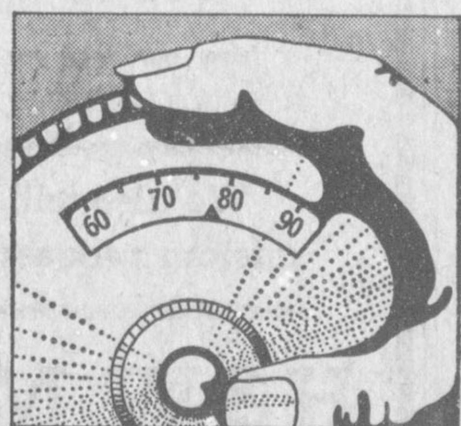

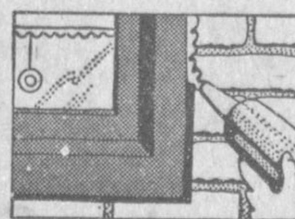

Replace missing or worn weather stripping around door and window openings. Caulk around the outside of doors and windows where the frames meet the walls.

You may want to install simple "storm windows" . . . plastic sheeting attached to lightweight wooden frames which completely cover window openings. Awnings will also help.

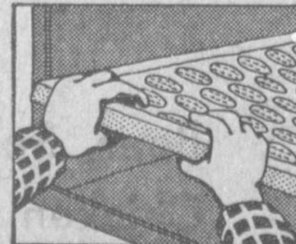

AUSTIN — Both houses of the Legislature this week passed a bill to appropriate \$40,000 to complete the Agricultural and Mechanical College at Bryan. Debate in the House was extensive. One of the most influential arguments for passage was the necessity of refunding \$150,000 to the federal government if the entire sum of \$40,000 was not appropriated.

AUSTIN — The condition between Castroville and Eagle Pass is critical according to Captain McNelly, who arrived here Monday with prisoners he arrested in Atascosa County. More than a hundred outlaws from different sections have invaded it and hold the reins of power. The law is trampled upon and civil officers are powerless. The County Judge of Maverick does not dare to sleep in his own house. King Fisher's band take property from citizens in daylight, and they dare not resist or attempt to recover it.

COMANCHE COUNTY — Threshing is going actively on. Mr. J. B. Green, formerly of Waco, has a thresher which averages 350 bushels per day.

CORPUS CHRISTI — Since the first of January there have been 7,393 bags of wool shipped from Corpus Christi, weighing 1,494,063 pounds. Wool dealers in town say the amount of wool on hand and unshipped totals 519,577 pound. Actual receipts total 2,013,640 pounds. It is estimated that not more than two thirds of the spring clip has been received here.

HILL COUNTY — There was a strong prejudice and a very general desire that the death penalty be dealt to a man named Ferrel who was found guilty of murder in the second degree and sentenced to the penitentiary for 25 years. Had he killed Scroggins, whom he no doubt intended to kill, nobody would have cared greatly, but his killing a woman caused the most intense indignation.


