The month just passed is the dryest January on record here, according to a report this week from Steve Moster. The total was only .08 inch. and the next dryest January was .10 inch in 1963. Average for the month during the past ten years is 1.64 inch.

That average has been gradually dropping in the past three decades, Moster added. It was 1.87 for the first ten years of record and 1.84 for the next 10. On the other hand the 10 year average for the full year is going up. It was 33.21 the first decade, 34.15 the second and 36.04 the third.

Wettest of the 30 years was 51.80 inches in 1957 and dryest was 19.06 in 1956. Total moisture here since

October 1 is only 3.52 inches.

It is completely opposite from the harmony and progress reports brought back to this country by visiting politicians. Cuba is still a land of slavery, misery and fear, he said.

After three years in the cane field, freedom was in sight for the Juarez family, but it almost vanished as a few authorities proposed keeping him in Cuba. His good fortune was that he and his wife and daughter were able to get on the first boat before passage was revoked. The boat went to Spain, arriving arriving in New York on June 8, 1971. And their next destination was Baton Rouge to
