On Proposed Lake Radiator Business The federal payroll now includes almost five million persons, which amounts to 2.36 per cent of the entire population. The great bureaucracy has 211,000 clerical workers, 145,000 engineers, 13,000 lawyers, 5,000 telephone operators

and 15,000 plumbers. Another fact about your government is that it owns 761 million acres of land, which is one third of the country's total. Included in all of Alaska, 87 per cent of Nevada, 66 per cent of Utah, 64 per cent of Idaho, and 52 per cent of Oregon.

More interesting statistics: Federal office space owned and leased by the government feet. Also, your government is spending \$374 billion this year, and the gross national product is \$1,161.8 billion . . from which one can see that almost one third of the country's total goods and services is used by Uncle Sam.

Getting back to the subject of federal employees, it is interesting to notice the amount of pay on which those people have to make ends meet and the handsome salary increases they have had in the past several years. Listed here are the annual salaries of some of them, not counting allow-ances, for the year 1964 and now. President, \$100,000, now \$200,000; vice president \$43,-000, now \$65,600; speaker of the House \$35,000, now \$65,600; majority and minority leaders, \$22,500, now \$52,000; chief justice \$40,000, now \$65,600, associate justices \$39,500, now \$63,000; judges of federal district courts \$30,000, now \$42,-000; comptroller general \$30, 000, now \$44,600; members of Congress \$22,500, now \$44,600; Cabinet secretaries, \$35,000, now \$63,000; Agency heads, \$30,000, now \$44,600; under secretaries, \$28,500, now \$42,-000; assistant secretaries, \$27, \$26,000; now \$37,800.

You may want to install simple "storm windows" . . . plastic sheeting attached to lightweight wooden frames which completely cover window openings. Awnings will also help. Keep fireplace dampers closed when not in use. Close blinds or



Keep furniture and draperies away from air outlets and



Check filters every 30 days. If you have the permanent type, clean them by manufacturer's directions; if they're the disposable type, replace them when they're dirty. 



The family farm could become a vanished specie if revisions in federal and state estate tax laws aren't made soon.

North Texans Get Tax Refund Checks

Over one million tax refund checks averaging \$367.42 have been mailed out to North Texans this year, but IRS district director A. W. McCanless reminded taxpayers today that the receipt of a refund check is no guarentee that the IRS won't audit the tax return at a later date.

"A refund check only means the initial processing of the returns has been completed," McCanless' said. "Checking the returns is time consuming, and an audit may not take place until several months after the refund check arrives."

A federal tax return can be audited at any time before the statute of limitations expires. The statute of limitations is generally three years from the date the return is

The IRS suggests that tax-payers keep their financial records for at least as long as the statute of limitations is running. Complete and order-ly records can help to substantiate income and expense items and itemized deductions if the return is eventually audited.

Some records, such as those concerning the sale or purchase of real estate, should be kept indefinitely.
