It's a safe bet that one of the things that particularly irritated you when you filled out your income tax report was that \$600 exemption allowed for supporting each member of your household for a year. If there ever was an unrealistic figure, that is it. And you can find no better authority to quote on the subject than your Uncle Sam himself — that is, on the cost of taking care of his dependents, not yours. It seems to be a matter of "do as I say, not as I do."

For that \$600 you are expected to satisfy the needs of an energetic growing youngster. A casual reference to your family's cost of living tells you that you are far above the figure, and furthermore that you could not if you tried trim your budget enough to meet the figure. The plain fact is food and clothing take most if not all of the allowance, after which there are lots of other needs like house, furniture, car, utilities, illness, recreation, etc. — all normal expenses in a normal standard of living. All of us know we're getting gyped on that allowance.

And how does that compare with allowance Uncle Sam figures for his dependents? Let's look. First of all Social Security pays \$168 a month to take care of an old person, who obviously needs much less than a youngster.

About the most conservative estimate to meet an individual's basic needs is in military service. Someone set that figure \$1076 a year, almost twice as much as your 1040 form allows.

Even a prison, which you would expect to do a minimum of splurging on the individual, spends a lot more than the IRS limit. San Quintin, they say keeps a man for \$2,084 a year and Corona Prison keeps a woman for \$2,930 a year.

Do you want a few more comparisons? For a good one, look at the Job Corps, where an individual's keep costs more than at Harvard. And then there's a federal program called VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America) which spent \$3.1 million last year on 202 trainees — over \$15,000 for each individual.

In fairness, we have to admit, of course, that some figures mentioned do not represent the amounts spent directly on the persons being supported and trained by government programs. Costs include the full expense of administration, a very considerable portion of which consists of fat salaries to thousands of political cronies.

The most outrageous example of this federally authorized racket is the War on Poverty, as recently revealed by Representative Ayres of Ohio. The statistics he quotes on that operation will make the average person's head swim. In fact, we are amazed that even official Washington will tolerate a program so plainly in violation of conscience and common sense.

Top general of that war is Sargent Shriver with a salary of \$30,000 a year. Top assistants to him are 23 fellows who are supposed to know all about fighting poverty, each raking in \$25,000 a year. For an idea of how they really rate, consider that General Westmoreland, commander of US forces in Vietnam, has a base pay of \$23,286.

But that's not the half of it. So many chiefs need a lot of Indians, actually, about 2350 of them. And they too are doing all right financially. Over a thousand of them have salaries over \$10,000 a year.

Some related figures disclosed by Representative Ayres concern the OEO (Office of Economic Opportunity), the bureaucracy one step higher than the poverty bureaucracy, and to which the poverty program is responsible. That outfit has 310 on its staff who make more than \$17,055 a year. FBI has only 192 and the Office of Education only 172 who top that figure. Paradoxical as it sounds, there's big money in Poverty.

Right of Way for Muenster-Lindsay Road Completed

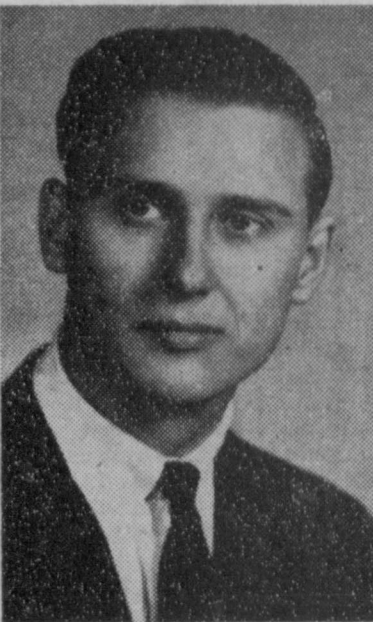
County Judge Bill Carroll announced today that Cooke County has completed the acquisition of right-of-way for an additional two lane highway from Lindsay to Muenster.

The two new lanes will be parallel to and south of present U.S. Highway 82 from Lindsay to Rock Creek and parallel to and north of U.S. Highway 82 from Rock Creek to Muenster.

The road will be built by the Texas Highway Department and it is expected that the contract will be awarded in June.

There were 16 tracks of land acquired by purchase by the county and one tract was acquired by condemnation. The tract condemned was heard by condemnation commissioners on Monday. The condemnation commissioners were Richard Grewing of Muenster, Robert Bentley of Era and E. L. Mosely of Gainesville. The condemnation commissioners awarded \$7,198.00 to Mr. and Mrs. Tony Felderhoff of Muenster for a 7.3 acre tract of land near Muenster.

The State and the County share equally the expense of acquiring the right-of-way for the highway.

About 1100 Hear Progress Report Of Electric Co-op

Members of the Cooke County Electric Cooperative Association had their biggest annual meeting in many years Monday night at the Show Barn of Colonial Acres Farm. Total attendance was estimated at 1100, about 400 more than usual.

The number of members registering was 496, indicating actual attendance of about twice as many members because only one person of a member couple registered to qualify for the voting and drawing. Others there were non members.

At the election of directors, members unanimously approved the recommendation of their nominating committee, re-electing J. A. Klement and Doye Doty without additional nominations from the floor.

After the meeting directors met briefly and elected their officers as follows. Jack Crownover and Al Wiesman were re-elected president and vice-president and J. A. Klement was elected secretary to succeed Doye Doty.

Manager Michael Sloan in his report to the members said that the co-op had increased its total operating revenue by 9.2 per cent over the 1964 total and its net operating revenue was \$386,533, an increase of \$77,853 over the 1964 net. During the year the co-op made payments of \$232,605 to REA, reducing the overall remaining debt to \$457,270. At this time the co-op is \$900,319 ahead in its payment schedule, and member equity in the co-op is 87.8 per cent.

Sloan said that the system added 51 meters in 1965, also that its exceptional safety record now stands at 16 years without a lost time accident, and that it continues to meet consumers desires for dependable, low cost energy.

Interest of readers and enthusiasm of staffers caused the library to grow by leaps and bounds, necessitating rearrangement of quarters in city hall and finally outgrowing its location completely. The move to a building of its own was made last February.

Mrs. Joe Luke succeeded Mrs. Weinzapfel as librarian following her resignation in January 1965. At the beginning of this year the library had 2100 volumes.

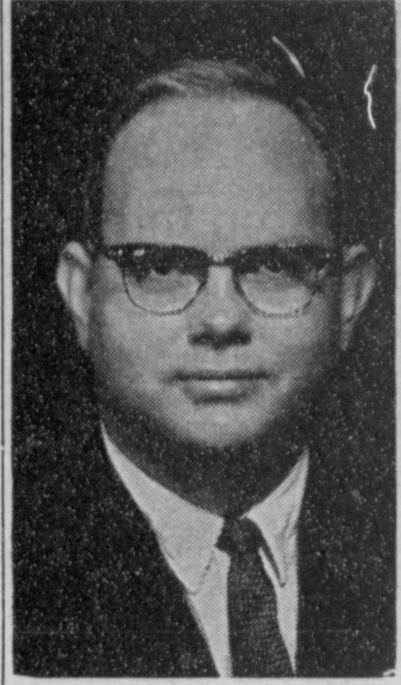
Swimming, surfing, boating, and relaxing on the beach

TP&L to Dedicate 500,000 KW Plant At Stryker Creek

The largest single-shaft turbine-generator now in service in the world, Stryker Creek No. 2, will be formally dedicated Friday, April 29, at Texas Power & Light Company's Stryker Creek Steam Electric Station northwest of Nacogdoches.

H. G. Ebdon, chairman of the board of Combustion Engineering, Inc., will deliver the dedicatory address. Included in the dedication ceremonies will be a luncheon and a tour of TP&L's Stryker Creek facilities.

TP&L began construction of Stryker No. 2, generating unit capable of supplying 500,000-kilowatts of electricity, in the fall of 1963. Recently, the new unit joined the Company's existing 125,000-kilowatt generating unit at Stryker Creek in providing electric power for the cities and towns in TP&L's 52-county service area.

In addition to the large turbine-generator, Stryker No. 2 possesses the world's largest capacity gas-fired boiler. The boiler is 172 feet tall, and the superheater outlet pressure of 2670 pounds per square inch is the highest pressure of any sub-critical boiler in the world. The boiler was supplied by Combustion Engineering.

Approximately 9,700 cubic yards of concrete were used in constructing the power plant. The largest single placement of concrete — 1,380 cubic yards — was used to erect the upper turbine pedestal.

Adjacent to the power plant is a 2,300-acre man-made lake. The earth dam and reservoir were constructed by a water district in East Texas when Stryker No. 1 went into service in 1958.

W. W. Lynch, TP&L president, said the new unit represented "a continuing phase of our construction program which is designed to have at all times abundant power for all the needs of the areas we serve."

Big Driller

Tulsa's huge Golden Driller, to be the symbol of the International Petroleum Exposition, May 12-21, will be no less conspicuous than Big Tex at the State Fair of Texas. He stands 75 feet tall, weighs 48,000 pounds and will rest one of his hands on an oil derrick.
