that people who paid poll tax

To this column the decision involves more than just the immediate mess created by it. Poll tax has its merit, as indicated by the fact that it was retained by Texans in a special vote last year. And it is not necessarily an improper "charge on a very precious constitutional right" as the federal judges said. As set up it was a personal tax, a means of raising funds for the state government, certainly not an unreasonable demand for the services every person receives from the state. But unfortunately its name came from the penalty for non-payment forfeiture of right to vote in the next year. So it was known as a poll tax. But even so it was not unfair or unreasonable. Anyone who failed in his district meet. duty of citizenship should not expect to exercise his right of citizenship. It's possible furthermore that the quality of Texas voters was improved by the people who eliminated themselves as delinquent citizens.

As regards the old complaint that poor people can't afford to vote, it is even more true, that deserving people of limited means usually found a way, and the poll tax was no more a burden to them than some other taxes and other expenses they have to pay. It's much more correct to say that people who do not vote simply do not care to vote. Especially nowadays the complaint has little meaning. Inflation has made poll tax much smaller than it used to be.
