Big Changes OKd In State Law on Driver's License

Major changes in Texas drivers license laws have been approved by both houses. Bill increases minimum age

for license from 15 to 16 for those who complete approved driver training courses and to 18 for those without such training. Hardship licenses are permitted for 15-year-olds where there is a licensed adult driver in the front seat. Motor scooter and motorcycle operators must be at least 15, and for commercial licenses, 17.

Present licenses will be replaced by a plastic card with a color photograph of the driver. New ones will be good for four instead of two years and will cost \$6 instead of \$3. Drivers may be required to take a new competency examias proposed in the original



One of the great freedoms we Americans share is the right to travel in our country when and where we please. It is a fredom to be preserved for all of us. Let's not abuse it.

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

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
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Final Rites for Smyrel Owens, 48, Nancy Bernauer of Gaines- Held at Marysville

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

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
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
