## Medders Fiscal Adventure Ends In Bankrupt Sale

A crowd which was expected to match any of the previous party crowds in size is gathering at Colonial Acres Coliseum today for the bankrupt sale which brings an end to the financial adventure of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Medders.

Anticipated attendance was estimated up to 5,000 for the big auction which began at 9 a.m. under supervision of Bankruptcy Referee Joe D. Hoffstutler and Auctioneer Wayne Cook Associates.

Principal items on the auction list were 238 registered Red and Black Angus cattle, 70 commercial cattle, 11 registered Appaloosa horses, a ranch near Saint Jo, a farm north of Muenster, a brick house in Dallas, \$40,000 worth of Christmas decorations, automobiles, farm machinery, stock trailers, irrigation system, office equipment, veterinary equipment and supplies, saddles, complete beauty shop, trophy case and trophies and many other items.

Not included for auction is the 185 acre Colonial Acres Farm with its mansion and several barns. The Medders claim it as their homestead.

The rain during the past weekend was a dandy, the best this community has had in more than six months. Measurements listed on Steve Mosier's official weather record were .05 inch on Saturday and 2.31 on Sunday for a total of 2.36. However measures varied widely over the area from just over an inch to more than 4 inches.

While doing wonders for pastures and growing crops, the rain had practically no effect on grain. Harvesting that started late last week has just been delayed, not hurt. A few combines were back at work Tuesday, more started Wednesday, and grain dealers expected to be busy by Thursday.

Moisture total for May up to Wednesday is 3.68 inches following 3.82 in April. Combined measure of the previous months was 2.48, making the year's total of 9.98 inches.

## Father Drew Talks At Baccalaureate Of Muenster High

To attain knowledge, to have the courage to use that knowledge and to be guided by a spirit of service to God were the three objectives of adult life held up to Muenster High School graduates at their baccalaureate service Sunday night in the MHS auditorium.

Their speaker was Father Joseph Drew, CSP chaplain of the Newman Club of SMU.

He told the class to keep studying and attaining knowledge so that, in the words of Abraham Lincoln, it would serve them later in life. But he also reminded them that risks are involved in decisions and they will have to apply courage in putting their knowledge to use. All greatness is rooted in risk, he said. ## Big Changes OK'd In State Law on Driver's License

Major changes in Texas drivers license laws have been approved by both houses.

Bill increases minimum age for license from 15 to 16 for those who complete approved driver training courses and to 18 for those without such training. Hardship licenses are permitted for 15-year-olds where there is a licensed adult driver in the front seat. Motor scooter and motorcycle operators must be at least 15, and for commercial licenses, 17.

Present licenses will be replaced by a plastic card with a color photograph of the driver. New ones will be good for four instead of two years and will cost \$6 instead of \$3. Drivers may be required to take a new competency examination when they apply for a new license. However, re-examination is not compulsory, as proposed in the original bill.

License suspension period for violations was increased from six to 12 months for the first offense and from 12 to 18 months for repeat offenses, subject to the court's discretion. Driving while license is suspended will be punishable by fines up to \$500 and a maximum of six months in jail.
