

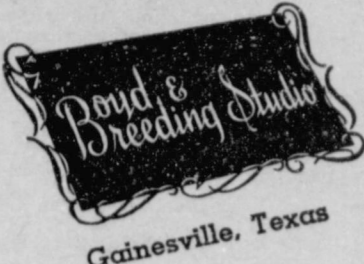

**Public Notice**

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE No. 28 RELATING TO AND PROHIBITING THE OBSTRUCTION OF ANY STREET, SIDE WALKS OR ALLEY WAYS IN THE CITY OF MUESTER AND SUPPLEMENTING ORDINANCE No. 28, HEREBY DECLARING VIOLATION TO ENCLOSE ANY STREET, ALLEY WAY OR SIDE WALK OR TO OBSTRUCT ANY SIDE WALK, STREET OR ALLEY WAY AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR SUCH VIOLATION.

Section I. From and after the passage of this Ordinance, all previous ordinances relating to street, alley way and side walks obstructions are hereby amended as herein set forth. Section II. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firms, corporations to obstruct or cause to be obstructed, or enclose or cause to be enclosed any street, alley way or sidewalk in the City of Muenster, Cooke County, Texas. Section III. Obstruction shall mean to deposit or allow to be deposited, placed or allow to be placed or permit any type of materials, including benches, lumber, iron, tin, chairs, junk, fences, including any

type of material or substance which may in any way obstruct any street, alley way or side walk or which may enclose such street, alley way or side walk. Section IV. Any person, persons, firms, or corporations so obstructing, allowing or causing such obstructions or enclosing or allowing to be enclosed any streets, alley ways, side walks in the City of Muenster shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be demanded to remove such obstruction immediately and in addition thereto shall be fined for a sum of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$25.00 and each day shall constitute a separate offense (each day such obstruction remains after being demanded to have same removed shall constitute a separate offense).

The subject covered in the Ordinance creates an emergency under the police power and under the health and welfare of the City of Muenster, and the rules requiring three separate readings of Ordinances is here by suspended, and this Ordinance shall be and become effective upon its adoption and passage by the City Council of the City of Muenster.

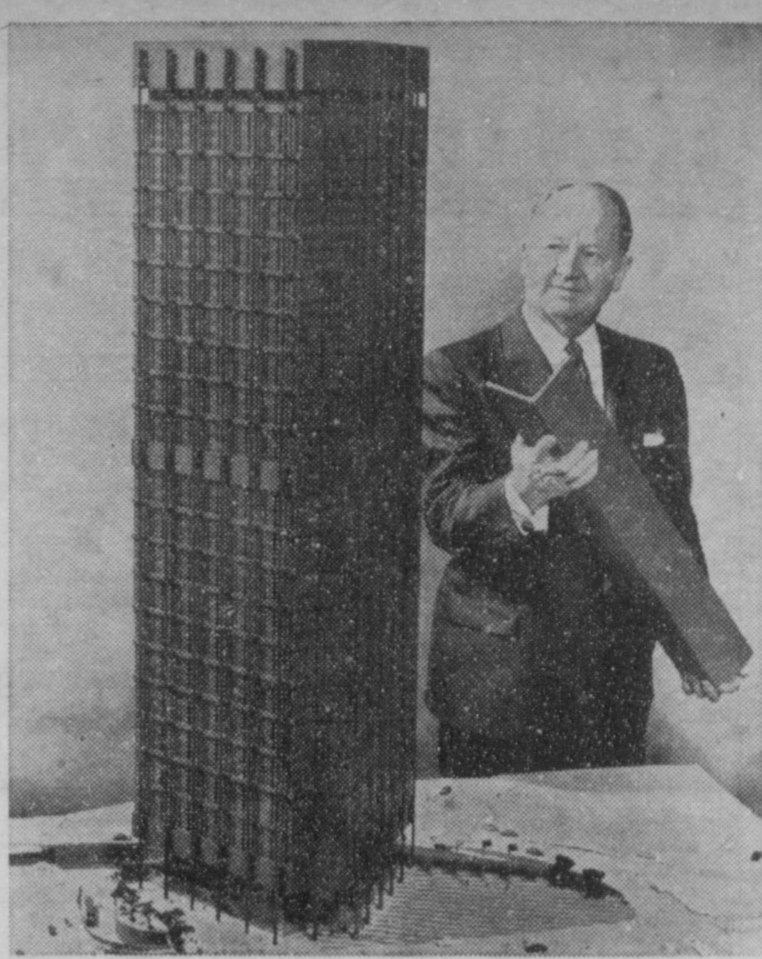

A 64-ACRE BUILDING ON A THREE-ACRE SITE is this model of the world's second largest high-rise office building, being studied by United States Steel's President, Leslie B. Worthington. To be the Corporation's Pittsburgh headquarters when completed in 1970, the 64-story, triangular-shaped structure will be the tallest skyscraper in the world outside New York and Chicago. Only New York's Pan-Am Building, among high-rise office structures, will contain a greater gross area than the new building, which provides almost an acre per floor.

Mr. Worthington is holding a sample of USS COR-TEN steel which will be used for the exposed columns and exterior walls of the building. The special steel which will be left bare and unpainted will weather to a deep russet, cinnamon-like color. Originally developed in the early 1930's for use in railroad freight cars, the steel is becoming a popular architectural material for exposed and unpainted applications.

The building, 841 feet high, will be a pioneer showcase of new materials, new products, and new architectural and engineering concepts.

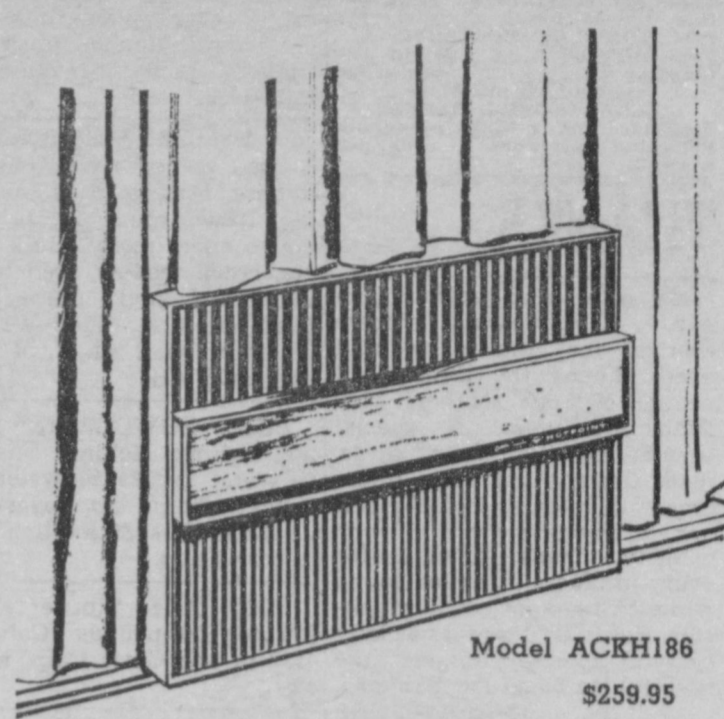

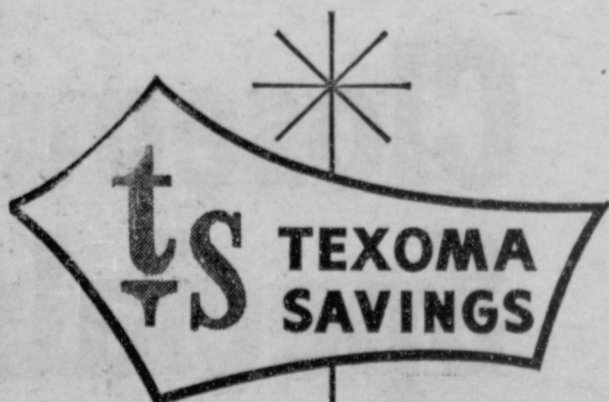

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**Book Tells Evils Of Glue Sniffing**

"Big Trouble In A Tube" a book on glue sniffing, will soon be released by Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education (TANE), Rev. Albert Tucker, Executive Director announced today.

Citing glue sniffing as a most serious problem, causing crime, sickness and death, and leading to hard narcotics addictions, the new book explains in words and pictures glue sniffing's effect on the body and the mind.

It also gives symptoms that might lead parents to suspect that their child might be sniffing glue. These include "unpleasant breath odor, frequent spitting or large amounts of saliva, nausea, loss of weight, irritability, inattentiveness, drowsiness, sudden loss of consciousness, buying large amounts of glue or plastic cement, and loss of interest in normal activities of youth."

The book is written by Lindsay R. Curtis, M. D. and is illustrated by Paul Farber. It is geared for juvenile audience.

TANE, a non-profit organization supported by Texas churches of 19 denominations, hopes to put the books in every Texas school, Rev. Tucker said.

Of children who have died as a result of sniffing glue, six died after inhaling the vapors with plastic bags over their heads.

The sniffer's brain is effected, along with his kidneys and even the bones, according to "Big Trouble In A Tube."

**When You Fly The Flag...**



Is patriotism dead? "Decidedly not," says a new public service-brochure published by the Greyhound Corporation.

"This Land of Ours" defines patriotism of the '60s, American style, as "the steady dedication of a lifetime... not short, frenzied outbursts of emotion."

The brochure tells how the National Anthem was written, contains an original short story about a patriotic boy and relates creation of the first American flag.

Who made our first flag? Probably not Betsy Ross as is commonly believed. On June 14, 1777, the Continental Congress approved a resolution authorizing a flag with "thirteen stripes, alternating red and white... and thirteen stars, white on a blue field..."

Little more than a month later, the British attacked Fort Schuyler at Rome, N.Y., and 200 men of the Massachusetts Regiment were sent to reinforce the American garrison.

These men brought word of the "flag resolution." Immediately, a flag was made—from soldiers' white shirts, the red petticoat of a soldier's wife and the blue cloak of Capt. Abraham Swartout.

It was the first time the "Stars and Stripes" were ever fired upon. "Knowing what the flag stands for," notes the brochure, "places on each of us a heavy burden of responsibility, for we realize it is far more than a tri-colored bit of cloth."

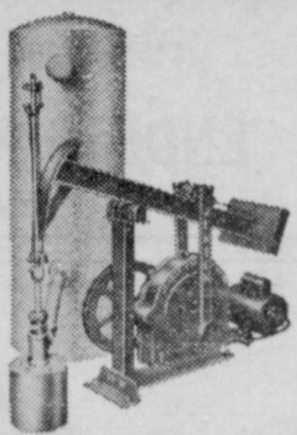

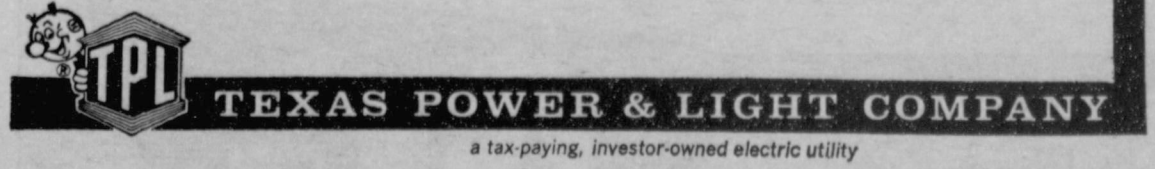
