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

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

Weather conditions do not affect their activities until ideal growing conditions in the very late winter and early

The first symptom of the winter grain mites is a silvery cast that can be observed in soil, water and plants, but the small grain looking toward rather be original and use the sun. The silvery cast will disappear in a few days and the grain will start turning yellow and brown.

In many cases in the past year it has been necessary to spray the grain fields in some areas of Cooke County, twice in a season. In severe cases, the yield per acre will be reduced if the insects are not controlled. They will always reduce the amount of pasture.

Three chemicals are recom mended to control the winter





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

The success or failure of grass planting is in direct seedbed preparation made. Now is the time to plow and prepare areas to be planted in grass in order to allow the winter rain to soak in and make a moist, firm seedbed. The degree of seedbed prearation will determine how soon terraces can be outlet onto the grass. Poor seedbed preparation means a poor stand of grass and consequently an unsafe outlet for terraces. This may delay terrace construction for an additional
