
The plans of this new dormitory indicate that the building will harmonize in architectural style with other buildings on the campus.

People who do not get a call information to interested persons. He also suggested a change on the highway signs at both sides of town.

The official figure at this time is 1190, which is the count of the 1960 census. Guesses nowadays range from 1250 to 1450. Figures are indefinite because there is no definite basis for estimating. As pointed out by Moster, the rate of growth in official census figures up to 1960 has been about 3 percent a year. If the rate applies to the seven years since Muenster should have about

250 more than in 1960. That would be about 1440. Another method of estimat-

ing is to determine the number of persons served by a number of water meters and apply that ratio to the full number of residential meters. The result of that method is less than the other. The present count will show which is more nearly correct.

It's not clear whether they are so naive as to think that they could actually shield someone from the law by re-
