Big Change Made In Membership of Basketball Loop

Big changes have been made in the Interscholastic League basketball district in this area for the next season.

The new listing drops two of the former loop members and adds four others.

A tentative list received by Superintendent L. B. Bruns from Austin announces that District 30-B is made up of Muenster, Lindsay, Era, Valley View, Alvord, Forestburg, Krum and Slidell. Callisburg, a former loop member is in a district to the east, and Saint Jo is included in a district to the west.

New members are Alvord, Forestburg, Krum and Slidell, the latter three being schools that do not have football and begin their basketball practice in September. The indication is that those three will be strong favorites for top places in the loop standing. The other five schools have football programs and do not start basketball until November.

In that case the first and most urgent need is the job of persuading those people to get in. Not with just a few thousand troops, as now, but all out mobilization with a goal of total victory. The vast millions of them could easily muster more than enough strength.

It might be noted to that some need not even leave home to help. Laos and Cambodia, for instance ought to be busy right now dealing with red sanctuaries and supply lines that violate their countries.

Assuming that those countries see the light and act accordingly, the next urgent need is a change to the kind of warfare this country used to wage. Military men say we must quit pulling our punches. We must blast all available military and industrial targets, including vital ports and sanctuaries. We must quit fighting by rules that give an advantage to the enemy.

Another long over - due change is the one concerning our ultimate goal. We have said all along that we intend to chase the aggressor out of the South. Our only purpose is to prevent a take-over by the North. That makes the war an absurdly one sided affair. Reds have everything to win and nothing to lose. We and South Vietnam have everything to lose and nothing to win. The policy reminds one of a law which allows society to only prevent crime but not punish. Obviously criminals would love it, as the reds love this arrangement.

The goal as well as the method of this war needs to be changed. We need to go for total victory, to help South Vietnam occupy the north, kick the reds out of government and set up a free election by which the re-united country can choose a government of its choice. Reds must be shown that aggression does not pay.

Myra-Gainesville Free Phone Calls Will Begin May 1

Toll charges between the Myra and Gainesville telephone systems will be a thing of the past on May 1. After that the patrons of either system will be able to dial direct and free to any phone on the other system.

Actually that gives the 69 Myra phones a free call privilege to almost all of the county, the exceptions being the Valley View system and a few borderline phones served by exchanges outside the county. They already have a free call deal with about 1100 phones on the Muenster exchange.

This new service has been developing since November 1966 when a survey indicated that 90 per cent of the Myra subscribers favored it. The principal job in making it possible was installation of a 6-circuit underground cable to Gainesville replacing the previous 3 circuits.

Also included in the deal was a decrease in the number of parties on many lines. Business and residence lines now have no more than 2 parties rural lines no more than four. Formerly they had up to 4 and 8 respectively.

The toll-free calls and better local service are made possible by a rate increase of \$1.50 to \$2.00 per month, depending on the type of service. The new rate becomes effective on May 1.


The staff at Muenster Public Library has been busy re-arranging books since three new shelves were installed for added space.

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

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

"The donor sets the fair value of the item," he added. The amount is then deducted on the income tax form just as a regular gift of money to any recognized charity.

DEFERRED GRAZING

The big three of livestock production are water, soil and grass. The rancher knows that water and soil are directly related to the production of grass, but these two alone will not sustain it. The grass plant itself should be given priority if the tonnage of forage is to be increased, because it can be regulated by management economically, while regulation of soil and water to meet the different environmental conditions is a major task.

Since the grass plant is the most economical tool to greater production, ranchers watch its growth knowing that if it is properly managed, it in turn will manage the water and soil properly. This is why ranchers like to take their cattle off the native grasses for about three months each growing season in order to give the grass plants a well deserved rest to strengthen themselves. If the grass does not respond to this rest, it is telling the rancher that the rest period needs to be extended. It might take three to four months rest each growing season for two to three years before response is noted because of overuse of the grass in previous years.

With the plenteous supply of moisture this winter, grasses deferred this growing season will probably show a marked response to the rest.

The Upper Elm-Red Soil and Water Conservation District reminds ranchers that deferred grazing is a profitable practice as insurance against drought.

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


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
