The city's curfew ordinance, which has been ignored for a number of year, was dusted off and put back into use at the city council meeting Tuesday night.

The council instructed James McDonald, police chief, to resume enforcement of the provision requiring persons under 18 to be off the streets at midnight. Only exceptions are when the youngsters have a valid reason for being out after 12, such as returning from an out-of-town school event or leaving a dance at midnight. Even then loitering is not allowed. The person is expected to be on the way home.

The council's action was brought on by a contest in vandalism involving students of the two local schools. It started with Halloween pranks that were more than pranks and led to progressively greater vandalism on both sides. McDonald said the entire

mess is under investigation now and detailed reports will be given to authorities of the schools for their disciplinary action and possible prosecution.

Also at the council meeting, report disclosed that the matter of clearing right of way for work on Ash Street is on court docket now and due to come up soon for trial. The case will determine who is responsible for removing oil lease buildings and rod lines so that street work can begin.

Reports Required Of Persons on SSI


"The new Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program administered by the Social Security Administration requires reports from recipients that are not required from people receiving only social security benefits," Gus Jones, District Manager of the Sherman Social Security Office announced today. "It is important that people receiving the SSI payments be aware of their obligations."

"For example," Jones continued, "a person receiving social security may not have to report if he is working, unless he is disabled, if he does not expect to make over \$2400 in a year. A person receiving Supplemental Security Income must report any work he or she does. Also, any other income that a social security beneficiary would not normally report — such as prizes, gifts, increases in other pensions, interest payments, etc. - must be reported by those receiving SSI payments."

"There are other points to remember," Jones went on. "If a person moves, we have to know not only to send the checks to the proper address but also to see if there is a change in the living arrangements of the person receiving SSI. If a husband and wife separate, or a person enters an institution, or a death occurs, the Social Security Office should be notified immediately so that the individual's eligibility can be redetermined."

"People receiving SSI payments should ask their Social Security Office for a pamphlet number 73-11010 - "Your Claim for Supplemental Se-curity Income," Jones con-cluded. "It will remind them of their obligations to report all items that may cause a change in payments."
