

It's pleasing to hear those radio and TV reports about gasoline being more plentiful lately. We like to think that ending the Arab oil embargo has ended the strain that our nation felt during the past year. But we just don't like the assumption that old times have returned and we can use gasoline as lavishly as before. Reports are that this attitude is encouraged by some filling station people who now put the emphasis on selling more gasoline rather than getting the most use out also in tax rate. of the available supply.

A person would think that the public should have learned a number of important facts Cooke County Farm Bureau to \$200 to \$225 per acre. This is during the shortage. Fact number 1 is that the nation uses enormous quantities of gasoline and the supply is not unlimited. Even under favorable conditions we're facing an eventual shortage. Common sense urges us to keep this in mind and keep the supply going as long as possible.

Fact number 2 is that we've learned that a crisis can be created by an oil embargo. Foreign suppliers have an efin an economic squeeze. Pruserve for emergency and also acquire more thrifty habits for the future. Especially it admonishes us not to waste our very limited supply as long as we have to depend on foreign oil.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen this week comes out with the depressing report that Turkey has decided to resume full scale growth of opium poppies after three years of very limited acreage for pharmaceutical purposes only. The great increase in opium production means a very probably big increase in the use of the drug in this country.

As a background to this problem, it can be explained that US and Turkey made a deal in 1971 to subsidize Turkish farmers in the amount of \$35 million to curtail poppy production. By that agreement 80 per cent of the herion supply in this country was cut off. As a result heroin addiction in US dropped from about 600,000 to 250,000. The dope problem in US was vastly improved. And there were related benefits as well. There were fewer crimes resulting from influence of the drug, also fewer burglaries and robberies by which many addicts support their habit. Needless to say, much of that progress will be wiped out when Turkey gets the stuff back on the market. Despite the very best efforts of our narcotics control people, of trips. some will get through to the pushers and their victims. The situation isn't completely hopeless, however. President Nixon has demonstrated his concern by recalling the U.S. Ambassader from Turkey. And the Senate has voted to cut off foreign aid to any country which permits opium poppies to be raised and allows opium from them to be sold on the illegal drug market. These two steps could possibly persuade the Turkish government to re-consider. Through the years Turkey has received \$3 billion in military and economic aid from the US, and has been approved for \$232 million this year. Our ties. guess is that the officials would have to be fools to snub this kind of legitimate opportunity for the sake of a very risky and illegal opportunity. Nevertheless, as matters stand now, Turkey is back in the opium business. We'll have to wait and see how long, and ordination. what it does to our drug problem. Just now, it seems, there ought to be another inducement to make the Turks more cautious. With war threatening in Cyprus, and a possible need of help, one would think that Turkey would be interested in maintaining friendly relations with the US. That situation makes us wonder whether the Turkish government will give in to our diplomatic and economic pressure. On the other hand we wonder how this will effect US relations with Red China. That country too is involved in this country's opium and heroin problems. Will Washington apply the pressure to ban opium production in China, or will it just look the to spend Wednesday with her other way?
