Relative to the much publicized controvercy on killing livestock. this week's column is being turned over to David Klement, a native of the community, now on the editorial staff of the Detroit Free Press. The following is a recent article of his in that paper.

Why the big uproar about farmers in Wisconsin, Texas choosing the people who will and Oklahoma killing their calves and pigs because they can't afford to feed them?

It's Page One news, and everyone from President Ford on down is outraged at the "shocking waste" of their action

It just goes to show you how little the city slickers understand the farmer, and how much the farmer has learned the ballot, each with a canfrom them.

For farmers have been quietly killing their livestock off in bad times for years. It's only fices. Republicans and Socianow, after years of watching list workers have a number anti-war protesters, blackpower advocates, unionists and women's liberationists shouting their grievances on the picket line, that farmers have come out into the open with the same tactics of public protest. They've learned from the daily newspapers and the evening news that the squeaking wheel gets greased.

Twenty years ago, on a small dairy farm in north central Texas, killing newborn calves was a private, dollarand-cents matter. And very painful, especially for a 14year-old who thought he was pretty much of a man.

To this day I'm not sure why Dad ordered ME to kill the calves. Perhaps it was because he'd had a belly full of it. More likely he was testing me, to see what kind of a farmer — and man — his son was.

His orders were brief and clear: "Get the .22, take the three new calves out to the pasture and shoot them."



But damn, the little rascals were cute, all splotched with different colors, all gangly legs and warm, wet noses and big brown eyes.

I didn't really need the twine that I tied around their necks to lead them - they followed right along, no doubt thinking it was feeding time. Calves, like most newborn creatures, seem to be perpetually hungry.

It was a quarter-mile walk to "the boneyard," that dreaded area in the pasture where all dead animals were disposed of. I stopped and slowly loaded the single-shot

My hands trembled as I sighted down the barrel at the first calf. "Why me?," I thought, lowering the rifle. "Why do I have to do it?" But I knew why. I knew I'd have to do it someday, if not now then the next time a cow

broke her leg, or a dog got hit by a car, or one of these years at butchering time. It's one of the things a man has to learn to do.

I drew the rifle back to my shoulder, aimed carefully at the smallest calf's head, and States. pulled the trigger. Quick reload, aim again and pull the trigger. And a third time. It was over very quickly.

I hurried back to the house, half sick but half proud, too. Dad was waiting. He'd heard study, treatment, and prethe shots, so he knew I hadn't failed.

"It had to be done," is all he said.

Fortunately, it was the last time we ever had to shoot baby calves. Shortly after that the prices went up to \$1 a head, then \$2.50, and soon \$5. Before long, buyers were coming to us asking if we had calves to sell.

A year or two ago, on one of my visits home for Christmas, Dad told me he was for baby calves. I asked him if he remembered back around calves because they weren't worth 50 cents. - Weatherstrip doors and windows, and caulk cracks and crevices to prevent drafts and the loss of heated air.
- Maintain heating equipment for maximum efficiency by having it checked by a competent serviceman.
- Dirty filters cause heating equipment to work harder and use more fuel. Check your filters every 30 days. If they're the permanent type, clean them according to the manufacturer's directions. If they're the disposable type, replace them at least every 90 days.
- Don't be a "thermostat jiggler". Turning the thermostat up or down doesn't cause the equipment to heat or cool faster. It simply works. longer to satisfy the setting. The national conservation program calls for settings of no more than 68°F. in heating weather. If you are going to be away for several days, lower the temperature to 60°F.
- Don't place curtains, furniture or other objects in front of heating registers or return air openings. This blocks the flow of warm air.
- Open blinds and draperies on sunny days to help heat your home during the day but close them at night to help reduce heat loss.
- (3) Keep the fireplace damper closed when the fireplace is not in use.
 - Storm doors and windows are not customarily used in this part of the country, but they do reduce heat loss. As a temporary substitute, a sheet of clear plastic stapled or tacked over screen doors or windows works well.
- Keep the opening and closing of doors to a C minimum to reduce the loss of warm air.

TP&L Tells Plans To Meet Needs of Energy Dilemma

The nation's energy dilem-ma and the challenge it poses for meeting the growing electric needs of one of the most vibrant areas of Texas were outlined by Trent C. Root, Vice President for Public Service of Texas Power & Light Company, in a Tuesday evening presentation at the Caravan Motor Motel in Gainesville. Root traced the past, present

and future of American's energy supply and demand by utilizing a three-dimensional plastic model developed by the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy for personalized briefings to members of the U.S. House and Senate. At the same time, he super-

imposed the nation's electric energy growth — and more specifically, the plans of his company for it's growing 51county service area - upon the total United States energy situation. TP&L, Root told the group,

will spend as much on new construction in the next five to six years as it did in the posits which the Company first sixty-three years of its history. Most of that will be for new power generation TP&L now is entering the plants.

Root translated each of America's energy sources into a common denominator - Barrels Per Day of Oil Equivalent - then traced their usage from 1960 to 1970, 1980 and 1990. The energy usage was broken down into its major categories, residential and

America must move away from a dependency on oil and the only reliable, economicalnatural gas, and toward more ly feasible new avenue of utilization on coal and nuclear power, the TP&L executive pointed out. He cited figures showing that supplies of coal and nuclear fuel literally dwarf the dwindling supplies of oil and natural gas, not only in America but also over

the entire world. This currently-spotlighted movement to coal and nuclear power is the strategy which TP&L began several years ago, before the "energy crisis" became a household word, Root emphasized. TP&L and its associated companies already have built and placed on line two large lignite coalfueled generating units, he

added, while construction and planning for eight more lignite units - either partly or wholly owned by TP&L - is underway at this time.

Because lignite coal deholds in Texas will ultimately be depleted, Root continued, nuclear power generation era. He said his company, along

Nuclear power, he emphasized the energy model, is electric generation open at this time to the nation's power companies.

Root credited Jack Bridges, now Director of Energy Research for the Center for Strategic and Inter-national Studies of Georgetown University, with developing the intricate energy model while Bridges was Technical Director — Energy Resources for the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy. TP&L secured one of the models for the series of energy presentations which Vice President Root is making over the service area.






