The formal change is scheduled for the first sale of the New Year, January 6. However, Klingenberg expects a gradual transition between now and then as more shippers, with the help and advice of commission firms, begin to work for a more orderly flow onto the market to make better use of the buyers' time and more effective use of the facilities on Wednesdays and Thursdays.

Selling time for commission firms will become more uniform, with each firm allowed to sell up to, but not more than one-half its daily drafts in each of the three regular rounds of groups of three head or more. Odd lots will sell at the finish of the available

The Atomic Energy Comto Texas Utilities Generating Company (TUGCO) to construct a nuclear generating plant near Glen Rose in Somervell County, about 60 miles southwest of Dallas.

To be named Comanche Peak Steam Electric Station, the plant will be owned by Texas Power & Light Company, Dallas Power & Light carbon copy of this year's, the Service Company. It will consist of two 1,150,000-kilowatt

Recently, the AEC issued a limited work authorization which allowed TUGCO to begin non-nuclear related site work, such as grading and excavation.

The final approval, which was announced Thursday, gives TUGCO a green light on the total construction project. After the plant is built, the AEC must then issue an operating license before any commercial electricity can be generated.

General contractor for the project is Brown & Root Incorporated, of Houston.

In addition to the plant, a 3,200-acre cooling lake will be built, part of which will extend into Hood County.

An average of 800-1,000 construction workers will be needed to build the plant and

A new farm pond is being planned and staked on the Ted Henscheid farm west of Muenster. The pond will be located in a 70 acre native grass pasture and will be the

main source of livestock wa-

ter in this grazing area. The 1974 fiscal year was good in so far as conservation accomplishments in Texas are concerned. Recent summaries have been released which show some remarkable "on the land" accomplishments. For example 270,822 new farm ponds built, 1576 floodwater retarding structures on the land, over 13 million acres of improved pastures established and over 11 million acres being properly managed, over 322,000 miles of field terraces, over 6 million acres of range seeding and many more items. This shows that Texas land users are doing a good job in

taking care of their land and

in protecting it for future gen-

erations.

Conservation is referred to as protection and wise land use. Land can and does wear out. Ignorance, carelessness, economic pressure and greed has resulted in poor land use and may have wrecked a large part of our national land heritage. Erosion has ruined or badly damaged millions of acres of cropland and grazing land. Millions of acres more have been partially eroded. On the other hand there is land in this country that has been cultivated and grazed continuously for nearly 300 years and is still productive. This land has been wisely used and kept within its capabilities. With the right to own goes

tific land use is conservation. Technicians from the Soil Conservation Service are assisting Al Walter in planning a diversion terrace to protect a lower field and in running some parallel terraces in a cropland field. It may be a little early to start thinking about a spring garden but it is not too early to start planning. A recent USDA bulletin says we can build a better garden with mulches. These mulches keep the soil moist and cool, reduce soil erosion, add organic matter to the soil, retard weed growth and furnish food for earthworms that loosen and aerate the soil. Leaves, sawdust, straw, compost, cotton burs, etc., all make good mulches and are easy to apply. If you have leaves on the ground now they can be made into compost or worked into the garden soils for additional organic matter. Plan now for a good spring garden.
