City Yule Lights Installed, Ready To Be Turned on

The city's holiday lights are ready and waiting to be turned on. Wednesday a group of city employees joined the TP&L line crew in its annual job of installing Muenster's Christmas lights.

Their project remained generally in tune with the local scheme over the past several years. Along with the eve catcher on the water tower, the city has a dozen display strings across the highway and Main Street.

Steve Moster, city superintendent, said that the dominant display, on the water tower, consists of the word Noel in yellow lights plus bands of blue and red lights around the tank. It is visible for miles and the word is distinct at a distance of about a

half mile to the south. Street display this time consists of 12 strings, each with alternating green, red and blue lights. The line crossing the street along with the support bracket at each end has 46 lights, a total of about 550

Strings are installed across the highway at each street intersection between the east city limit and Main Street, and also on Main at each intersecsouth of the highway.

Former Resident's **Husband Is Buried** In Wichita Falls

Services for Chris Jensen, 79, retired Wichita Falls policeman who died Saturday were held at 10 a.m. Monday in Hampton-Vaughan Funeral Home. He was the husband Up to the present, private of the former Miss Hallie Richter of Muenster.

The Rev. R. E. Zell, pastor of University Park Church of the Nazarene, officiated and burial followed in Crestview Memorial Park.

A native of Meridian, Tex., Jensen's parents were from Norway and Denmark and his associates always referred to him as "Big Swede." He went to Wichita Falls as a barber a year before joining the meeting is the presentation of police department. His career spanned some of the most violent years and his administration was one of the most turbulent, but he helped usher work pioneering in the field in Civil Service for police and helped raise the standards of law enforcement.

He was the first Wichita Falls policeman to undergo FBI training and completed a 12-week course prior to World War II. He held numerous offices in law enforcement groups and helped to organize the Auxiliary Police force in Wichita Falls prior to World War II.

A veteran of World War I, Jensen was wounded on the battlefield in France and lay unattended for two days before being hospitalized.

He started work in Wichita Falls on Nov. 2, 1920, as a corner policeman at Seventh and Ohio when it was the roughest corner in town in the oil boom days. He retired in 1963 after a career of 43 years in the department that included service as a patrolman, detective, police chief, and detective captain. His career spanned the introduction of radio and modern police methacross the road from Norbert ods into law enforcement. He was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion and the Disabled American Veterans.

On Sunday, July 20, 1969. American astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin Aldrin became the first men to walk on the moon. The plaque they left, "for all mankind," sum-marized the goals and ideals

of America's space program. Today, five years after the greatest technological achievement in history, millions of people around the world have benefited from the scientific advancement and practical application of this new body of knowledge.

Billions of dollars have been saved as man has learned to monitor weather, pollution and plant disease on a world-wide basis. Satellite photogra-phy enables a farmer to pin-point a crop-destroying dis-ease and control it before serious damage can result.

Satellites give early warnings of severe weather never before possible. And satellite monitoring gives a global view of air and water pollution. Now pollution sources can be pinpointed and the movement of pollutants mapped. In addition, air monitoring equip-ment developed for the Apollo spacecraft is now in use in ground level pollution detection stations.







Grade Structure Often Needed for Gully Treatment

by John Pipes, Civil Engineer Successful gully control can be attained only through a comprehensive program which takes into account the treatment of the watershed draining into the gully as well as treatment of the gully itself. In many instances gullies can be brought under control by grading and sodding or seed-ing. More complex gullies may need some other type of treatment since vegetation alone has definite limitations in the protection against large flows in the channel.

Planning gully treatment under these conditions may require that the gradient of the channel be reduced so water will travel at a non-erosive velocity. Many times a drop inlet spillway type grade stabilization structure may be required at overfalls, abrupt changes in grade or at other critical points to supplement vegetation in stabilizing the

channel grade.

A drop inlet structure is a closed conduit generally designed to carry water under pressure from above an embankment to a lower elevation. An earthen embankment is required to direct the discharge through the pipe. A vegetated earth spillway around one end of the embankment is necessary for emergency flow.





Soil Survey Uses Explained in New SCS Brochure

How soil surveys can help you is the subject of a new set of color brochures available from the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

The leaflets are designed to describe uses which can be made of soil surveys by nine different groups including homebuyers, builders, developers, land use planners, land appraisers, farmers, ranchers, construction engineers, and

Soil Conservationist Arlin Naegeli of Muenster said single copies of the leaflets are available free from his office.

Soil surveys have been made on about 120 million acres of land in Texas as part of the National Cooperative Soil Survey. Additional land is being mapped at the rate of about 5 million acres per

The surveys are made by SCS soil scientists who examine the soil acre-by-acre. They record depth, percent sand or clay in each layer, acidity or alkalinity, wetness, flood hazard, and other features by soil name symbols on aerial photographs. After a county survey is completed, the survey is published for public use.

Naegeli said the survey for Cooke County is complete but not published. Until the report is published, soil survey information for all land mapped in Cooke County is available at the Muenster SCS

Soil surveys can be interpreted to determine suitability of soil for home building foundations, septic tank filter fields gardens, cropland, trees, parks, fill material, and other uses.

They can also be used to predict depth to bedrock; location of sand, gravel, or caliche deposits; corrosivity to metal pipelines; shrink-swell hazards; and dozens of other

Naegeli urged anyone interested in soil surveys to contact his office for a free leaflet explaining how surveys can be used. If making your request by mail, specify your business or special interest so you will receive the leaflet designed for you.





ty agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Among grasses that are especially toxic to animals after a frost are Johnson grass,

Sudan and other sorghum hybrids.

Prussic acid poisoning is a disease which prevents oxygen in the blood from reaching the tissues and thus causes

death due to suffocation.

Symptoms of the disease are suffocation and muscular twitching, and the animal may have his head turned toward his flank. The blood of the animal has a bright red color. Animals usually become affected within 10 to 15 minutes after eating toxic material and rarely survive more than one or two hours.

"Livestock should not be allowed access to wilted material after a frost until it has dried completely," says the county agent. "Grazing should also be prevented after a rain when new sprouts begin to form on plants."

Wilted material will usually dry out in a day or two of strong sunlight. New growth usually becomes non-toxic within a week to 10 days after a rain and can then be grazed safely by livestock.

"If you're not sure about your pasture, have a veterinarian check it with a picrate test or have a sample checked in a lab, adds Neil Tibbets.
