


In case of rain Santa and the drawing will be in the old parish hall starting at 2:30.





Oil Needs Extensive Capital

The United States has started late in working toward self-sufficiency in energy, and even working at maximum speed now, it will be difficult to see a major impact before 1980, according to C. C. Gar-vin, Jr., president of Exxon Corporation Corporation.

Reviewing the current en-ergy situation and future prospects, the oil executive said a three-part effort is re-quired if self sufficiency is to be achieved.

"It includes, first, curtailing demand; second, expanding domestic refining capacity, and, third, developing new domestic sources of energy," he said.

To illustrate the magnitude of the job, Mr. Garvin said some of the things needed during the 1990's are:

• More than half a million new oil and gas wells.

• More than 60 new oil refineries

• About 60 oil shale and coal gasification and liquefaction plants.

• About 30 new nuclear plants per year during the mid-1980s.

• More than 140 new coal mines

"This adds up to an enor-mous future growth of energy supply facilities," he said.

"To do this job, the energy industry will need both very large amounts of capital and an unprecedented number of trained engineers. The petroleum industry's future capital requirements in the U.S. are estimated at two to three times the annual levels of the past decade. Financing this capital will require net income growth of 15 to 20 per cent per year," Mr. Garvin said.

"In an era of expanding capital requirements, petro-leum companies must remain competitive in attracting funds from investors. Unless the industry can consistently demonstrate an adequate return on investment over a sustained period, it will not be capable of attracting the fi-nances needed to supply the energy needed to keep the world's economy growing." Mr. Garvin said that the

energy shortage had been building for several years for a simple reason: demand has

"During this period of shortage," Mr. Garvin said, "we must act in concert with other consuming nations and cooperate with producing countries to try to keep world energy prices in line. Consuming nations need to recognize their mutual interests and cooperate in energy planning and development.

He emphasized that "we will always live in an inter-dependent world," but said that striving toward energy self-sufficiency is a goal that should be pursued "as a mat-ter of national and international importance.

Bicycling Safety Tips

Bicycling has once again emerged as an efficient means of transportation, as well as a form of recreation.

With more and more people pedalling to their destinations, the increased number of bikes on the road has resulted in a rise in cycling accidents.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission lists bikes as the most hazardous product it monitors. Out of the 372,000 bike injuries a year, 38,000 result from collisions or grazes with autos, trucks and buses. Others are caused by problems with the bikes themselves - poor braking, feet slipping off pedals and component failure.

A lot of accidents could be avoided if the cyclist simply followed the same rules as in automobile driving, plus a few extras. For better control, always ride a bike that fits you. Your feet should rest on the bottom pedal when the pedals are in the six o'clock position, while you are sitting on the saddle. Also, know how we'll your brakes work in rain, mud and slush.

While riding in cities and towns, always move with the traffic. When on a one-way street, keep to the left to avoid buses wheeling in and out of lanes.

Also, be alert to parked cars with drivers sitting inside. You may find a door opening just as you're pedalling past.

It's best to keep off high traffic streets and avenues and to avoid roads carrying fast moving trucks. Their wind blast could send you sprawling.

With a little caution, bicycling can be a safe means of transportation, as well as fun. If you're not an experienced cyclist, though, take time to build up your wind and legs before you race somewhere.






