Community Center to Be Dedicated Sunday

Formal dedication of the new community center of Sacred Heart Parish will be held Sunday, December 8, on the 85th anniversary of the founding of this community.

The new facility has been in use for about a month, however the ceremony of blessing was postponed to coincide with the birthday of the community, as designated by the original settlers after celebration of the first Mass at Muenster on the feast of the Immaculate Conception on December 8, 1889.

Bishop A. Dangelmayr, native son of the parish, will do the honors following confirmation of 62 six grade students at a 4 o'clock mass in Sacred Heart Church.

As people come to the building after Mass they will be seated at tables in the main room of the hall and the estimated time to begin the ceremony is 5:30.

The service will be short consisting of prayers and blessing by the bishop and singing by the Sacred Heart men's choir and mounting a crucifix in the main room, then separate prayers and blessing in each of the other rooms.

That will be followed by the dedication dinner, at which about 400 persons are expected. It will be a traditional German feast starting

with a round of beer and followed by a meal featuring German dishes. Also, the choir's program will include a few German songs, and the waiters and waitresses along with the choir will be in the old time German attire. The choir will sing during most of the meal.

Father Placidus Eckart, who is in charge of the festivities, said that the dinner program will be short, consisting only of recognitions of people who were involved in construction of the hall and the fund raising campaign preceding it.

Council Approves Plan to Upgrade Muenster Library

A program of upgrading the Muenster city library was the principal concern of the city council at its regular meeting Monday night.

Bill Bedrick, Albert Lippe and Miss Sylvia Hofbauer of the library board were there to discuss the alternative of improving to meet state library standards in order to qualify for federal and state grants and aids, or to continue on its own at the present standard of operation.

In this connection it was pointed out that standards seldom remain unchanged, so actually the choice is between improvement or decline of Muenster library service.

The council favored the improvements and appointed Mrs. A. J. Endres to work with the library board to determine what needs to be done and how much it will cost. Also involved is a cooperative arrangement with libraries of the two local schools.

The library board also presented a problem of rent increase from \$100 to \$150 a month and the city responded by increasing its library allotment from \$2,000 to \$2,600 a year.

A financial report by the board revealed that its principal sources of revenue are \$2,000 from the city, \$1,400 from the county and \$100 from the local CDA court. Total expenditures for the 11 months to date were \$3,132.58 and the present cash balance is \$2,255.66. Principal items of expense were \$339.86 for utilities, \$438.42 for books, \$91.09 for magazines, \$39.66 for cards and binding, \$651.55 for repairs and miscellaneous \$480 for petty cash.

In other business the council voted to accept Tuggle Motor Company's bid of \$3,152.85 for a 1975 Dodge 1/2 ton pickup.

The ceremony also included prayers asking for eternal rest of the departed and ended with a roll call of those who died.

Two names were added since the previous year's service. They are Herman Fette and Jacob Pagel.

Wilde said Wednesday that most work of preparing packets and recruiting helpers is finished and solicitations will be under way by the end of the week, and hopefully will be ended next week. Last year's total of \$1712 has been set as this year's quota.

In starting the drive Wilde points out that this is a combined effort to help twelve charitable organizations in their separate programs of helping people. Besides spreading contributions around to do a great deal of good it makes only one appeal to the public. Except for United Fund each of the organizations would have to conduct its own campaign.

Parade and Drawing To Open Yule Season

The Christmas Season of 1974 will be ushered into Muenster Saturday with a Santa parade sponsored by the Jaycees and a multiple drawing sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

Purpose of the two events is to draw a super crowd of both children and adults. Following the parade Santa will meet with the kiddies in front of Hamrics for Christmas talk

and to pass out candies provided by the Jaycees.

Meanwhile adults will gather at another float, at Tom and Jerry's, for drawings in which 42 local firms are participating. Combined value of all the prizes is near \$1000 and registrations for them have been in progress in the respective locations for about a month.

At the drawing each cooperating firm will submit its box of registration slips, and the person whose name is drawn from it, if he or she is present, will win the prize given by that business. If the person does not respond another name will be drawn. Purpose of requiring the winner's presence is to promote a larger attendance.

The parade, with Roger Taylor as chairman, will assemble at 1:30 on Mesquite Street between Wilde Chevrolet and Muenster Butane. From there it will move west on the highway to Main, then north to 6th street, where it will break up. After that Santa's appearance and the drawing will get underway.

A special provision to accommodate the crowd is to clear Main Street of parked cars between First and Second Streets. Drivers are asked not to leave cars there from noon until Santa's visit and the drawing are ended.

In case of rain Santa and the drawing will be in the old parish hall starting at 2:30.

Building Notes

In spite of a nationwide slump in building activity, construction here continues at a steady pace. Two new homes and a commercial building are just getting started and a number of new or improvement projects are in varying stages of development.

The community's big job of the year has just been finished. It is Sacred Heart Parish's magnificent community center, which will be dedicated in formal ceremonies on December 8. Measuring 95x137, it triples the space of the old parish hall and its cost was about \$440,000.

And a considerably larger job is in sight for the near future when Associated Milk Producers, Inc., expects to get started on its new milk processing plant, which will triple the productive capacity of the present factory. A part of that project is already under way. It consists of converting the former truck shed, which was attached to the powdered milk warehouse, into additional warehouse space. It will enlarge the building's capacity from about 8,000 square feet to 15,000 square feet.

Another non residential building is the new warehouse for Muenster Telephone Corp. at the corner of First and Walnut. It will be a Delta steel building measuring 40x60. Pouring of the concrete floor and erection of the steel framework were finished last week.

Newest of the new homes are those of Tom Swirczynski and David Fisher. Swirczynski, in the east part of town, is building a 3-bedroom house with two baths, attached garage, brick veneer, central heat and air. Fisher's, a short distance east of Paul Fisher will have three bedrooms and two baths, fireplace, central heat-

ing and cooling, brick veneer, attached garage.

Another one, now at the framework stage, is Mike Felderhoff's, on the Vince Felderhoff place 5 miles southwest of town. It will have three bedrooms, two baths, fireplace, central heating and cooling, double garage, brick veneer.

Some of the jobs listed before are nearing completion. Clyde Walterscheid near the old Fisher home, and Mark Fuhrmann, neighboring Ted Voth, have reached the kitchen cabinet stage. Henry Starke is installing carpets and expects to move in soon. Likewise Kenneth O'Dell of Lindsay is doing finishing work. Recently finished and occupied are the homes of Wayne Klement, Arnold Muller and Mrs. Charles Fisher.

Almost the equivalent of a new house is Tony Luke's extensive remodel job. He's adding a room and bath, a fireplace, triple garage, new roof, brick veneer and inside changes. Interior work is just getting started.

Changes at the Theo Voth house consist of a new fireplace, added insulation and brick veneer. And Ray Voth is adding a fireplace.

Theo Vogels are well advanced on installation of wall paneling, acoustical ceiling, storm windows and new kitchen cabinets. And Joe Hess has a new roof.

At Lindsay at least four persons have new roofs to replace those lost in a recent storm. They are Jim Myrick, Kenneth Zwinggi, Kenneth Krebs and Ted Noggler.

Commercial remodeling at the Dankesreiter Garage includes paint throughout the interior plus a room partitioned off for an office.

AMPI Starts Work on Expansion Project

While bids for construction of the new milk processing factory at Associated Milk Producers, Inc., are under consideration the work is getting started now on a separate but related project.

Vernon Sparkman, plant manager, said this week that bids on the new AMPI plant were received last Wednesday at the association's San Antonio office and are being studied before the award of a contract. The decision is expected soon.

Meanwhile workers are just getting started on a remodeling job which will convert the former truck shed, adjoining the powdered milk warehouse, into additional warehouse space. The change will increase storage capacity from 8,000 square feet to about 15,

000. First use of that space, Sparkman said, is for storage of equipment to be used in the new factory. Some of the equipment is here now and the balance is expected before the building is finished.

Location of the new plant will be west of the present site, across Elm Street. Measuring 272x100 feet, with a second floor over part of it, the structure will have about 30,000 feet of floor space. The upper level will be occupied principally by office and laboratory. Also a part of the project is new and larger condensing equipment for powdered whey. It will be installed in the present building, not the new one.

Sparkman said that the new factory will have capacity to

process 60,000 pounds of milk an hour into cheese while also processing an equal quantity of milk into powdered milk or whey into condensed whey. During an 18-hour day this amounts to more than a million pounds of milk for cheese plus an equal amount of milk or whey for one of the other products. Variation of the second product is explained by the fact that the same unit is used for making the powder or the condensate.

To supply material for its expanded operation, AMPI will have almost four times its present storage space, all located in the facility west of Elm Street. There will be three 50,000 gallon storage tanks, each capable of holding ten tank trucks of milk.

Their total capacity is 1,275,000 pounds, as compared with the present 350,000 pounds.

The receiving area will have accommodations for three trucks, each unloading at the rate of 2000 pounds — more than 325 gallons — a minute. Trucks will be weighed by a scale which is read remotely inside the plant.

Sparkman said the entire plant will be good looking inside and outside. Muenster is fortunate in doing its building when the company does not have equipment elsewhere to be moved here. So, everything will be new. The only units to continue in use are the present warehouse and the boiler room. Steam will be piped across the street to the new building.

Oil Needs Extensive Capital

The United States has started late in working toward self-sufficiency in energy, and even working at maximum speed now, it will be difficult to see a major impact before 1980, according to C. C. Garvin, Jr., president of Exxon Corporation.

Reviewing the current energy situation and future prospects, the oil executive said a three-part effort is required if self-sufficiency is to be achieved.

"It includes, first, curtailing demand; second, expanding domestic refining capacity, and, third, developing new domestic sources of energy," he said.

To illustrate the magnitude of the job, Mr. Garvin said some of the things needed during the 1990's are:

- More than half a million new oil and gas wells.
- More than 60 new oil refineries.
- About 60 oil shale and coal gasification and liquefaction plants.
- About 30 new nuclear plants per year during the mid-1980s.
- More than 140 new coal mines.

"This adds up to an enormous future growth of energy supply facilities," he said.

"To do this job, the energy industry will need both very large amounts of capital and an unprecedented number of trained engineers. The petroleum industry's future capital requirements in the U.S. are estimated at two to three times the annual levels of the past decade. Financing this capital will require net income growth of 15 to 20 per cent per year," Mr. Garvin said.

"In an era of expanding capital requirements, petroleum companies must remain competitive in attracting funds from investors. Unless the industry can consistently demonstrate an adequate return on investment over a sustained period, it will not be capable of attracting the finances needed to supply the energy needed to keep the world's economy growing."

Mr. Garvin said that the energy shortage had been building for several years for a simple reason: demand has outstripped supply.

"During this period of shortage," Mr. Garvin said, "we must act in concert with other consuming nations and cooperate with producing countries to try to keep world energy prices in line. Consuming nations need to recognize their mutual interests and cooperate in energy planning and development."

He emphasized that "we will always live in an interdependent world," but said that striving toward energy self-sufficiency is a goal that should be pursued "as a matter of national and international importance."

Your Home

When The Party's Over, Then What?

Save a lot of after-dinner cleaning by serving food in attractive cookware that you take right from the range to the table.

If you anticipate a lot of youngsters at your holiday party, don't use expensive linen tablecloths. Instead, use colorful paper placemats and napkins. These can be thrown away

after the party and, best of all, you won't have to worry about removing stains from your best linen.

When the party's over, you'll probably find food crumbs inadvertently scattered over rugs and furniture. To make cleaning easy going, use a vacuum cleaner with a special attachment for sweeping up crumbs in the hard-to-reach corners of the sofa.

Also use other vacuum attachments to clean drapes, or sweep up confetti or dirt from the cuffs of trousers, insides of luggage, coats, felt hats, even lampshades.

Candle wax can be removed from fine tablecloths by carefully scraping the wax with a dull knife. After this is done, place the stained area between several layers of white Scotties tissues or white paper towels and press with a warm iron. Launder the table cloth in the usual way. It will be as clean as the day you bought it.

"Not that we're knocking



Bicycling Safety Tips

Bicycling has once again emerged as an efficient means of transportation, as well as a form of recreation.

With more and more people pedalling to their destinations, the increased number of bikes on the road has resulted in a rise in cycling accidents.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission lists bikes as the most hazardous product it monitors. Out of the 372,000 bike injuries a year, 38,000 result from collisions or grazes with autos, trucks and buses. Others are caused by problems with the bikes themselves — poor braking, feet slipping off pedals and component failure.

A lot of accidents could be avoided if the cyclist simply followed the same rules as in automobile driving, plus a few extras. For better control, always ride a bike that fits you. Your feet should rest on the bottom pedal when the pedals are in the six o'clock position, while you are sitting on the saddle. Also, know how well your brakes work in rain, mud and slush.

While riding in cities and towns, always move with the traffic. When on a one-way street, keep to the left to avoid buses wheeling in and out of lanes.

Also, be alert to parked cars with drivers sitting inside. You may find a door opening just as you're pedalling past.

It's best to keep off high traffic streets and avenues and to avoid roads carrying fast moving trucks. Their wind blast could send you sprawling.

With a little caution, bicycling can be a safe means of transportation, as well as fun. If you're not an experienced cyclist, though, take time to build up your wind and legs before you race somewhere.
