The structure to be built by Bayer Brothers is a big oval ditch made of concrete, 750 feet in circumference, 20 feet wide and 4 feet deep. It will remain full and the entire volume of a half million gallons will be kept moving at a speed of 2 feet per second, fast enough to keep solids from settling. Power to keep it moving is supplied by two 25 HP motors.

While the sewage is in motion it is treated by air to break down the wastes. The unit is known as the primary oxidation ditch.

As more sewage comes into the full ditch overflow goes to a clarifier tank where solids settle out before clear liquid goes to the lagoons. Solids from the clarifier are pumped back to the oxidation ditch for more primary treatment.

Further oxidation of liquid in the lagoons purifies it to a degree that exceeds new standards.

\$479 Million from Social Security

Social security is now paying more money to students 18 through 21 than all the scholarships at all U.S. Colleges and Universities, according to data just received by Gus Jones, district manager of the Social Security Administration in Sherman.

"In the 1968-69 school year," Jones explained, "the social security program will pay about \$479 million to approximately 468,000 students entitled to payments on the earnings record of a disabled, retired or deceased parent."

The school year that begins next fall will mark the fourth year of payments under a 1965 change in the law providing for the continued payment of social security benefits past the age of 18 to unmarried, full-time students.

"Nothing in the law prevents the student from receiving his social security benefits while he is still receiving assistance from a scholarship period. If a student works during the summer months or part time during the school year, and earns \$1680 or less for the year, he can still collect all of his social security benefits. If his earnings go over \$1680, he gives up some or all his benefits, depending upon the amount of his total earnings and how steadily he works."

Jones added that a 1967 change in the dependency requirements for the children of women workers added 175,000 more young persons to those eligible for payments. Any student in the 18-22 age group whose mother is deceased, disabled or retired after earning social security coverage, should visit his social security district office as soon as possible, suggested Jones. The Sherman office is located at 315 West Mulberry. Office hours are 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Monday through Friday and each Thursday evening until 6:45 p.m. In addition, a representative from the Sherman office may be contacted in Gainesville each Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon in the Federal Building.







Contract Awarded For 3 Reservoirs On Denton Creek

Beavers Construction, Inc. of Bowie, Texas was the low bidder on three floodwater retarding structures in Denton Creek, according to H. N. Smith, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Temple, Texas.

Beavers Construction, Inc. bid was \$128,533.46. This includes 13,620 cubic yards of common excavation; 100 cubic yards of rock excavation; placing and rolling embankment, 195,580 cubic yards; 78.9 cubic yards reinforced concrete: 570 Lin. ft. reinforced concrete pipe; asbestos cement pipe, 1,901 Lin. ft.; reinforcement, steel bar, 5, 139 lbs. Filter material, 1,152 cu. yards; and planein soil, 30,720 square yards; and 10,637 lin. ft. of wire fence.

Sites 8A and 8B are on Paul Donald farm and Site 8D is on Glen Lynch and G. W. Clowers farms South of Forestburg.

These three structures are a part of the 85 floodwater retarding structures planned on Denton Creek. The flood prevention plan also includes 98 sediment control structures, 23 miles of diversion terraces and 43 miles of channel improve-

The Upper Elm-Red Soil and Water Conservation District and the commissioners Court of Montague and Wise County are sponsors of the Flood Prevention Plan on Denton Creek. They are cooperating with the Soil Conservation Service in carrying the plan out.
