week by the city of Muenster. One is a Revenue Sharing check in the amount of \$4,925 and the other was a sales tax check in the amount of \$8,-170.09

The sales tax check is for the city's 1 per cent share of the tax collected by the state during the first quarter of this year. It drops sharply from the previous check of \$9,825 for tax collected during the final quarter of 1973, however mittance of \$6,751 a year ago.

Both of those checks reflect drops considerably in the first quarter. Two big factors accounting for the difference is heavier than usual spending during the Christmas season

and lighter spending in the tax paying season. A statement with the treas-

urer's check explains that the gross amount collected was \$8,241.27 and the state's 2 per cent collection fee was \$164.83. Adding the previous hold-over amount of \$501.98 and retaining \$408.33 for this time accounts for the check's amount of \$8.170.09.

The revenue sharing check is the city's last equal installment on the \$19,700 given to the city by the federal government during the past fiscal year. The fund has been applied for building and improv-



Those appointments are to continue through the week of July 15-19, and problems not settled then can be taken to the county equalization board. Persons are advised that they take the risk of a long wait if they come without an appointment.

Principal changes in the equalization effort concerns land, mineral and industry valuations. Previously most land renditions ranged from \$10 to \$50 an acre. The range now is \$200 to \$225 per acre depending on agricultural productivity, and non-farm land is valued as high as \$700 per acre. On this basis, estimated total valuations are increased from \$240 million to \$410 million. dismissed during the past However, taxable value now is set at 20 per cent of actual value whereas it used to be set at 25 per cent, hence the taxable value increases from \$60 million to \$82 million.

Applying last year's tax rate of \$1.02 per \$100 of valuation, the county's total tax receipts should come to about \$820,000. But the rate still is not determined. Before it can be set the board of equalization will have to finalize the assessments and the commissioners court will have to consider total valuations along with budgets needs to decide the tax rate.
