**CON-FETTE**

Reports of the past few days indicate that President Nixon will soon be on a good tour to several countries seeking to improve the prospects of peace all over the globe and particularly to improve U. S. relations with a number of countries which share our deep concern over the communist threat of world domination.

A more practical mission can hardly be imagined. The red ambition has been plainly spelled out many times, and the red program for a half century has plainly followed the master plan. The Moscow mob is making frightening progress, relentlessly gaining territory and influence at the expense of the free world. It is high time for the free world to realize what is going on and to work together in defense of their mutual interests.

To achieve that better understanding and stronger alliance our own country as well as several of the others will need to make some sharp changes of policy, not only in their own best interests but also as assurance to the smaller countries. It's not surprising that the free world leaders are losing friends and influence among small countries that should be on their side. Too often they have made concessions violating their own principles in order to get along with the communist bloc.

A glaring example is the Rhodesia affair. The U.N., dominated by reds and the Afro-Asian group which has come under red influence, is determined to create chaos in that country as it did in so many parts of Africa. It passed a resolution for sanctions against Rhodesia on charges that the government there threatened world peace and denied blacks a proper representation in government. It did not matter that the government there is more representative of the people than any of the accusing red countries. Nor that the charge of threatening world peace was completely absurd.

President Johnson supported the UN resolution with an executive order prohibiting US nationals from doing business with Rhodesia.

He did that in spite of the fact that Rhodesia had shown its friendship by offering to help us in Vietnam. Also despite the fact that Rhodesia's right to freedom and independence is as valid as our own was back in 1776. Nevertheless we agreed to do a hatchet job on the little country to appease reds who wanted the country in turmoil like several other African countries, and to appease England which wanted to hold it as a colony.

Well, the sanctions of UN and US and Britain have not had the desired effect. Rhodesia has toughed out the boycott. But one never knows when the conspiracy will develop into armed attack. The red record of the past indicates that more drastic action is highly probable. There, as in Vietnam, a communist inspired "war of liberation" might be promoted.

The bitter irony of this farce is that U. S. is hurting itself as well as Rhodesia. It has cut off our previous import of chrome, a highly strategic metal. So, now we import the chrome from Russia, which has been gouging us on the price and which can suddenly stop the shipments any time it wishes. How's that as a price to pay for the very questionable policy of hurting our friends to appease our enemies?

Of all the chores that President Nixon can book for his trip, none seems more practical or proper than undoing our rank injustice to Rhodesia. That implies not only restoring our friendly relations with the little country but also bringing our traditional ally, Britain, around to a common sense attitude on the issue. It's plainly evident that participation in the conspiracy to crush Rhodesia can help only the reds. But cooperation with Rhodesia can help the free world. And the British should realize that their own welfare is linked with the welfare of the free world.

This country, always eager to preserve world peace, has made some pitiful boners, especially in its cooperation with the UN. We have often hurt our friends and helped our enemies by cooperating in communist hatched schemes of co-existence. In doing those things we have sacrificed a great deal of our own self respect and we have failed many smaller countries that

## Burglars Get Cash Checks, Narcotics In Pharmacy Job

A burglary at Muenster Pharmacy early last Thursday night netted an estimated \$500 to \$600 in cash and checks plus the store's entire stock of narcotics, estimated as worth about \$100.

Bobby Pels, pharmacist and co-owner, said the break-in occurred between 6:30, when the place was closed, and 8 o'clock when he returned. Entrance was achieved by breaking open the rear door.

Sheriff Bill Pratt was notified of the break-in immediately and has been investigating it ever since. Up to Wednesday afternoon, Pels said, he has not had a report of a suspect.

Partners with Pels in ownership of the pharmacy are J D Hanna of Marietta, Okla., and Don Woodruff of Gainesville.

## MHS Cagers Win 5 of 6 Games in Week's Activity

Coach Charles Cash and his Muenster High cagers have just finished one of the better weeks of their current season. They won five out of six games, including double wins over Valley View and Nocona B and a split with Chico.

At Valley View last Friday night the teams finished their 30-B schedule, the boys with a 3-4 standing and the girls with a 2-5 standing.

MHS girls won theirs 34-29 after a big last quarter. Prior to then they were behind 17-12 at half time and 22-20 ending the third period. Debbie Cain led the scoring with 22. Debbie Yosten made 9, Kathy Swirczynski 2, Joan Monday 1.

Hornets had an easy time in their 65-52 win. After leads of 20-6 and 42-16 in the first two periods reserves got more of the action and the Eagles cut down the margin. High pointers for MHS were John Monday 27, Dale Cash 14, Mike Cason 12.

Hosting Nocona B the girls ran neck and neck the first two quarters. Scores, 9-9 and 21-21. Then they pulled ahead in the next two periods for leads of 34-31 and 45-40. Their scorers were Yosten 20, Cain 14, Monday 9, Swirczynski 2.

The following game was equally hot as Muenster dropped back 15-8 in the first quarter and gained in the other three periods for the 69-61 win. By half time the Hornets were still trailing 32-31, but by the third period they were in front 49-44. Leading point makers: John Monday 23, Mike Hennigan 11, Dale Cash 10, John Felderhoff 10, Tommy Henschel 9.

Tuesday night at Chico Muenster girls had bad first and third quarters and broke even in the second and fourth. Scores ending those periods, with Chico leading all the way, were 17-8, 24-15, 37-19, 45-27. The scorers were Cain 12, Yosten 8, Monday 7.

Hornets were tied 10-10 at the first quarter and led 25-19 at the half. Dragon pressure in the second half increased but not enough. Muenster squeezed out a 41-39 win. Monday led at the scoreboard with 20. Dale Cash hit 5, Cason and Hennigan 4 each, Felderhoff and Bruns 3 each.

The Muenster teams have a pair of games booked with Saint Jo, here next Tuesday, after which they will close the season in the 30-B tournaments in Gainesville, starting Feb. 13 for the boys and Feb. 20 for the girls.

## Student Interest In Heart Research Urged by Surgeon

The annual Research Day sponsored by Cooke County Heart Association was observed here Tuesday by an eloquent plea for student interest in the field of medical research, particularly concerning the human heart.

The speaker was Dr. Hugh E. Wilson, noted heart surgeon of Dallas, in one of his four appearances in the county in behalf of the cause. He talked in Muenster High School auditorium before a joint assembly of students from the public and parochial schools. His other talks were in Gainesville before the Gainesville High student body, a luncheon meeting of clubs and organizations at Cooke County Junior College, and a meeting of the county medical association.

Dr. Wilson said that marvelous progress has been made in the past three decades in discovering and treating ailments of the heart and blood vessels. From a former belief that the heart is fragile and untouchable, medical men have learned that it is a very durable organ and its malfunctions can be corrected with no more risk than other major operations. All this progress is the result of research and much more progress now in sight depends on more research.

The first heart surgery, he said, was surgery outside the heart to correct faults in vessels. That was in 1938. Next came blind heart surgery during the war. It consisted of surgery by feel to remove bullets and other objects from the heart. Hundreds of those patients still survive.

Open heart surgery followed that. It consisted of stopping the heart and repairing it surgically while a machine did the heart's job of circulating blood in the body. And now transplants, first made 14 years ago in animals, are becoming frequent. However research faces the job of overcoming the body's tendency to reject transplants, probably also the manufacture and installation of mechanical hearts.

A part of Dr. Wilson's program was a colored film showing surgery to correct the heart malfunction of a blue baby. His commentary explained the steps by which the circulatory function was repaired, transforming an invalid into a normal child.

Favorites to win the champ trophies are Valley View, Slidell and Krum in both boys and girls divisions.

Action started at 12:30 Thursday and will continue through eight games which will divide teams into champ and consolation brackets.

The Friday schedule will present the eight semifinal games which will eliminate half of the contenders and leave the other half to play the four final contests Saturday night. Those games will determine winners of champ and consolation titles in both boys' and girls' divisions.

The first day's games listed in order are Slidell-Alvord, Lindsay - Forestburg, Era-Krum, Valley View-Muenster. In each case the girls play first.

## Tax Collections Over 95 Per Cent

Local tax delinquency was less than 5 per cent as the deadline for payment ended last Friday. Collections were 97.3 per cent complete on city taxes and 94.1 per cent complete on school district taxes.

Mrs. Glenn Richardson, city secretary said that the city's total assessment this year is \$27,608, and the amount collected is \$26,955.

Mrs. L. B. Bruns, tax assessor-collector of the school district, reported that \$104,465 has been received out of the total assessment of \$110,998.

## Barnes Predicts Defeat of Forced Merger of Schools

AUSTIN — Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes predicted defeat of the proposed compulsory consolidation of school districts.

"The Governor's Committee on Public School Education has made many constructive recommendations. I feel that the Texas Senate will pass many of them," Barnes said in a statement released this week.

"However, I feel that the Texas Senate will not pass compulsory consolidation," the new lieutenant governor said. Barnes added that the recommendation to consolidate school districts with less than 2,600 students will probably fall on deaf ears.

"The Texas Senate and this Legislature will probably write an attractive financial incentive program to encourage voluntary consolidation but will not adopt laws making consolidation compulsory in Texas this year," Barnes said.

Compulsory consolidation and other recommendations of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education are included in Senate Bill No. 2 which was introduced last week by Senator A. R. Schwartz of Galveston and Senator Oscar Mauzy of Dallas. The bill has been referred to the Senate Education Committee.

## District Gains 3 In School Census New Count Is 771

The scholastic census of the Muenster school district shows a gain of three in the past year. The new count is 771, as reported Wednesday by Superintendent L. B. Bruns.

This is the eighth consecutive year in which the district census has gained, and the total gain during the eight years was 91. Before that, in 1961, the census dropped to 682 from the 1960 count of 690. Figures for the successive years starting with 1961 were as follows: 682, 702, 709, 711, 731, 733, 741, 768, 771.

In making up this year's census roll Bruns dropped 85 of the names which appeared on last year's list. Those were children who had passed the scholastic age or had moved out of the district. At the same time he added 88 new names, that is children who reached school age or who transferred into the district. Bruns also said that the list has 395 boys and 376 girls.

The discussion revealed that promotion of the project is under way now in Oklahoma and that the Oklahoma workers recommend securing the help of elected representatives of this area in order to achieve a united effort for the common good. Discussion also emphasized present traffic inconveniences for people of both sides of the river and the many benefits to be derived on both sides from the proposed crossing.

The TOAD meeting also considered the feasibility of sponsoring agriculture short courses for the area. S. L. Hansen and Ernest Jaska of the agriculture committee were asked to pursue the subject in fields of beef production, peanut and soybean marketing and a fruit marketing cooperative.

Host for the meeting was the Bowie National Bank. The next meeting will be held on Thursday, March 6, at Rohmer's Restaurant with Muenster State Bank as the host.

## WELL DONE! TO THE SECRET SERVICE

Part of the glamor of having a President in our area have been the arrivals and departures of the Johnsons, the vast array of communications surrounding him and the ranch, and the tireless energy of the Secret Service detail. Because of the emphasis on protection of the First Family, the vice president, former

Presidents, and the widow and children of the late President Kennedy, many citizens forget that the Secret Service plays another important role. It is the federal organization, in the Department of Treasury, that detects and arrests persons committing any offense against the laws of the United States relating to coins, obligations and securities of the United States and of foreign

governments.

It might come as a surprise to know that counterfeiting of United States currency posed an enforcement problem of increasing magnitude during fiscal 1968. As a result, the Secret Service arrested 1,370 persons, an increase of 27.8 per cent over the previous year, for counterfeiting violations. The Secret Service during the year seized more than \$10 million in counterfeit currency before it could be put into circulation. A total of \$2.8 million of counterfeit currency passed on the public came from 36 separate operations which were suppressed by Secret Service agents.

These are national figures. In the Austin district the Secret Service agents seized \$158,200 of counterfeit US currency before it could be put in circulation. During that same period of time the counterfeiters were able to release in the Austin district only \$5,297. Secret Service agents operating out of the Austin District still will have some responsibility in protecting President Johnson after his retirement. This will be on an efficient but minor scale compared to the protective screen provided when he has come back to Texas as President.

In the past five years many Austin people have come to know Kenneth J. Wiesman, special agent in charge of the Austin Secret Service district. A native Texan, he has had a part in civic affairs of Austin. He is an active Rotarian. By choice Wiesman probably will remain in charge of the Austin district. 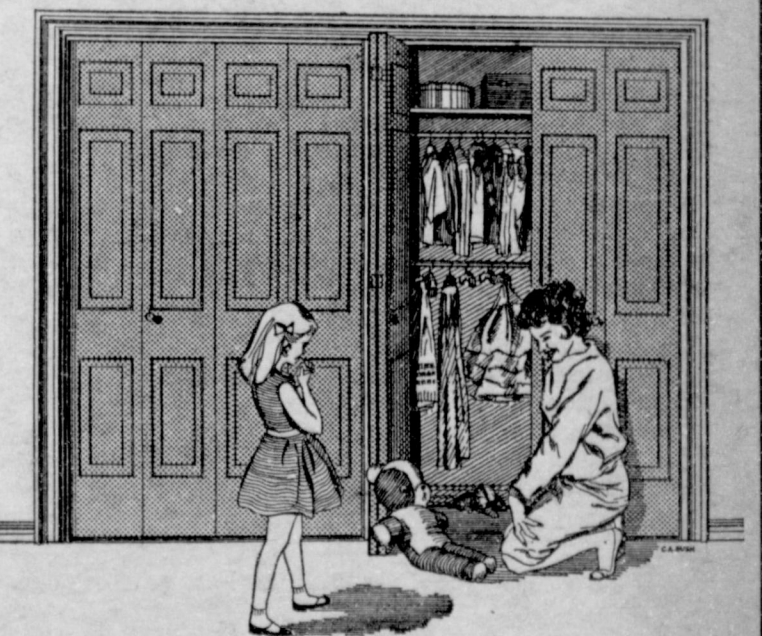

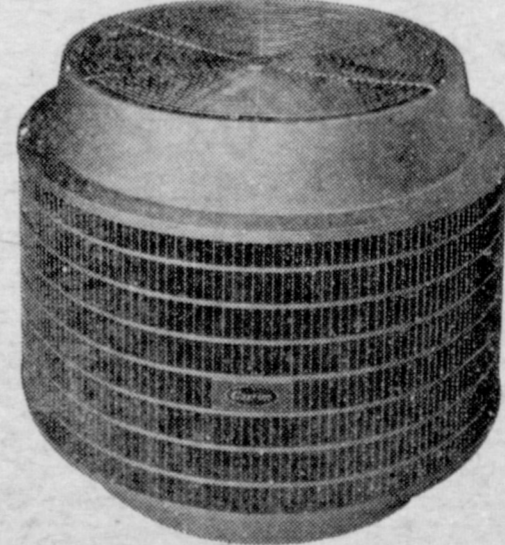

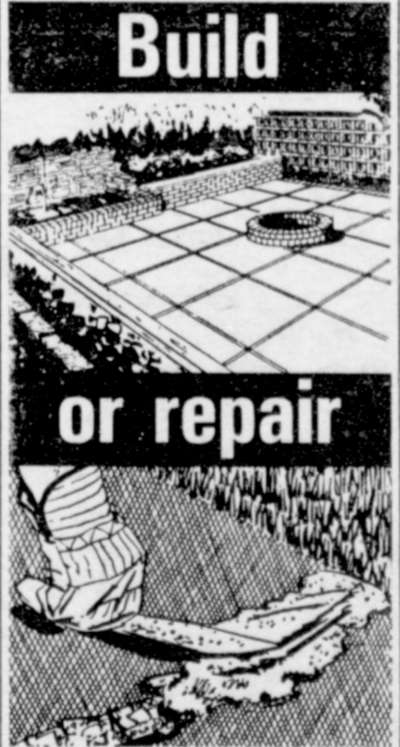
OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

Planting bermudagrass is underway in the Upper Elm-Red Soil and Water Conservation District. Landowners and operators who have sprigged grass began seed preparation early last fall.

Early seedbed preparation is one of the most important factors in obtaining a good stand of grass. Other important things in grass planting are proper care of sprigs during planting. The sprigs should not be dug far ahead of planting. As soon as they are dug they should be loaded and covered or baled and kept moist. Every hour the roots are left to direct sunshine or dry wind, the quality of the roots is greatly damaged.

After the grass has been planted, the ground should be harrowed to smooth it. This is also a good way to control the early competition, states Arlin Naegeli, SCS technician at Muenster.

Final seedbed preparation should be completed as soon as possible in order to obtain a good firm seedbed. With the grass planting season here, the quicker this is completed the better the chances are to get a good stand of grass.

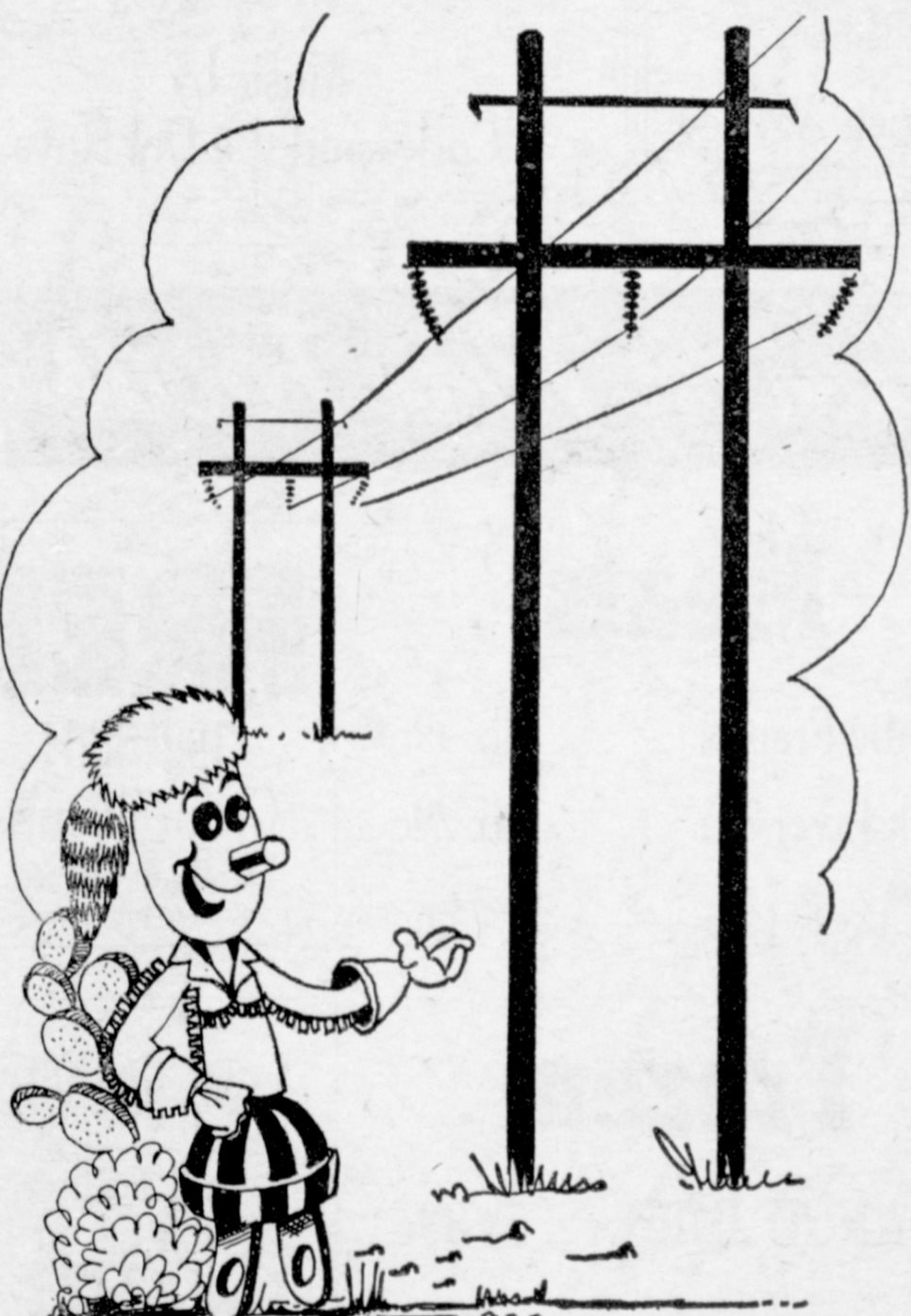
