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Municipalities of this state, along with the other governmental units which finance their projects through sale of tax free bonds, were pleased with a resolution passed by the Texas Legislature just before the end of its 61st session. The resolution asks our national legislature to refrain from taxing the income earned from such bonds.

At first glance this appears to request favoritism to investors who have such bonds. But, as pointed out in the state legislature's resolution, it is rather a plea to refrain from imposing burdens on the governing units and the people who provide the funds to redeem the bonds.

In their anxiety to increase federal revenue some of the men in Washington have an eye on the tax exempt interest earned by municipal bonds. They can name a number of big investors who receive huge income from bonds to finance schools, hospitals, roads, airports, sewers and various other projects included in the broad term of municipal bonds, but don't pay a penny of income tax on them. The rest of us, too, resent the fact that fat cats pay less on millions of income than we do on a few thousand.

A recent article in the Dallas News presents that problem in a different light. Like the legislature's resolution, it points out that citizens of the areas concerned rather than the millionaire investors are the real beneficiaries of tax exempt bonds.

The reason is that the interest rate on municipal bonds is much lower than on bonds which bear interest that is taxable. Persons who do not have to pay tax on the interest they receive can afford to loan it at a lower rate than those who have to pay the tax. Actually the difference in rate is determined mostly by that factor. The end result is that net earning on tax free interest is about the same as on the other interest after tax.

The Dallas News article points out that some of the nation's corporate giants with top credit ratings now pay interest rates as high as 7.9 per cent. On the other hand current rates on a number of municipal bonds in this area are just over 5 per cent. Except for the tax free status of municipal bond interest, cities too would have to pay the higher rate, resulting in tremendous increase of the overall cost of a project. For instance, a million dollar bond paying out in 30 years at 7.9 per cent would cost \$645,990 more in interest than one at 5.25 per cent.

Those figures indicate who will be the victims if interest from municipal bonds becomes subject to tax. It's the people paying the local tax. They'll pay a lot more for the municipal projects. A likely result is that they would also be losers in another way because public improvement programs would be curtailed by the higher tax rate.

As regard the investors, whose tax free earnings are enviously eyed by the tax people, there would be no great difference in net income. When municipal bond interest becomes taxable the rate will be raised accordingly. People now escaping tax would have to pay, but the income after tax would be about the same as the present tax free income.

So, in reality, the plan to get tax money out of the so called fat cats is rather a way of getting additional tax out of other people. The money that investors have to pay as income tax will be extracted from states, cities, school districts, etc. in higher interest charge, and those units will have to get it from their taxpayers in higher ad valorem tax.

We average people can serve our interest best by opposing the planned federal raid on tax free interest money. It's we, not the big investors, who will do the paying when municipal bond interest is taxed.

The fact that such a tax is being discussed indicates that it is getting consideration from the revenue people. However the constitution could possibly stop the plot. It forbids the federal government to tax state and local government. So we come to a question. Would the supreme court say that this is a tax on investors or on the local governments?

Area Farmers Busy On Bountiful Harvest

Muenster is about at the half way point of the best grain harvest it has had in many years. The crop is good in both quantity and quality and the weather has been mostly favorable.

After a late start because of prolonged damp weather, combines got into high gear late last week, however they have been starting late since the light drizzle last Sunday. Most of the grain delivered to the local dealers has been subject to docking for moisture and a few loads had to be turned down.

Otherwise the season is fine. Tests of wheat, oats and barley have all been good and the yield as a community average is probably the best ever. Crops of 40 bushels or more of wheat per acre have been reported by several farmers especially in the Lindsay area. Arendt Brothers, Zimmerman Brothers, Weldon Bezner and Robert Fuhrmann all topped 40 over there and Fuhrmann also made 37 north-west of Muenster. Almost all oats yields are reported over 50.

Best crops reported to the Enterprise were 55.2 bushels of wheat per acre on a 10 acre field at David Walterscheid's and over 100 bushels of oats per acre at Albert Rohmer's southeast of Myra.

Harvesting in the Muenster area is estimated at about half finished. If the fair

Muenster State Bank is trying to make itself unpopular with burglars and bandits. It is installing a movie camera to take pictures of holdup men and an alarm system to announce the presence of anyone who might break in at night.

Herbert Meurer, president said the installation complies with new federal regulations adopted last year by the U. S. legislature.

A wide angle movie camera is set up so that it covers the area in front of and behind the tellers' windows and is rigged so that any of several persons can start it without being noticed.

The burglar alarm is installed in the vault and night depository and is sensitive to both heat and sound. Any attempted break in by torch or hammering will set it off. Clipping any wire in the system will also set it off. It is controlled by a time clock, will not be engaged during business time.

Annual Red Cross Swimming Class Will Start July 7

The other group will meet Wednesday and Friday the first week and Monday, Wednesday and Friday the next week. Each child will receive five 2-hour periods of instruction. Eligible to enroll are all children who have reached their sixth birthday or have completed the first year of kindergarten of school. They will be required to present forms with a parent's statement of permission and a doctor's statement of physical fitness. These forms will be available at the Muenster Medical Center and the Enterprise.

Instructors will be needed, Hamric said, and all holders of senior or junior life saving badges are qualified. Those who are willing to help are asked to see him soon. The compensation will be a free pass to the pool for every day taught plus a bonus of five passes for teaching the full ten days.

Glenn Fleitman Dies in Vietnam

Muenster's first casualty in Vietnam is Staff Sergeant Glenn Ray Fleitman, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Fleitman.

The parents received word Tuesday afternoon that Glenn died Sunday. First word reached them in mid-morning from his wife Judy who lives in Leonard since he went overseas in January. She telephoned to Muenster before the parents received their official notification.

The message revealed that "Staff Sgt. Glenn Ray Fleitman died June 8, 1969, as the result of wounds received in action on the same date. He was wounded while in combat operation when a hostile force was encountered. He was admitted to a military facility in Vietnam and expired shortly thereafter."

Funeral arrangements are awaiting further word from the War Department. It was indicated it would be about ten days before the body arrived. Glenn was a member of Shiloh Baptist Church.

He was born in Muenster July 4, 1948 and graduated from Muenster High School. He enlisted in the Army in Feb. 1968, trained at Fort Polk, La., Fort Benning, Ga., and Fort Ord, Calif., and went to Vietnam in January this year. He served in Co. D, 1st Bn. 28th Infantry, First Division.
